Bicentennial Plans

Chief Kewaskum and the the part he played in the history of the village will just be one of the many projects of Kewaskum's Bicentennial Committee under the direction of L. S. Peterson.

What is bicentennial? The American Revolution Bicentennial is the celebration honoring the 200th birthday of the United States of America. In 1976 the United States will observe not only the 200th Anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence but two centuries of nationhood and the beginning of a third century.

The official celebration will be divided into three parts: Heritage 76, Festival USA and Horizons 76; the past, present and future.

The committee thus far has included Charles Miller who has assumed the duties of temporary chairman, and representatives from the following organizations: Chamber of Commerce, Kiwanis, Lions, Woman's Club, Jr. Woman's Club, Legion, Teacchers and Secretaries. The Village Board, Town Board and Regal Ware also were represented.

Projects discussed include a history of Kewaskum in book form which in fact is already off the ground with a local high school student, Mark Smucker, doing much of the research. Mark has run several news articles asking for information from local people that may help him compile a complete history.

Other projects to be pursued include a local museum, a Worship Week for the churches, a pageant to cele-brate the event in 1976, band concerts, flying the flag for the entire 1976 year, the designing of a flag for Kewaskum, and possibly collecting pennies from school children to buy bricks for a building in the proposed park project.

The bicentennial is a oncein-a-lifetime opportunity for every individual to step outside his or her routine and get involved with history. Youth Apprehended for Holding Local Woman at Knifepoint

A 17-year-old rural Kewaskum youth was apprehended Tuesday afternoon for holding a 20-year-old Kewaskum woman at knifepoint and forcing her to drive him into the Town of Auburn Monday.

According to Police Chief Don Hlavaty, the youth was released to the custody of his parents pending an appearance in Washington County juvenile court. Hlavaty said he saw the youth in town on Monday and that description matched the one furnished by the young woman.

According to the police report, the young woman was sitting in her parked car about 2:50 p. m. ahead of the Behnke Insurance Agency at 1304 Fond du Lac Avenue, faced north. The youth was walking on the sidewalk headed south. As he approached her car, he jumped into the passenger seat and with a hunting knife in his hand, ordered her to drive.

Headed north out of town, he ordered her to turn left on County Trunk V but she was too far past to make the turn so he told her to keep on going. Several miles farther on Highway 45, he ordered her to turn east on Auburn-

Ashford Road and they continued on it until he ordered the young woman to turn on Pine Lane.

She had gone somewhat past, but she backed her car and made the turn as ordered. It is a dead end road but she was directed to just keep on going. About 200 yards farther was a farmer on a tractor which was pulling a wagon. When the young woman's car came side by side with the tractor, she jumped out onto the tongue of the wagon and she asked the driver for help. At that point, her abductor slid into the driver's seat and attempted to drive away. When the farmer saw the back-up lights go on, he dropped the wagon and blocked the road with it. The farmer and the young woman ran to the nearest home to call Kewaskum police and Chief Hlavaty responded. The adductor took off into the Bill Ruth Tree Farm.

Washington County and Fond du Lac County officers were called and the section was sealed off. About 10 to 15 officers along with some citizens searched the woods but the youth could not be found. The area is in Fond du Lac County.

Man Killed, In Car Crash

A rural West Bend man, who apparently fell asleep at the wheel and crashed into a utility pole, became Washington County's 18th traffic fatality this year Sunday morning.

Otis E. Miller, 54, R. 2, West Bend, was dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Community Hospital. He died from crushing chest injuries and internal bleeding, according to authorities.

The three passengers in Miller's station wagon were injured. Theima Wells, 27, R. 6. West Bend, received minor injuries and was treated at Community Hospital. The other two passengers, Homer Justman, 30, of rural Kewaskum, and Mrs. Sonja Olson, 31, R. 2, West Bend, suffered head injuries and were transferred to Columbia Hospital, Milwaukee.

Mrs. Olson reportedly is Miller's daughter.

According to the the accident occurred at 5:24 a. m. Sunday when Miller, traveling north on Main St in West Bend, apparently fell asleep, drifted across the center line and off the road, and struck a utility pole at the northwest corner of the intersection with Park Avenue.

Man Sentenced For High Speed Chase in Area

William Peters, 27, of R1, West Bend, pleaded guilty to charges arising out of a high speed chase around the area Oct. 19.

The chase involved about 15 squad cars in three counties. Peters hit four squad cars and ran several roadblocks before his car was disabled in a head-on collision with a private car in Grafton.

Peters pleaded guilty to two counts of hit and run and one charge of fleeing an officer. He was found guilty of all three charges. Various other citations against him were

dismissed.

Peters was sentenced to pay a \$100 fine plus nine dollars court costs or spend 33 days in jail on each hit-andrun charge. He was sentenced to one year in jail for fleeing an officer, but the sentence was stayed and he was placed on probation for two years.

Conditions of probation include paying restitution to the police jurisdictions for damage to their squad cars and paying nine dollars court costs. He must spend non-working hours in jail for the first six months under the Huber law.

Peters' driver's license was revoked for one year.

The chase began when a Kewaskum police officer tried to stop Peters for driving a car with stolen license plates. Instead he drove away. Police chased him up to Campbellsport and back to Kewaskum at 95 miles an hour. He cut through Washington County to Ozaukee County. The chase continued through Fredonia and Saukville before Peters was stopped by the accident in Grafton.

The pursuit included police and sheriff's units from Kewaskum, Fond du Lac County, Campbellsport, Washington County, Ozaukee County, West Bend, Saukville and the Village of Grafton.

(2) Certified Survey Map. Any person desiring to accomplish a lot division shall file with the Plan Commission a certified survey map and 5 acceptable copies thereof together with a written application for approval at least 5 days prior to the meeting of the Plan Commission at which action is desired.

(3) Public Hearing. The Plan Commission may schedule a public hearing on the proposed lot division before taking action. In such case, the Village Clerk shall give such notice of the proposed lot division to property owners within the area in which the lot division is proposed as shall be deemed necessary.

(4) Review of Division. The proposed lot division shall be reviewed by the
