Ralph Matenaer owns and operates a 180 acre dairy farm near Boltonville. His soil and water conservation program consists of 95 acres of contour strip cropping,

of the Orchard Grove neighborhood drainage project. He is applying 152 acres of conservation crop rotations to coincide with the soil and slope capability of the land. Ralph has also provided for wildlife on his farm by preserving ten acres of wooded upland and 12 acres of wooded wetland,

Howard Proeber owns and operates a 250 acre farm near Kohlsville and rents several more farms. He was recognized as an outstanding dairy farmer as well as a cooperator in Soil Conserva-

tion program. His herd of 51 registered Holstein cows have an average of 17,961 pounds of milk and 680 pounds of butter fat. His conservation program includes: 14,700 ft. of tile with another 5,000 planned; 1,500 ft. of grass waterway, a pond, 6 acres of woodland management, 190 conservation crop rotation and 70 acres of strips on a rented farm.

SUBSCRIPTION PRICES GOING UP

Due to ever increasing production costs and postal rates the subscription price for the Kewaskum Statesman will be raised to \$5.00 per year in the State of Wisconsin and to \$6.00 per year outside of Wisconsin beginning Dec. 1, 1974. Single copies are 15 cents at the three news stand outlets (Sentry Foods, Rosenheimer Store and Corner Drugs). This is the first raise in price in almost five years for subscribers although costs have increased steadily, making the raise necessary. Most other newspapers have already raised their price.

Attends Farm And Industry Short Course

Two hundred and fourteen students are enrolled in the first session of the College of Agricultural and Life Scien-ces 1974-75 Farm and Industry Short Course at Madison, according to Maurice E. White, assistant dean and director of short courses.

These students have come from 49 Wisconsin counties, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Finland, Lebanon and Iceland.

The short course program is designed to prepare young people for careers in farm ing and in industries related to farming, White says.



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
Fritz Receives **Degree at MSOE**


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

The organization is promoting its subject of interest through public programs and special field trips.

There has become increased demand for physicists in teaching plus government and business partially because of need for researchers to discover new sources of clean energy. And at Stevens Point, the subject has received a special boost by the installation of 1 of the world's largest lasers, worth about \$750,000, with which professors & students are assisting sors and students are issisting Wausau-based research firm attempting to perfect ways to create energy from such a device.

KEWASKUM STATESMAN GOV. LUCEY Requests **County Be Declared Crop Disaster Area**

Governor Patrick J. Lucey has asked the federal government to declare four more Wisconsin counties-Vernon Ozaukee, Washington and Milwaukee - disaster areas because of crop losses this year.

Lucey's requests to Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz were made so area farmers can receive low-cost disaster loans and other types of assistance from the Farmers Home Administration. In his letters to Butz, Luc-

ey said:

* In Vernon County, a wet spring, followed by summer drought and killing frosts on Sept. 21 and 22, affected more than 15,000 acres of corn tnd hay.

* In Ozaukee County, killing frosts on Sept. 21 and 22 affected more than 23,000 acres of corn, soybeans, green beans and red beets.

In Washington County, killing frosts on Sept 21 and 22 affected more than 25,000 acres of corn, soybeans and

• In Milwaukee County, killing frosts on Sept. 21, 22 and 23 affected more than 8,000 acres of corn, soybeans fruits and vegetables.

The Governor has now requested disaster aid for 48 counties this year because of a wet spring, summer drought, hail and early, killing frosts.

Only five of those requests for Green, LaFayette, Richland, Iowa and Sauk Counties-have been approved by Butz. Lucey has on many occasions, voiced displeasure over Butz's inability to move quickly on the re-

quests.

Junior Gary Schmidt sewed up the match with a 2-0 win in the 167 lb. match, which gave the Indians a 3-point lead. Kewaskum also won on a forfeit in the heavyweight division.

Bob Marx at 105 lbs. who subbed for Pat Braun, who did not make weight, won on a quick 45 second pin. Dan Braun at 138 lost a close one at the final buzzer on a 2 point reversal.
