

man, William Peters, R. 1, was being held in jail by Ozaukee County authorities Saturday following a high speed chase that involved at least 15 police squad cars in three counties, several accidents, the running of several road blocks and numerous traffic violations.

Four squad cars were hit and damaged in the chase, including one Campbellsport squad car which was hit twice. A Kewaskum squad car and an Ozaukee County sheriff's car were also hit, as were two private vehicles in Grafton.

The incident began about 1:25 a. m. Saturday when a Kewaskum police officer attempted to stop the vehicle that carried stolen plates. The chase continued into the Village of Campbellsport where a road block had been set up by Campbellsport police and Fond du Lac county traffic police on County Trk.

However, the auto being chased went up onto lawns and struck the Campbellsport squad car as it came back on County Trunk V. Three squad cars then pursued the vehicle up to speeds of 95 miles per hour back toward Kewaskum.

The Campbellsport squad

A 26-year-old West Bend car attempted twice to cut the vehicle off but was struck again. Another squad was struck in Kewaskum and the case continued in Washington County where a road block was set up at County Trunk A and Indian Lore Road.

The vehicle pursued drove into a farm yard where a passenger got out and ran. The auto was driven onto the lawn and around the road block and striking the Kewaskum squad car.

At that point one shot was fired at the vehicle by Officer John Dobyns of the Fond du Lac County Traffic Police. The vehicle was now pursued into Ozaukee County where another road block was passed and an attempt to force the vehicle off the road in Waubeka failed.

The attempt to force the vehicle off the road resulted in extensive damage to an Ozaukee County squad car. The chase continued through Fredonia, Saukville and into Grafton where the vehicle being chased hit a car-traveling on the road and involved in a head-on collision with a parked car at Hwys. 60 and 57, which disabled the car and stopped it, ending the chase. There were no injuries.

Hank Rosenheimers Return From Lake, River Cruise on New Yacht, 'Sea Sharp'



Mr. and Mrs. Henry Rosenheimer recently returned from a lake and river trip on their new trawler, the "Sea Sharp."

The yacht is now berthed on Lake Guntersville, Alabama, the southernmost part of the Tennessee River in the Appalachian Mountains.

The route included down Lake Michigan from Sturgeon Bay to Chicago, the Des Plaines and Illinois river to the Mississippi above St. Louis. From Cairo, Ill. they traveled the Ohio to Paducah, Kentucky, where the Tennessee originates on beautiful Kentucky Lake, which is 100 miles long. They report southern hospitality to be really great

The christening of the power cruiser in the Gladstone, Mich. harbor last June was the fulfillment of a dream for Henry "Hank" Rosenheimer. About 50 friends and relatives from Kewaskum, other parts of Wisconsinl, and Delta County, Mich. attended the Rosenheimers christening party and luncheon at the Gladstone Yacht Club.

The idea of building his own boat and going down it to T. D. Vinette Shipbuild-Mississippi the originally came to Rosenheimer when he was in New Orleans as a young man of 18. Now he has done it.

The 45 ft. cruiser weighs by two English Perkins diesel engines. It is all steel construction with the interior trimmed in teak wood. The exterior has very little wood trim. It holds 500 gallons of diesel fuel, enough for a 1,000 mile cruising range.

Plans for the extended vessel originated in the Rasenheimers' basement in Kewaskum. They drew the actual, full-scale plan on the floor and later transferred to paper. Last fall they brought ers of Escanaba, Mich.

Rosenheimers had The known Vinette for about 12 years and they had seen various boats he had built around Lake Michigan. They decided about 25 tons and is powered long ago that when they did get around to building their own they wanted Vinette to do the job.

Rosenheimer searched all over the Eastern United States for a ship design that they really liked. They finally settled on the basic design now incorporated into the Sea Sharp and began the negotiations which have now been followed by construction, launching and christening.

For two weeks prior to the official launch, Rosenheimer said he had been Vinette's constant companion, "supervising, advising, criticizing and discussing" last minute details. "If I wasn't a dyedin-the-wool boater," Rosenheimer said, "I wouldn't spend this kind of money."

The cruiser is built for four people and is a selfcontained home. It has adequate sleeping quarters for eight people.

Rosenheimer has been boating all of his life and prefers sailing to cruising but his wife of 39 years "likes an even keel," so they compromised. At one time Hank said his wife was afraid of the water and "now she loves it as much or more than I do."

A music teacher, Mrs. Rosenheimer practically had the boat built around a two manual Conn organ. Her influence also becomes obvious in the naming of the "Sea Sharp" and the "B Flat," as they call the power dinghy carried on the boat.

Custom built for the Rosenheimers, the vessel includes guest quarters, a rear state room, dinette and galley, a living room and two heads. "You'll never see another one like it," Rosenheimer said.

Because of an old back injury, Rosenheimer has an allelectric system on the cruiser that includes an electric winch, take-in line and anchor, short and long range ra-

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dar and everything needed for safe cruising.

Hank is the third generation owner and operator, together with his cousin Lehman Rosenheimer, of a general department store that includes a food store, feed mill and elevator in Kewaskum, which this week is celebrating its 100th anniversary. Because he is still connected with the store, the Rosenheimers will cruise only several months out of the year, otherwise they would cruise "full-time."

In the future they plan on traveling the Chicago Water-way, Gulf Coast, Florida, East Coast, Hudson River, Lake Champien, Barge Canal and below the freeze line to Guntersville, Tenn.

The Schmidts want the land to be attached to the Kewaskum School District.

The appeal board will hear testimony on Nov. 12 and will accept information mailed to the appeal board before Nov. 8.





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

School Board Discusses North **Central Evaluation Procedures**

North Central evaluation procedures were an item of discussion at the Board of Ed ucation meeting held Monday evening, Oct. 14. Wayne Remmel and Jan Hubbell of the Long Range Planning Committee and Clark Pearson, High School Principal, were present to report on a recent meeting of the Planning Committee and the high school faculty steering committee.

It was reported that committees are formed and the faculty members have begun some work. Committees in the various areas will all include faculty, citizen and student members. There are 22 committees, one for each curricular area, plus committees on philosophy and objectives, school and community, curriculum, student activities, school facilities. school staff and administration, guidance services, and educational media services. The basic evaluation instrument to be used is the North Central Evaluative Criteria. Parts of an alternate form will be used where appropriate.

Steve Mann, School Social Worker, also attended the meeting and discussed the role of a school social worker. As time permits at future meetings, other staff members will be invited to discuss their program areas.

A budget report was scheduled, but no final action can be taken since equalized valuations have not yet been received from the state.

A brief building report was made. Classes are now being held in the new Farmington addition, and a target date of Nov. 11, has been set for holding the first classes in the new middle school. When the middle school is occupied the district will leave the split shift program which is now in its third year.

Approval was given to purchase new band instruments for the middle school and a spotlight for the dramatics department. The new band instruments will run approximately \$4,700, and the new spotlight \$700. Also authorized was the purchase of an audiometer to do hearing testing.

It was agreed to install a milk and a fruit drink machine at the high school on a trial basis.

The denial by the Agency School Committees of a petition to transfer some 350 acres of property from the Campbellsport school district has been appealed. The hearing on the appeal has been set for Nov. 12 in Madison.

Open House will be held ir all schools on Tuesday and Wednesday, Oct. 29 and 30. Parents are invited to visit schools and classes on those days.

Parent-teacher conferences will be held the evening of Nov. 4 in all schools, and also on the afternoon of Oct. 28 in the elementary schools. The Board adjourned to executive session to discuss

a personnel question.


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REGULAR MEETING OF SCHOOL BOARD MONDAY

Indians Give Germantown Scare But Are Nosed Out, 6-0, in Snow

Kewaskum gave unbeaten Germantown one heckuva ball game and came close to upsetting them in their important contest here Friday night before going down by a 6-0 score. It was the Warhawks' 16th victory in a row over 2 seasons.

An inch of snow covered the field prior to the game and even a fire department fogger failed to remove much of the snow at game time. The snow and wet field slowed down both teams.

Germantown is now alone in first place with a 5-0 mark. Grafton passed up Kewaskum and Mayville with a surprise 28-6 win over Mayville for a 4-1 record and second place. Kewaskum and Mayville dropped into a tie for 3rd with 3-2 . Hartland also moved up with a 40-20 victory over Slinger.

It was the 2nd tough loss in a row for the Indians, who were edged by one point, 15-14, at Mayville the week before.

Strong defensive efforts by both Kewaskum and Germantown, a power on defense. also held the score down. The only score of the game came in the 2nd quarter on a 37 yard run by Chris Canter, the conference's leading scorer, after the Indians had been forced to punt from near their own end zone. Germantown had earlier been stopped at the Kewaskum 12 after Scott Koth had fumbled a quick kick attempt for the Indians on their 21 yard line. Kewaskum couldn't move the ball, however, after stopping the Warhawk threat and the subsequent punt near the Indians' goal line set the stage for Canter's decisive run. The extra point kick was blocked by Don Gruber.

Kewaskum's only real scoring threat came with 5 minutes left in the game and gave them a good chance to pull out a victory. The Indians drove to the Germantown 12 yard line for a first and 10. On first down they ran for 5 more yards, making it 2nd and 5 on the Warhawks 7. Then, rather than stay on the ground, they chose to throw 3 straight passes, all of which were incomplete against a strong Germantown pass defense bunched up near the goal line. Germantown took over but was forced to punt. However, they stopped the Indians on the next series of downs and this enabled

them to run out the clock. Kurt Kreuter was the top ground gainer for German-town with 121 yards on 23

total yards, all of them rushing, while Kewaskum had 50 yards rushing and 71 passing for a total of 121. The Warhawks gained all of their 1st downs rushing and threw only 2 passes all night, both incomplete.

This Friday night the In-. dians play their 3rd game in a row against a tough opponent when they host Grafton in their homecoming game. As mentioned, Grafton is now in 2nd place with 4-1. Other games are Pewaukee at Slinger, Kettle Moraine at Mayville and Hartland at Germantown.
