



# Village Awarded State Grant of \$29,000 for Community Park Land

The Village of Kewaskum has been awarded a state grant for the acquisition of land for a community park, according to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

The grant, in the amount of \$29,000 from the ORAP-Local Park Aids Program, will be matched by local funds to acquire approximately 34.26-acres of land.

The area will be developed

to include areas for picnicking, parking, sports field, hiking and a tot lot area.

The new park site is located at the western end of Brooklane Drive at the western edge of the village.

The ORAP-LPA Program receives revenues from the state general fund which is reimbursed by a one cent per package cigarette tax. The program is administered by the DNR.

The Blackhawks had not allowed more than one touchdown per game since the season opener but the Indian offense dented it twice and the defense added another

Kewaskum stunned Graffon with 2 quick touchdowns in the opening minutes to take a 16-0 lead. Jim Bilgo took the opening kickoff from his own 13 to Grafton's 19. Three plays later Koth went in from the 8 and Randy and Mike Koepke added 2 points on a passing conversion. Grafton received the kick but on a third down

In an exciting homecoming play Dan Wanke forced a fumble and Mike Koepke scooped up the ball and romped 34 yards for a second quick score. R. Koepke again passed for 2 points, this time to John Kleinman.

But Grafton was not discouraged and came back with a drive with 6 first downs and a score by Kent Anderson. Ken Papala ran for 2 more points to make it 16-8 at the quarter.

Kewaskum again drove to the Blackhawks' 17 where it stalled. The two teams then traded fumbles in the tough game. Quarterback Jeff Kaul capped a second Grafton drive with a 20-yard pass to Rick Hubacek for a score but the conversion was stopped. This proved important later on. This left the Indians with a 16-14 haftime lead.

But Grafton almost pulled it out in the closing seconds. Kaul completed 2 passes to Hubacek and then threw a bomb to Reas who took it on the Indian's 8-yard line with one second left but time ran out.

This Friday night Kewaskum ends the season at Kettle Moraine. A victory would assure them of at least a tie for second place. In case Grafton would lose to Germantown and Mayville to Slinger, the Indians would take undisputed second. In the other game Hartland is at Pewaukee.
