Higher Tax Rate Proposed For Village of Kewaskum

A 1975 budget calling for a gross tax rate of \$39.56 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation, up \$2.03 from 1974, is being proposed for taxpayers in the Village of Kewaskum.

However, Village Commissioner Bill Martin has been advised that the village can expect state tax credit funds of \$88,349, which is projected to amount to a reduction locally of \$5.48 per \$1,000 for a net tax rate of \$34.07, on which tax bills are ultimately paid.

The net rate, however, would be up \$2.73 over 1974 when the gross rate was \$37.53; the state tax credit was \$6.19 and the net rate was \$31.34 per \$1,000 valuation. This means the owner of a home assessed at \$20,000 will be paying \$54.60 more in taxes under the proposed budget figures.

The amount to be received in state tax credit will be certified to the village in early December, in time for the new tax bills.

The village board has scheduled a public hearing on the budget for 7:30 p. m. on Monday, Dec. 2 and plans to take final action at the board meeting that will fol-

low. The proposed budget totals \$1,170,455.51 which is \$125,471.31 higher than 1974 and calls for a tax levy of \$827,280.26 which is \$89,507.34 higher than last year.

The \$39.56 tax rate apportionments \$10.58 for village purposes (up \$1.40); \$4.62 for county (down 60 cents); \$22.30 for local school district (up \$1.12); \$1.70 for vocational school (up five cents); and 36 cents for state (up six cents). Included in the state portion is \$1,000 for handicapped school tuition.

Martin stated that the current total assessed valuation of the village so far is only a calculated figure because the assessing of manufacturers' equipment has been removed from local tax rolls by the state. The state gives a full value of manufacturers' equipment which must be equated by each municipality to its assessment rate. Properties in Kewaskum are assessed at about 65 per cent of value, Martin said.

The assessed valuation of Kewaskum is now estimated at \$20,912,770 compared with an actual \$19,658,743 last year.

Win Appeal for Attachment To Kewaskum School District

Mr. and Mrs. Warren Schmidt of R. 2, Campbellsport, won their appeal with the State Department of Public Instruction to have some 300 acres of property transferred from the Campbellsport School District to the Kewaskum District.

After losing an earlier detachment petition request in September from the two involved state agencies, Cooperative Educational Service Agencies (CESA) No. 13 and 16, the Schmidts took their case to Madison last Tuesday and by a 3-2 vote, the detachment request was approved.

CESA representatives from Ashland, Beloit and Cedarburg voted for the detachment, while the Tomahawk CESA voter and Assistant Superintendent of Schools in the State of Wisconsin voted against the move.

The land involved is located near Auburn Lake some of which is owned by the state, while the Schmidts own a large portion. There are also cottages on a lake on the property but none of the cottage owners are permanent residents. The land borders the old Kewaskum School District boundary line.

Only two children, Lisa Schmidt, eighth grader, and Eric Schmidt, high school student, will be affected by the detachment.

At the hearing Tuesday,

the Schmidt family spoke in favor of the detachment while Campbellsport School Supt. Leo Lang spoke against it. Kewaskum's Supt. Floyd Brenholdt also spoke, telling the committee that his board did not approve of gaining any additional property or losing any. Several Campbellsport board members were at the hearing but did not testify.

Mr. and Mrs. Warren Schmidt were very happy with the decision. Schmidt said he was looking forward to having his children attend the Kewaskum schools and would be very happy to help the Kewaskum board or the district in any way he could to continue good education.

The Schmidts, who moved to rural Campbellsport over a year ago, had made attempts to bring about changes in the Campbellsport School system and said when it became evident to them that they could not bring about the changes they sought, they petitioned for detachment.

The Schmidt's son Eric wishes to study medicine. They wished for him that he would be able to take advantage of additional science and language courses and seminars offered at Kewaskum.

The detachment will take place in 30 days, at which time the two children will be transferred to the Kewaskum Schools.

School Bus Disciplinary Problems Aired at School Board Meeting

There were five representatives of the Johnson School Bus Company at the School Board meeting held at the school business office at 8:00 p. m. Monday, Nov. 18. They had been invited by the School Board to give the members some first hand information on the school bus disciplinary problems.

Erv Gorecki, the supervisor of the Johnson School Bus Company here in Kewaskum, stated that there was only a small percentage of children that were the trouble makers on the buses but these were the ones that endangered the lives of the drivers and the other students by distracting the driver. The bus driver's job is to drive the bus in as safe a manner as possible and not spend too much time or attention on discipline.

It was decided by the board, that if a violation of safe conduct on the bus was recorded by the driver on a Misconduct Report, the student and the parents would be notified and a 3 day suspension would be in order. If another violation occurs after the initial suspension, the parents and the student will appear before the board. The board will then make the decision if the student should be suspended permanently from riding the school bus.

The Middle School cabinets for the clothing and books of the students was discussed. Five carpenters from the area were contacted

regarding construction of the cabinets. The Geidel Brothers from Fillmore-Newburg agreed to build them at a cost of \$325.00 per unit. Each unit would be large enough for 16 students. The board suggested that students in the woodworking shop may be able to build them as a semester project. A committee was appointed and empowered to make a final decision on the cabinets.

A report on the Speech Therapy Program, by Mrs. Pat Baker and Miss Lora Knebel, speech therapists for the Kewaskum Schools was presented to the board. The school's new audiometer for testing hearing discrepancies was demonstrated. Dick Zarling, director of Elementary Education, said that all kindergarten children and transfer students will be tested along with any students that are referred by their teachers as possibly having a hearing discrepancy.

Three sets of snow tires and wheels purchased by the school in previous years for the drivers' education cars that no longer fit the cars now in use will be put up for sale at Honeck Chevrolet Garage and will also be advertised in the Newsletter.

A discussion of phonics versus sight reading for elementary grades will be discussed at the Dec. 16 meeting.

The board adjourned to executive session to discuss a personnel question.

70 Local Students on Tour of Washington, D.C., New York City

Seventy Kewaskum High School juniors and seniors, accompanied by chaperones, spent five days over the teachers convention vacation Nov. 6 - 10 on a tour of Washington, D.C. and New York City.

The group left Mitchell Field, Milwaukee, via jet Wednesday afternoon and arrived in Washington, D.C. at approximately 7 p. m., where they immediately boarded buses for a night tour of Washington. Included was a stop at the Marine Memorial (flag raising at Iwo Jima) and then a drive around Capitol Hill to see the beautifully illuminated Capitol Building before arriving at their hotel.

Thursday morning they proceeded to Alexandria, Va. to see Christ Church where George Washington attended services. They continued along Mt. Vernon Memorial Highway to Mt. Vernon where they roamed the grounds and saw the home of George and Martha Washington, their tomb and other interesting exhibits associated with this National Shrine. The next stop was Arlington National Cemetery, where lie thousands who served their nation. They witnessed the impressive

change-of-guard ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and spent a quiet moment at the gravesites of President and Senator Kennedy. The next stop was at the Washington Monument, 555 feet high for a magnificent view of Washington D.C. The balance of the afternoon was spent at the Smithsonian Institution, where they saw thousands of priceless museum pieces.

In the evening they visited the Pentagon Building, then on to the Archives Building for a glimpse of the original Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States. The next stop was Jefferson Memorial and Lincoln Memorial. Also scheduled on the evening tour was a visit to the Tidal Basin to see the illuminated government buildings and fountains, a visit to Old Georgetown and the JFK Center for the Performing Arts.

Friday morning the first stop was at the Bureau of Engraving and Printing to see paper money, bonds and stamps printed. Then on to Capital Hill for a tour of the Supreme Court, Capital Building to see the Senate and/or House of Representatives.

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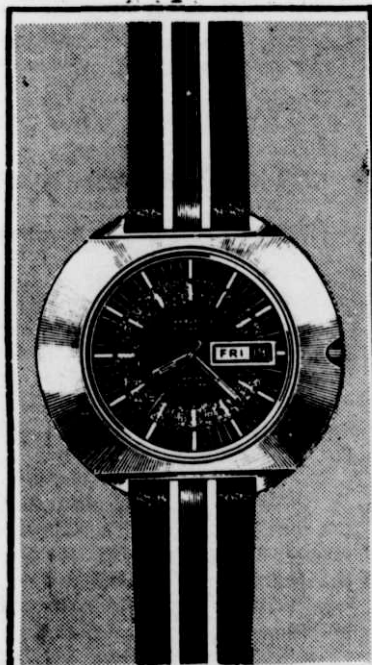
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Volm - Korpela Wedding

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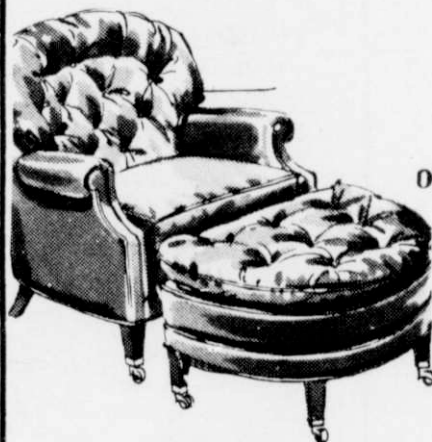

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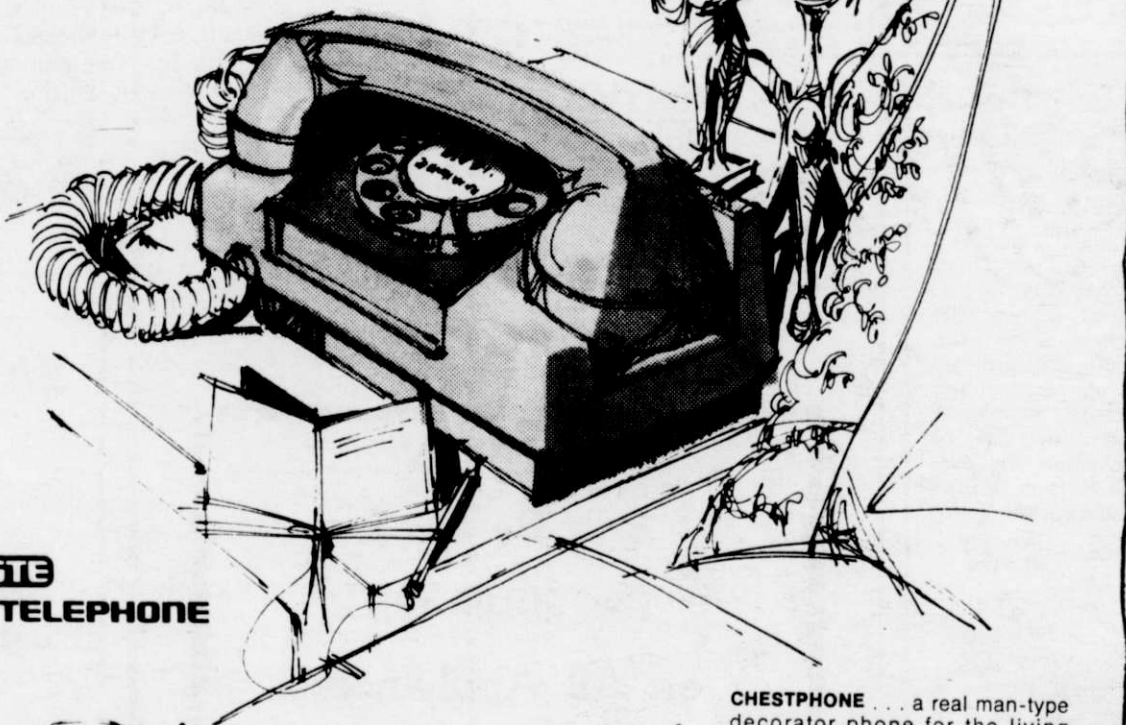
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R. Oppermann, Others Pass On

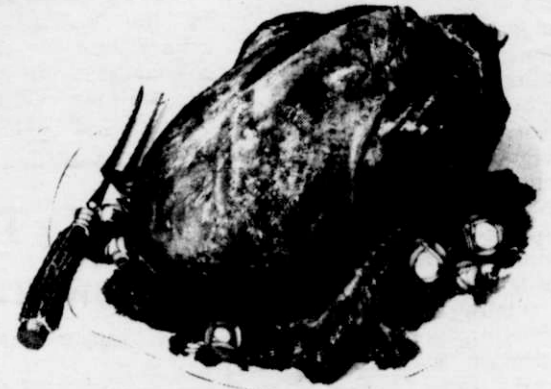

School Board Hears Reports on Injury at School

The Kewaskum Board of Education heard reports by Ken Erickson on an injury at the Middle School at its meeting Monday evening, Nov. 11. It also acted on a request by Mrs. Martin to delay her retirement, heard citizen comments on the school calendar, and heard other citizens discuss bussing problems.

Erickson's report indicated Brian Jeske was hurt when some of the students were chasing each other. He tried to jump the hedge in front of the building, tripped and landed on the sidewalk. Apparently there had been some "horseplay" and the chasing began. Mrs. Jeske had no

comments on the report. The Board questioned whether teachers were on duty. Erickson reported six were on supervision duty, but it appeared no one was outside at that time.

The request by Mrs. Martin to teach beyond age 65 was refused. The Board felt that they had not let anyone else teach beyond 65, and did not wish to set a precedent of granting allowances to teach beyond 65.

A discussion was held concerning the possibility of beginning school after Labor Day next year. It was stated in reply that the calendar is a negotiable item, and that the Board could not simply set the calendar. It was agreed that a questionnaire be put in the Newsletter to determine preferences of the community. It was also pointed out that if school begins later in the fall then it would have to run late in the summer.

The Board authorized the certification of tax levies to the various municipalities based on the levy voted at the annual meeting. The information needed to determine final state aids has not been received yet, and the state has advised districts to proceed with certifying levies, and to calculate aids and final budgets at a later time.

The Board changed its Nov. 25 meeting to Nov. 18, and expressed its thanks and commendation to the Middle School students for their work in moving the Middle School equipment.

A discussion was held on a number of topics, including the Middle School lockers, bus capacities and bus discipline problems. Parents were encouraged to submit bus and other problems to

school administrators. It was suggested that students who are consistent offenders, along with their parents, may have to be called before the Board, and possibly removed from the busses. The Board asked to have some bus drivers and the principals at the next meeting to discuss problems.

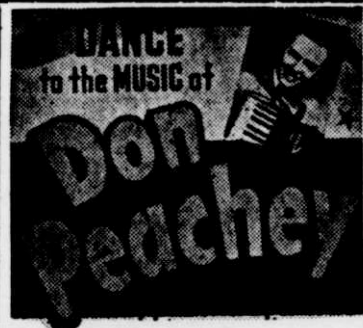

NOTICE

The Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, will hold a public hearing in the Council Room of the Municipal Building at 7:30 P. M. on Monday evening November 25, 1974, on the following proposed amendments to the Village of Kewaskum Subdivision and Platting Ordinance:

Section 1. Section 31.042 of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum is hereby repealed.

Section 2. Section 31.042 of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum is hereby re-enacted to read as follows:

31.042 LAND DIVISIONS OTHER THAN SUBDIVISIONS.

(1) Definition. A lot division shall be the division of any parcel of land within the Village for purpose of sale or building development. It shall not include:

(a) Transfers of interests in land by will or pursuant to court order.

(b) Leases for a term not to exceed 10 years, mortgages or easements.

(c) The sale or exchange of parcels of land between owners of adjoining property if additional lots are not thereby created, and the lots resulting are not reduced below the minimum sizes required by this chapter or other applicable laws or ordinances.

(2) Certified Survey Map. Any person desiring to accomplish a lot division shall file with the Plan Commission a certified survey map and 5 acceptable copies thereof together with a written application for approval at least 5 days prior to the meeting of the Plan Commission at which action is desired.

(3) Public Hearing. The Plan Commission may schedule a public hearing on the proposed lot division before taking action. In such case, the Village Clerk shall give such notice of the proposed lot division to property owners within the area in which the lot division is proposed as shall be deemed necessary.

(4) Review of Division. The proposed lot division shall be reviewed by the

Plan Commission for conformity with the provisions of this chapter and the Zoning Code and the official map and the master street plan of the Village.

(5) Access To Streets Required. No proposed lot division shall be approved unless the resulting lots front on a dedicated street at least 66 feet in width, as shown on the official map.

(6) Action On Application. The Plan Commission and Village Board shall within 40 days of application, approve, approve conditionally or reject the proposed lot division. The applicant shall be notified in writing of any conditions of approval or the reasons for rejection.

(7) Compliance With Statutes. The Certified Survey Map shall comply with Section 236.34 Wis. Stats., which is adopted by reference as part of this section.

(8) Consent And Waiver. Prior to acceptance of a certified survey map the subdivider shall furnish to the Village of Kewaskum a Consent And Waiver of the statutory provisions for the installation of sanitary sewer, sewer laterals, water main, water laterals, curb and gutter, storm sewer, street surfacing, sidewalk, and electrical distribution for street lighting to be in a form approved by the Village Clerk and shall be recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds in the same manner as a Lis Pendens. Such Consent And Waiver shall provide that the installation of such services shall be made at the discretion of the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum.

(9) Other Utilities. All

other utilities necessary for lands described on a certified survey map shall be of the type described in Section 31.062(6) and (7) of this Ordinance and installed by the subdivider.

(10) Park Fees. Prior to the issuance of a building permit on lands described on a certified survey map the owner of said land shall pay Two Hundred and No/100 (\$200.00) Dollars per residential unit to be erected, for park, recreation or open space use or development. Such fees shall be used in accordance with the provisions of Section 31.081 of this Ordinance.

Section 3. Repeal and re-create the first sentence of Section 31.062(1) of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum to read as follows:

31.062 FACILITIES AND IMPROVEMENTS.

(1) Required to be Installed. Before final approval of a plat other than a certified survey map the subdivider shall install street and utility improvements as hereinafter provided.

Section 4. Repeal and re-create Section 31.062(2) of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum to read as follows:

31.062 FACILITIES AND IMPROVEMENTS.

(2) Streets. After the installation of all utilities, the subdivider shall surface all roadways and streets proposed to be dedicated to the widths prescribed by these regulations and/or comprehensive plan or comprehensive plan components. Said surfacing shall include both base material and wearing course and said surfacing shall be done in accordance with plans and standard specifications approved by the Village Engineer.

Section 5. Repeal and re-create Section 31.062(13) of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum to read as follows:

31.062 FACILITIES AND IMPROVEMENTS.

(13) Dedication and Guarantee. All facilities and improvements installed prior to the final approval of the plat shall be considered dedicated along with streets and other public areas upon the approval of the plat. Facilities and improvements completed under bond or other financial guarantee after the approval of the plat shall be considered dedicated upon their approval and acceptance and release of the bond or other guarantee. The required improvements in the subdivision shall be guaranteed for a period of one year following the completion and acceptance of such improvements. In order to insure the good quality of materials, workmanship and maintenance of all sanitary sewers, water mains, storm sewers, streets and all appurtenances thereto, the subdivider shall provide a guarantee bond or other satisfactory financial guarantee to the Village of Kewaskum in the amount of twenty per cent (20%) of the total installation cost of the aforesaid improvements as determined by the Village Engineer, for a period of one year after completion of construction and written acceptance by the Village Engineer.

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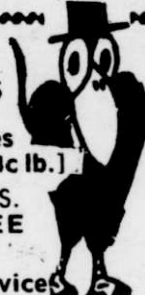

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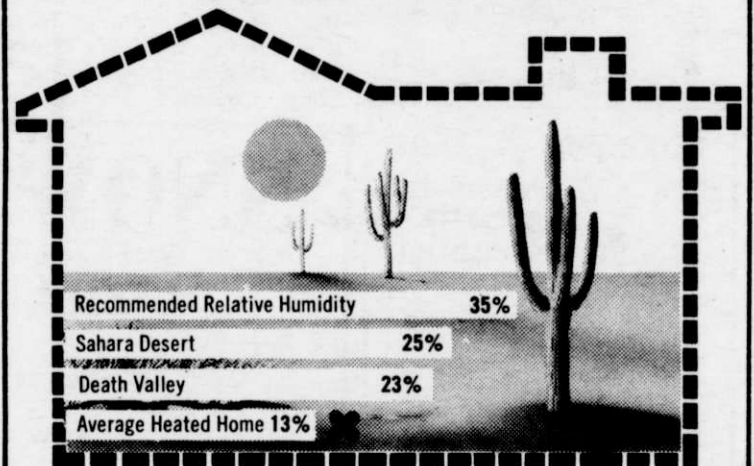
