## County to Receive \$50,000 in Funds To Provide Jobs for Unemployed

On Dec. 19, the U.S. Congress passed an emergency legislation under Title YI of the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act which authorized federal funds to subsidize public service jobs for unemployed persons. The intent of the legislation is to provide jobs to some of the many persons unemployed in the current economic recession.

The Waukesha - Ozaukee - Washington Comprehensive Employment and Training Consortium will receive a portion of those funds (about \$280,000) in January, 1975. Of this figure, Washington County's share is approximately \$50,000.00.

A process is now being established whereby municipalities and private non-profit agencies can submit applications for the use of these federal funds to subsidize needed public service work in their jurisdictions or agencies. The details of this process will be explained at a meeting to be held on Thursday, Jan. 9, 1975 at 9:30 a. m. at the Washington County Courthouse, 432 East Washington Street, West Bend, Wisconsin 53095.

## Regal Ware Lays Off 110

Regal Ware, Inc., Kewaskum cookware manufacturer, laid off some 110 persons shortly before Christmas, on Dec. 20. The layoff is indefinite but company officials are optimistic about business in 1975 and hope conditions will allow them to bring these people back very soon.

Regal officials reported that part of the layoff was due to "smoothing out production operations and streamlining third shift operations."

Engineers, draftsmen, office personnel and sales related employees at the four Regal production facilities throughout the country have not yet been laid off, officials said. Those employee groups are on the job to meet the demand of volume products.

Regal Ware has been producing cookware in Kewaskum since 1945 and is the largest manufacturer in the village. Their normal workforce is approximately 900 persons, and, according to recollections, this is the first major layoff the plant has had.

The plant is now shut down for inventory and the laid-off workers will not return when the plant again opens on Jan. 6.

## Floyd Brenholt Named to State DLAD Group

Floyd Brenholt, Kewaskum School District Business Manager, has been named to a state committee established to recommend ways to improve the effectiveness of local government purchasing.

The 23-member committee, established by the state Department of Local Affairs and Development, (DLAD), consists of 16 local government officials and seven state agency representatives.

DLAD has invited the members to serve on the committee from January until August, 1975, when the committee is expected to complete its work.

DLAD has been encouraging local governments for the past two and a half years to develop centralized-cooperative purchasing practices. But certain public purchasing laws in Wisconsin have hampered the implementation of centralized purchasing procedures.

DLAD Secretary Charles M. Hill, Sr. says that local purchasing is presently dispersed among various individuals causing purchasing to be an "add-on" duty receiving no more attention than time and circumstances permit.

Hill says that studies consistently demonstrate that central purchasing procedures, utilizing effective purchasing methods, do reduce the cost of goods and services and do provide better administrative control over expenditures.

Hill says that the object of the study committee is to have local public officials test the applicability of improved purchasing laws and techniques in the perspective of existing Wisconsin law and local government ordinances.

## Farm Conservation Needs Inventory Is Started in Kewaskum Watershed

A detailed farm by farm conservation needs inventory has been started in the Kewaskum Creek Watershed by the U. S. Soil Conservation Service personnel assigned to the Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District. The inventory is needed to determine the sources of soil erosion and animal waste runoff from the land and estimate costs of land treatment measures needed to improve water quality in the Kewaskum Creek.

Washington County Soil Conservationists - Don Kurer and Ivan Kumrow are making the inventory in accordance with a sub-contract between the University of Wisconsin Water Resource Center and the Soil Conservation Service. The project is being funded by the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency to monitor water runoff from the primarily agricultural and upland areas of the watershed. Similar activity is taking place in the Monomonee River Watershed in Germantown to monitor water runoff from the standpoint of an urbanizing or developing area.

Many landowners and operators in the Kewaskum Creek watershed have been contacted and the land treatment needs discussed with them. Some have been cooperators with the Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District for several years and have conservation plans which indicate conservation needs. Many of these needs have already been applied to the land over the years, for Ed and Harvey Klumb, Howard Proeber, Ervin and William Butzlaff, Walter Neumann, Ed Markielewski, Art Nohn and Harvey Jansen.

New cooperators in the watershed are Hilbert Yogerst, Willard Klein (Anita

Kirchner) Ray Broecker (Elsie Boettcher Farm), Lloyd Schmidt, Willard Prost and Harold Hafemann. These farmers have indicated their interest in following a program of proper landuse and in conserving and wisely using the soil and water resources of their land.

## Emergency Loans Available From Farmers' Home

Farmers in Milwaukee, Ozaukee and Washington County, Wisconsin who sustained production losses as a result of the early freeze may be eligible to receive an emergency loan from Farmers Home Administration.

The dates of the freeze are - Milwaukee County, Sept. 1, 2 & 3, and Sept. 18, 22 & 23, 1974; Ozaukee County, Aug. 31 - Sept. 3, 1974; Washington County, Sept. 21, 1974.

Those who have not received an emergency loan to assist them in recovering from their loss may apply for such a loan at the Farmers Home Administration county office at 2395 W. Washington St., P. O. Box 456, West Bend, WI 53095 (414-334-7850) before close of business Aug. 22, 1975.

These loan applications will be taken under the terms of a new law (P. L. 93-237) enacted Jan. 2, 1974. Individual examination will be made of each application to determine date of the disaster occurrence and type of emergency loan benefits for which the applicant is eligible.

Farm emergency loans may be made to reimburse applicants for expenses already incurred. Loans based on qualifying production losses may include funds to reimburse applicants for production expenses which went into damaged or destroyed crop and livestock enterprises, but not to produce new crops during 1974. Payment terms depend on the purposes for which the loan is used and the applicant's payment ability. No loan may exceed the actual loss sustained.

## Three School Board Members Terms to Expire

The terms of three Kewaskum School Board members will expire this year. The first terms of board president Dr. Charles Ogi and James Oelhafen are expiring, along with Allen Tessar, who is serving his third term.

Candidates have until the second, Tuesday in January to express an intent to run for the board, which is Jan. 14. The election will be held in conjunction with the spring election.

To run for a three-year term, an individual must obtain a declaration of candidacy form from the present clerk, James Oelhafen, and it must be signed in his presence. No signatures are required from district residents in this case. Up to last Thursday Oelhafen, R. 1, Allenton, said no candidates had yet filed papers to run.

### HARTFORD BANK STOCK ACQUIRED BY VALLEY BANCORPORATION

On Dec. 24, 1974, the board of directors of Valley Bancorporation declared the exchange of the holding company stock for the capital stock of the Hartford Exchange Bank, Hartford, Wis., effective at 4:00 p. m. on Dec. 23, 1974. It was revealed Hartford shareholders had exchanged 95% of the shares outstanding of Hartford Exchange Bank for Valley Bancorporation stock.

Approval for the stock ex-

change was previously granted by the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System as well as other regulatory agencies.

Gus A. Zuehlke, Valley Bancorporation president, stated the \$12.6 million-deposit bank will continue to operate with existing officers and directors. The affiliation with the bank holding company will enable the Hartford Exchange Bank to expand the number of services

it offers to customers to include trust leasing, and other services.

With the addition of the Hartford Exchange Bank, total resources of Valley Bancorporation equal approximately \$270 million and the holding company now consists of 13 banks, including Kewaskum, with 20 full-service banking offices, a leasing company, and a trust company.

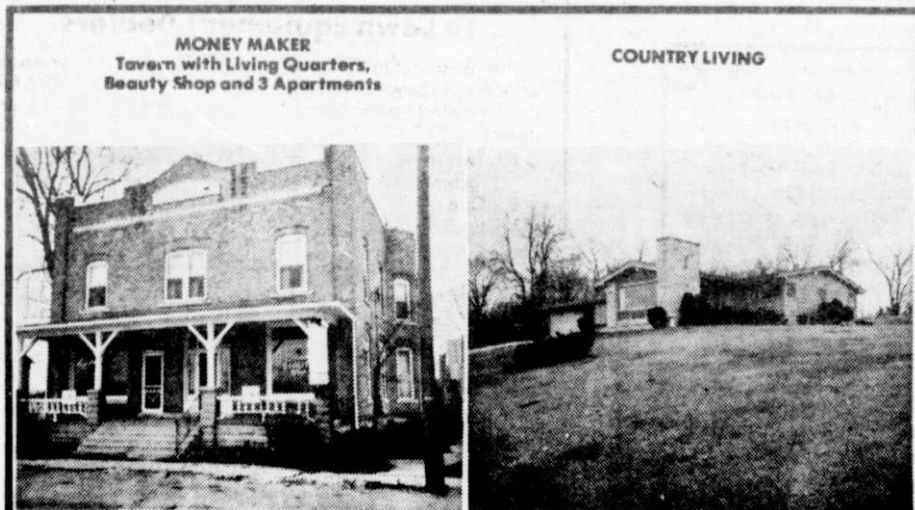

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

President Miller presided and all Board Members were present except Trustee Herriges.

The minutes of the meetings of October 7 and October 11 were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Kral, seconded by Trustee Schmidt. Unanimous Vote.

Mr. Thompson, Saunders Leasing, requested a five (5) foot variance for the placement of a modular office unit adjacent to the rear of the existing building owned by Herriges Oil, Inc. at 1245 Fond du Lac Avenue. The variance was granted upon motion by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Nigh. Unanimous Vote.

The application of Joan Schladweiler for a bartender's license was approved and the Commissioner was authorized to issue the proper license upon payment of the required fee. Motion by Trustee Nigh, seconded by Trustee Yoost. Unanimous Vote.

The application of Herman's Floral, 119 Main Street, for a building permit to remodel the existing building was approved upon motion by Trustee Nigh, seconded by Trustee Schmidt. Unanimous Vote.

The Board reviewed the proposed amendment to the Village of Kewaskum Subdivision and Platting Ordinance.

Motion was made by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Yoost and unanimously carried that Section 31.062 (2) of the proposal be re-written as follows:

**31.062 FACILITIES AND IMPROVEMENTS.**

(2) Streets. After the installation of all utilities, the subdivider shall surface all roadways and streets proposed to be dedicated to the widths prescribed by these regulations and/or comprehensive plan or comprehensive plan components. Said surfacing shall include both base material and wearing course and said surfacing shall be done in accordance with plans and standard specifications approved by the Village Engineer.

## Why Make a Change?

### On Realignment Conferences

Forty-one representatives of the class B and C schools from Slinger to Sevastopol and between Lake Michigan and Lake Winnebago met at Kiel recently to discuss the WIAA's tentative proposal for conference realignment in the area.

The meeting was held in an effort to secure positive input for a future meeting of the WIAA Advisory Council which is to be held in Stevens Point on Jan. 16.

It was apparent that most of the schools are reasonably well pleased with the present conference alignment, but most of them felt that they could live with realignment in order to help schools with completely unsatisfactory affiliations at this time.

The two proposals that received a minimum of opposition were as follows:

1. Under the assumption that Campbellsport, Mayville, Kewaskum and Slinger are able to retain some type of affiliation in their immediate area.

Present Olympian Conference plus Sevastopol and Fish Creek. Present Packerland Conference. Present Central Lakeshore Conference plus Stockbridge.

2. This proposal includes Campbellsport, Mayville, Kewaskum and Slinger.

Conference No. 1—Cedar Grove, Elkhart Lake-Glenbeulah, Kohler, Howards Grove, Oostburg, Ozaukee, Random Lake, Stockbridge.

Conference No. 2—Algoma, Denmark, Kewaunee, Luxemburg-Casco, Mishicot, Sturgeon Bay, Southern Door, Valders.

Conference No. 3—Brillion, Fish Creek, Freedom, Hilbert, Reedsville, Sevastopol, Wrightstown.

Conference No. 4—Campbellsport, Chilton, Kewaskum, Kiel, Mayville, New Holstein, Plymouth, Sheboygan Falls, Slinger.

Personally we don't go along with proposed Conference No. 4, which includes Kewaskum. Sure it would eliminate Kewaskum, a Class B school, from competing against the present four Class A schools in the Scenic Moraine Conference—Grafton, Germantown, Hartland and Kettle Moraine. But it would be just about as far to travel to places like Chilton, Kiel, New Holstein and Sheboygan Falls as it is now to Hartland, Kettle Moraine and Pewaukee. The other five schools in the Scenic are quite centrally located. Furthermore, would there be any interest, prestige or rivalry with teams like Chilton, Kiel, New Holstein and Falls?

Probably the best bet might be to stay in the Scenic Moraine, a strong conference, which receives much publicity in the city daily news media (Milwaukee, Fond du Lac, West Bend and Waukesha) besides the coverage in the weekly newspapers in the conference. Also some real keen rivalries have developed. For example: Kewaskum - Mayville, Kewaskum - Slinger, Kewaskum - Grafton, Kewaskum - Germantown, Kewaskum - Hartland. The same holds true among the other schools. Although half of the schools are Class A and the other B, the teams are evenly matched, both in athletics and other competition. No school has dominated the

championships consistently and Kewaskum usually finishes high in the standings in all athletics. There is also much interest among spectators, which helps attendance.

If changes are to be made some possibilities, although they might not be feasible, could be as follows:

Drop the Class A schools—Grafton, Germantown, Hartland and Kettle Moraine—and add Horicon, Waupun, Plymouth and Campbellsport with Kewaskum, Slinger, Mayville and Pewaukee. A drawback would be the distance to travel for some schools (Pewaukee and Plymouth).

Or drop the far away schools—Kettle Moraine, Hartland and Pewaukee—and add three from among Horicon, Waupun, Campbellsport and Plymouth to the remaining five teams (Kewaskum, Mayville, Slinger, Germantown and Grafton).

Or form a six-school conference among Kewaskum, Slinger, Mayville, Horicon, Campbellsport and Waupun or Plymouth.

Has anyone ever thought of a Washington County Conference with West Bend West, West Bend East, Hartford, Germantown, Slinger and Kewaskum? This would be competing against Class A schools again but just imagine the terrific rivalry, interest and short distances to travel for all the schools. Then, too, Scenic Moraine teams, in non-conference meetings, have proven they can more than hold their own with these Little Ten schools. There might also be a possibility in the future that due to their rapid growth Germantown and Hartford might be divided into two separate schools such as West Bend and this would make for an ideal eight-school loop with all of them being keen rivals.

Or Kewaskum could join the Flyway Loop, which they would probably dominate unless Mayville and Slinger were also added to form a 10-team loop. Present members are Campbellsport, Horicon, North Fond du Lac, Oakfield, Lomira, Laconia and Dodge. However, at a recent meeting, Flyway Conference administrators voted 7-0 to keep the conference in its present alignment although Campbellsport is by far a larger school than the others. Everybody's happy the way it is with no travel problems and the schools are evenly matched in athletics and other programs.
