Authorize Work Order for Park Plans

Village Board Approves Final Plat for Roseland Hills Subdivision for 25 Lots

Village trustees Monday night gave the go-ahead for development of Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park by authorizing a work order for park plans. Also approved was the final plat for Roseland Hills subdivision No. 2, along with a certified survey map for one lot not included in the 24-lot subdivision plat. They also approved entering into an agreement with developer James Schulz of Schulz Homes, Inc., West Bend, to guarantee completion by him of all required improvements set forth by the village subdividing and platting ordinance. The subdivision lies at the west end of Brooklane Drive and is laid out, north and south, from about Hillside Drive to Forest Avenue.

The firm of Arthur and Associates of Fond du Lac was authorized to proceed with park plans for the site at the west village limits and consisting of about 35 acres. The Kewaskum Kiwanis Club has pledged some \$77,000 toward park costs.

Schulz filed with the village a cash bond of \$8,877 which amounts to 110 percent of the improvement costs. This will be deposited in escrow with interest earned going to Schulz. It will be so held until the improvements agreement has been fulfilled. He also was required to file a one-year maintenance bond on underground utilities.

Schulz also paid Monday night sewer installation costs of \$6,435.65 and a park and open space fee of \$2,500 which represents one-half of the fee. Schulz must pay an-

other \$100 per lot as each building permit is issued in the subdivision.

Board members also gave their approval to having a new water lay-out map prepared and along with it a valve location book. A new water lay-out map must be drawn to satisfy the Public Service Commission which has said the map on file now of the village waterworks system is outdated and it will not approve any further village water extension plans until an updated map is submitted. The valve location book is a series of maps and will be used locally by public works employees and will be especially helpful when snow and ice covers the ground.

The board chose the low bid of Arthur and Associates. The map will be done on an hourly rate schedule called for in its yearly contract but the cost will not exceed \$900. The quote on the valve location book was \$3,200. There was one bid of \$4,650 and another firm gave no exact figures but said it would prepare the two on a time and material basis.

Permission was granted for Village Commissioner Bill Martin to attend the League of Wisconsin Municipalities conference at Green Bay and for Pete Albers, waste-water treatment plant manager, to attend an annual state conference this month.

Bartenders' licenses were approved for Eugene Biegler, 22, of West Bend and for Sharon L. Koepke, 32, of Malone.

Trick or Treat Night was set for Oct. 30 from 6 to 8 p. m.

Firemen's Expo Here Postponed To This Sunday

Due to rain and inclement weather on Sunday, Oct. 6, the Badger Firemen's Expo (Western District) was postponed until next Sunday, Oct. 13, at 1:30 p. m. at the Kewaskum park parking lot. Preceding the demonstration there will be a parade of fire departments and equipment at 1 p. m. from the high school parking lot to the park.

This expo is held in conjunction with Fire Prevention Week, which is in memorial of the nation's two worst fires in history. Those being the tragic Chicago fire and the Peshtigo fire in northern Wisconsin. Between these two fires there were 1,402 lives lost and 4,500 acres of land burned. Annually fire destroys \$12 billion in fire claims, lost wages, sales and other production costs.

Although the expo was postponed, the Lp gas practice and demonstration was held as scheduled last Sunday, with the various departments present having an opportunity to practice fighting a gas fire.

Ten fire departments will participate in the expo demonstrations. They are Slinger, flammable liquids; Fillmore, extinguishers; Newburg, pumper and hose lay-out; Boltonville, masks; Campbellsport, aerial ladder rescue; Kewaskum, first aid; West Bend, ladders; Jackson, mutual aid; Allenton, mutual aid; Kohlsville, aerosol cans.

The Badger Firemen hope to show some of the newest techniques in firefighting and home hazards.

Lunch and refreshments will be available on the grounds.

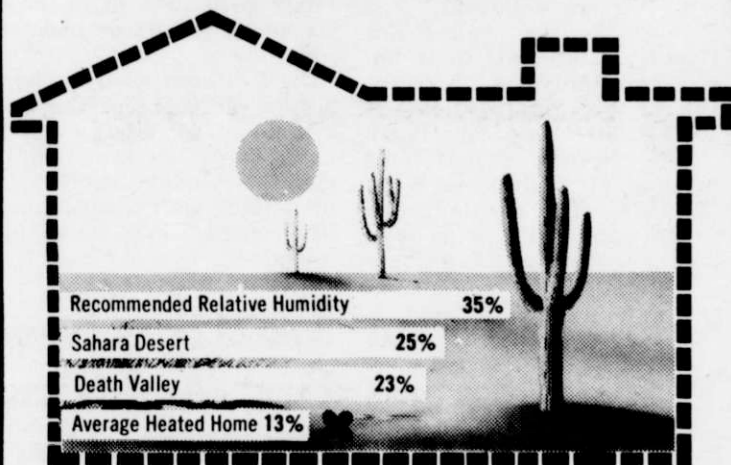

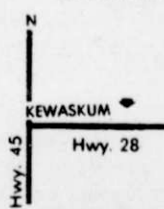

Holy Trinity Announces Policy For Free Milk

Holy Trinity Grade School today announced its policy for free milk for children unable to pay the full price of milk served under the Special Milk Program.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size and income criteria for determining eligibility:

Children from families whose income is at or below those shown are eligible for free meals and milk. In addition, families not meeting this criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expense, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the

purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has such children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, they should contact the school.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of his race, sex, color or national origin.

Under the provisions of the policy Mrs. Vernon Butz, Special Rep. will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may make a request either orally or in

writing to Fr. John T. Budde, 331 Main St., Kewaskum Phone 626-2860 for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

The Holy Trinity Grade School has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

Indians Defeat Pewaukee, 20-6, For Fifth Straight; Share Lead

Kewaskum downed a stubborn Pewaukee team in an afternoon game there Friday, 20-6. It was the 3rd straight conference win for the Indians and 5th overall. Kewaskum is now tied for first place with Germantown, both 3-0.

Germantown rolled to its 3rd straight shutout victory with a surprisingly lopsided 34-0 win over Mayville. The strong Warhawks set a new school record by holding Mayville to minus 25 yards rushing. The loss was the first in 5 games for the Cardinals and dropped them out of a 3-way tie for the lead.

Leading only 8-6 at half-time, the Indians took control in the 2nd half with a stalwart defense, led by soph Leon Laatsch, which shut out the Pirates the rest of the way. In the meantime the offense added 12 points for the victory.

Scott Koth again led the Kewaskum offense with 109 yards in 16 carries although he played less than 3 quarters. Koth was tied with Canter of Germantown for the conference scoring lead with 24 points in the first 2 contests. Jr. Dave Menzel and Laatsch were also among the 6 top scorers with 12 points.

Koth made 48 of his yards in the team's 1st drive. Forced back to their 6 yard line by a long punt, quarterback Randy Koepke directed a 94 yard march which included 6 1st downs and a score from Pewaukee's 14 by Koenke. Randy passed to cousin Mike Koepke for a 2-point conversion.

Pewaukee came back with a 70-yard drive for their only score as Kurt Knudson took it over from the 5. A quarterback sneak for the 2 pointer fell short.

The 6'2" 187 pound soph tackle Laatsch led a revamped Kewaskum defense in the 2nd half. Mean Leon blocked a punt, knocked down a pass, sacked the quarterback and dropped 2 runners behind the line.

Laatsch's blocked punt in the 4th quarter allowed the Indians to score an insurance TD. They got the ball on Pewaukee's 25 and 4 plays later halfback Dale Flynn took it over. Kewaskum's 2nd touchdown had been scored in the 3rd period. It was scored by Koth before he was taken out for a rest. He capped a 70 yard drive with a 10 yard run through 2 tacklers. Koth now has run for over 700 yards, falling short of 100 yard games only once.

It was the Indians' defense which turned the tide in the 2nd half. Pewaukee runners got 103 yards in the 1st half but gained only 11 yards in the 3rd quarter and 3 yards in the last period. The Indian

defense has had only 12 points scored against them in 3 conference games.

Pewaukee was keyed up for the Indians and gave them a hard fought game.

In other contests besides the previously mentioned Germantown-Mayville game, Grafton upset Hartland in overtime, 13-6, and Slinger surprised Kettle Moraine, 42-8. (Kewaskum had beaten Slinger, 45-6).

This Friday night Kewaskum plays away again when they take on rival Mayville there. The Cards were undefeated until bumping into Germantown last week. This should be a barn burner. Other games are Hartland (the best 0-3 team in the league) at Kettle Friday, Germantown at Slinger Saturday afternoon and Pewaukee at Grafton Saturday afternoon.
