# 13 Fire, 159 Ambulance Calls in '74

The Kewaskum Fire Department held their first monthly meeting of the new year last Thursday night with 37 members in attendance.

Chief Armin Oppermann reported the department had 13 fire calls in 1974, two more than in 1973, when there were 11. Of the 13, eight were village calls while five were township calls. None of the fires were major ones. The department also answered one "silent" call and two mutual aid calls to Station No. 2 of West Bend and the other to Campbells-

The firemen's rescue squad answered 159 ambulance calls during 1974, the largest number ever. This was 57 more than in 1973 when there were 102 calls. In 1972 the rescue squad was called out 128 times, which was the previous record.

A number of activities coming up were announced. On Thursday evening of this week the firemen will be taken on a tour of the Washington County Sheriff's Department. Firemen are to meet at the municipal building at 7 p. m. On Saturday night, Jan. 11, the firemen's annual stag party will be held at the fire station starting at 6:30 p. m. # Race Appears Likely for 3 Trustee Offices

A race for three trusteeships on the village board appears likely. Although as of Wednesday morning, incumbent Daniel Schmidt is the only one to have filed nomination papers, incumbents Alfred Kral and Roger Strack had picked up papers at the village commissioner's office, along with newcomer Dave Nigh.

As of Wednesday morning, no one had filed papers for the office of village president which also expires this year. Charles Miller is competing a two-year term, altough he was village president for about 12 years, spanning the 1940's and 1950's.

Trustee Schmidt and Strack were first elected in 1973. Kral is completing his sixth term.

Eligible electors have until 5 p. m. on Jan. 21 to file nomination papers.

# Complaints on Snowmobiles Discussed by Village Board

Complaints and reports of snowmobilers traveling recklessly and at high rates of speed on the Milwaukee River in the village park were discussed by village board members Monday night.

Police Chief Don Hlavaty said there were many complaints on the past weekend. The problem, however, is a perennial one, he said. He added that the violators are those 18 years of age and younger.

Children skating on the river in the village-maintained area are endangered by the fast-moving snowmobiles. One report was that some whizzed by so fast it was not possible to read the number, and some had no headlights on Sunday night.

Hlavaty said one of his patrolmen is willing to use his private snowmobile to police the area but that this would present an insurance problem in that his personal policy would not cover the vehicle in police work.

A \$50 deductible all-risk policy would cost about \$30; liability coverage coud be added for about another \$30 per season, according to an estimate by Gene Bohn.

A snowmobiler himself,

and a member of a local club, Trustee Raynor Herriges suggested the violations and the insurance proposal be brought to the attention of the snowmobile club. He said the club has a record of all machines, by number, and club members would like to have all violation reports. Club members want safety in snowmobiling.

A local ordinance sets the speed limit for snowmobiles at 10 m.p.h. anywhere in the village with no snowmobiling after 10 p. m. Violations are subject to fines.

Board members authorized Ziebart undercoating for the new sewage plant truck and the new public works dump truck to protect them from rust. They also voted to eliminate one parking stall ahead of Miller's Furniture, nearest to Forest Avenue and one just south of the driveway at Keller's Tap. Vehicles parked in either stall obstruct the view of motorists turning on to Fond du Lac Avenue.

A new Ford squad car has been put into use. It was recently purchased from Stocker Ford, West Bend, on its low bid of \$2,350 cash plus trade-in.

Pay for substitute teachers is also on the agenda as a request has been made to increase the present rates. An applicant will be submitted to the Board to replace Mrs. Manders as a special education teacher. Mrs. Manders resigned effective the end of this semester.

The question of a Board budget committee will be raised, and possible appointments made. A discussion will also be held concerning outside help in negotiations.

The Kewaskum Education Association has asked that contract be rethe present opened to discuss the pay of coaches of girls sports, and this discussion is also on the agenda, as is a discussion of the possibility of hiring someone to open the Farmington gym on Saturday afternoons. Because the Board must meet before January 21 to certify candidates for the School Board election, they wil also consider changing the second regular meeting of the month to January 20th. Other miscellaneous items which may come up wil also be considered.

An executive session will be held to discuss negotiations and for the annual Board-Superintendent evaluation session. The last item was postponed from the December meeting.

The funds are included in a total of more than 1.5 million dollars in law enforcement grants announced by the Governor.
