
ceed with the work at once. Addressed to James Vanderleist, the letter stated that according to an original assurance, work on the crossing had been scheduled for work on the cross-

## Dems Sweep State, Republicans Win in County; 639 Votes Here

NELSON, KASTEN, HEPHNER WINNERS

A total of 639 votes were cast in the village Tuesday. This did not compare to the 964 votes in the presidential election two years agó but the vote was larger than anticipated.

Evidently there were many split ballots in the village as Democrats outpolled the Republicans for all of the state offices but the Republicans. led for all of the county offices except Clerk of Circuit Court.

Statewide Gov. Patrick Lucey scored a crushing win over William Dyke to capture

his second four-year term as Democrats also governor. swept other top state offices, took control of the Senate and widened their margin in the Assembly.

Democrat Gaylord Nelson also won decisively over his opponent, Thomas E. Petri. for his third six-year term as U.S. Senator.

Republican Robert Kasten survived the Democratic gale that swept across the state and nation to win the 9th District Congressional race over Democrat Lynn S. Adelman.

## Winter Parking Ordinance in Effect

A reminder that on Nov. 1 our winter parking ordinance went into effect.

Section 9.30 (1) of the Village Code restricts Winter Parking. No person shall park a vehicle on a public street or highway in the Village of Kewaskum from Nov. 1 to April 1 between the hours of midnight and 6:00 a. m., unless such person parks the vehicle in accordance with the following:

(a) On the even numbered side of the street or highway on those dates which bear an even calendar date at 12 o'clock midnight.

(b) On the odd numbered side of the street or highway on those dates which bear an odd calendar date at 12 o'clock p. m.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in adjourned session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

AND WHEREAS, in this instance, literal application of said Section 31.062(13) would work an extraordinary hardship on said Ideal Land, Inc., and substantial justice would be done and the public interest secured by varying the provisions of said section as hereinafter set forth,

THEREFORE, a variance to the provisions of Section 31.026 (13) of the Subdivision and Platting Ordinance of the Village of Kewaskum shall be granted to Ideal Land, Inc. for the development of "Ideal Subdivision No. 1" in that the value of the guarantee be changed from \$10,000.00 to 20% of the total installation costs of sanitary sewers, water mains, storm sewers, streets and all appurtenances thereto, said

guarantee to be in the form of a cash deposit, deposited with the Village Clerk from September 16, 1974, through December 31, 1975, said period to be in lieu of the three (3) year requirement in said section; all other provisions of said Section 31.062(13) to remain unchanged.

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into this 16th day of September, 1974, by and between IDEAL LAND, INC., a Wisconsin corporation, West Bend, Wisconsin, hereinafter referred to as the "Corporation"; and the VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, a Wisconsin municipal corporation, Kewaskum, Wisconsin, referred to as the "Village";

WHEREAS, the Corporation has presented to the Village for final approval a plat of a proposed subdivision to be named 'Ideal Subdivision No. 1' and being a plat of lands within the boundaries of the Village of Kewaskum;

AND WHEREAS, the Village has a subdivision and platting ordinance, said ordinance being number 72-5 and being Chapter 31 of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum;

AND WHEREAS, said subdivision and platting ordinance, said ordinance being number 72-5 and being Chapter 31 of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum;

AND WHEREAS, said subdivision and platting ordinance in Section 31.062 (13) requires a guarantee for a period of three (3) years following the completion and acceptance of improvements required and made under the terms of said Ordinance insuring the good quality of materials, workmanship and maintenance of all sanitary sewers, water mains, storm sewers, streets and all appurtenances thereto;

AND WHEREAS, the Village of Kewaskum has granted the Corporation a variance in reference to Section 31.062 (13) of said subdivision and plafting ordinance, which then requires said Corporation to file with the Village of Kewaskum a cash deposit amounting to twenty (20%) percent of the total installation cost of the aforesaid improvements for a period beginning the 16th day of September, 1974, up to and including the 31st day of December, 1975, to guarantee the cost of repairs of any improvements required to be installed by the Corporation in Ideal Land, Inc. Subdivision No. 1 in said Village of Kewaskum (interest on said escrowed funds to inure to said Corporation);

AND WHEREAS, the total installation cost of the aforesaid improvements did not exceed Forty-eight Thousand \$48,000.00) Dollars, said amount having been accepted by the Village of Kewaskum Engineer as the amount the costs of said installation will not exceed;

AND WHEREAS, the Corporation desires to make a cash deposit to guarantee the good quality of materials and workmanship of such installations and the maintenance thereof for a period of one year after acceptance by the Village of Kewaskum Engineer;

NOW THEREFORE: In consideration of the Village of Kewaskum through its Village Engineer accepting said installations as being in substantial compliance and upon the Corporations's assurance that complete compliance will be given in accordance with the agreement entered into by the Village of Kewaskum and the Corporation under date of May 13, 1974, and authorizing its municipal officers and agents to issue building permits in the Corporation's subdivision (providing other requirements for the issuance of building permits have been compiled with);

The Corporation agrees to keep on deposit with the Clerk of the Village of Kewaskum the sum of Nine Thousand Six Hundred (\$9,-600.00) Dollars of Account No. 71-00-2942 now on deposit in the Valley Bank of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, for the purpose of insuring through the 31st day of December, 1975, the good quality of materials, workmanship and maintenance of its installations under the terms of the May 13th, 1974 agreenent hereinbefore referred o and to insure that any maintenance work that may have to be made shall be made and paid for by the Corporation.

The Corporation further agrees that should the Village of Kewaskum Engineer find need to have maintenance work performed that such shall be reasonably performed and the Village of Kewaskum Engineer shall not unreasonably demand such maintenance work nor delay certification to the Village Board of the termination of the year period on the various installations made by the Corporation.

The Village of Kewaskum agrees to permit withdrawal by the Corporation after May 16th, 1975, of all amounts in said savings account above referred to in excess of Nine Thousand Six Hundred (\$9,600.00) Dollars. The interest earned on the balance remaining in said savings account shall inure to the Corporation.

The Corporation and Village mutually agree to each faithfully perform and comply through its officers, agents, contractors and subcontractors with all of the provisions of the said Section 31.062 which are applicable to this particular project.
