Kiwanians Give \$77,000 for New Park



The Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum presented the village with a check for \$77,000 at their meeting last Monday to be used for the purchase of land and development of a new park. It is possibly the largest donation in recent state history by a service club to a municipality.

Village President Charles Miller accepted the donation on behalf of the village. The funds will be used to purchase and develop a 35acre site on Kewaskum's southwest side.

The large donation by the Kiwanis is the result of years of fund-raising activities by the organization. The bulk of the money was raised since the early 1950's at the annual Kiwanis Turkey Shoot.

A foundation was estab-

lished within the club to handle funds that were added each year to the general fund. L. N. Peterson is president of the foundation.

The village has been notified that it will have a similar amount of state and federal matching funds through the Land and Water Conservation (LAWCON) program and ORAP 200 for development of the park.

The Kiwanis Club committed the \$77,000 donation to the village on April 22 of this year and last Monday the check for that amount was formally presented.

The decision to donate the large fund to the village followed an adoption of a recreation plan in September of 1973.

The village has a one-year

option with Mrs. Viola Spoerl for purchase of 35 acres for the new park. The option comes due this month. The village board has already approved a contract with Arthur and Associates of Fond du Lac to work on drawing up a park plan.

The park is to include ball diamonds, tennis courts and a swimming facility among other things.

KHS Senior, Two Other Area Young People Killed in Accidents

Two area youths died in separate traffic accidents in Washington County over the Thanksgiving holiday.

Killed were Patrick Kelly McCambridge, 17. a senior at Kewaskum High School, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Mc-Cambridge, R. 1, Kewaskum, and Joel J. Kumrow, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ivan Kumrow, 3433 Cranberry Road, Random Lake.

In a third one car accident in the county early Thanksgiving Day a West Bend young lady was also killed on County NN in the Town Polk. She was Joan F. O'Meara, 23 daughter of Mrs. Rose O'Meara, 725 Elm St. The accidents bring the county's traffic toll to 25 for 1974, three more than last year.

McCambridge was killed when he was apparently hit by a car while skateboarding near his home. The accident occurred at 1:56 p.m. Wednesday on Valley View Road in the Town of Farmington. The driver of the car, Herb-ert N. Donath, 30, R. 6, West Bend, said he was going about 20 to 25 miles an hour when he came over the hill and saw a person lying on his stomach on his side of the road. Donath braked and tried to turn to the right but struck McCambridge, who was dragged about 500 feet. Donath was not aware Mc-Cambridge was under the wheels. A skate board was found next to the victim.

Kumrow was killed in a one-car accident at 12:11 a. m. Friday. His car apparently skidded out of control on snowy Beaver Dam Rd. The car crossed the centerline and other lane. left the road and struck a tree. Kumrow's father, Ivan, is a Washington County Soil Conservationist and his mother is a receptionist and secretary to John Tessar at Regal Ware, Inc., Kewaskum.

Patrick Kelly McCambridge, a resident of 21/2 miles northeast of St. Michaels for three years, formerly of Nashotah. Wis., was born Oct. 4, 1957 in Milwaukee. He was a part time employee of the J. D. Griffith Company, West Bend.

He is survived by his parents, Clifford and Darlene Mehlke McCambridge; three sisters, Toni Lynn, Coleen Marie and Wendy Ann; one brother, Brian Michael, all at home; his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Meta Mehlke, rural Hartford; his paternal grandmother, Mrs. Ella Mc-Cambridge, Milwaukee; uncles, aunts and other relatives.

Visitation at Miller's Funeral Home, Kewaskum, was Saturday from 11 a.m. to the time of services at. 2 p. m. Rev. Daniel Schowalter officiated and burial was in Lutheran Memorial Park, Kewaskum.


Joel James Kumrow was born Jan. 8, 1956 at Sheboygan. He attended Batavia Grade School and was graduated from Random Lake High School in June of this year

Indians Defeat Campbellsport, West Bend East

Kewaskum won two nonconference games away from home last week, defeating Campbellsport of the Flyway Conference Tuesday 74-56, and edging West Bend East of the Little Ten Conference in a barn-burner Wednesday, 69-68

In meetings last week, Scenic Moraine teams made a clean sweep over Little Ten Schools. Besides the Indians' win over West Bend East, Grafton beat both West Bend West and West Bend East and Hartland defeated Hartford, all in close contests.

After holding only a 5-point lead at halftime at Campbellsport, the Indians' full court press and depth in the second half guided them to a comfortable 18-point victory. 'After a slow start by both teams, Kewaskum was on top by 1 point at the quarter, 17-16. Three baskets shortly before the half gave them a 38-33 lead at the intermission.

The Indians made some adjustments in the second half and scored 8 straight points to go out in front by 11. The Cougars got to within 4 but Kewaskum again came up with 6 straight and led at the 3rd guarter, 55-49. before gradually pulling a-way in the last period in which they outscored the Cougars, 19-7.

Mike Koepke was the game's high scorer with 17 points and had 12 rebounds. Don Gruber scored 16 and had 11 boards. Serwe led Campbellsport with 11 and soph Dan Gellings had 10. Kewaskum shot 40 per cent and the Cougars 38.

Kewaskum's JV's also won over Campbellsport, 61-49. Leon Laatsch led the way

with 21 points. In Wednesday's game at West Bend East in the West Bend fieldhouse, in the first game ever played between the two schools, Gruber hit with 20 seconds left, giving the Indians a 69-68 win over the Suns.
