Open House at New Middle School, Four Candidates Elementary School Addition Jan. 26 File for School

An Open House will be held on Sunday, Jan. 26, from 1-4 p. m. in the new Middle School, 1676 Reigle Drive, Kewaskum, and in the Kewaskum Elementary School addition, 1550 Reigle Drive, Kewaskum. This date was approved by the School Board at its meeting Monday evening, as a report was made on the building program. No occupancy dates have been set for the new high school addition, the last of the building projects to be completed.

Policies on duties and responsibilities of the Superintendent, as well as on student records were approved as

printed. A discussion was held relative to pay for substitute teachers. A request had been made for a pay increase, and the Board considered the request along with a survey taken by Mr. Brenholt of the substitute pay scales of neighboring schools. The matter was tabled until a future meeting.

It was agreed by the board to reopen the present teacher contract to consider the question of pay for coaches of women's sports. Discussion was held concerning tying any change to a formula agreed on for next year, but the feeling expressed by Kewaskum Education Association representatives was that this was a matter to be settled in the negotiations, and this was accepted.

The next regular meeting will be held Jan. 20 instead of the regular date of Jan 27.

Since the Board must mee no later than Jan. 21, to verify candidates for the election, it was decided to hold the regular meeting at the same time

A budget committee of Allen Tessar and Dr. Ogi was Byron Gessner appointed was appointed alternate.

A brief discussion was held on obtaining outside assistance in negotiations. There was a general favorable feeling on this, but no action was taken. It will be discussed a gain at the Jan. 20 meeting.

Rather than approve hir ing someone to open the Farmington gvm on Saturday afternoon, the Board suggested the PTO be contacted to see if volunteers can be found.

A contract was approved for Christine Lessner for special education. She will replace Mrs. Manders who resigned her position effective the end of first semester.

The Board went into exective session following the regular meeting to discuss negotiations and to hold its annual evaluation with the superintendent.

300 Students in School District Missing With Flu

The flu bug has hit the Kewaskum School District. On dents absent from school out of the 2,100 which attend the six schools in the district. There were also some 14 teachers ill, which brought most of the district's substitutes into service.

School Supt. Floyd Brenholt reported the large absentee list at Monday night's school board session.

The 300 figure included 90 from the high school, some 55 from the Elementary School and 60 from the Middle School. The remainder were from the outlying schools in the district at Wayne, Farmington and Beechwood.

Kewaskum, West Bend Young Men Killed in Crash

Two young men were killed in a car-truck crash on the outskirts of Slinger at 9:16 p. m. last Thursday at Hwys. 144 and 60.

The victims were Thomas Burg, 18, of 376 North Ave., Kewaskum, and Dale Vernon Jordan, 18, of R. 5, State 144, West Bend. Burg was currently residing in Slinger.

The driver of the semitruck, Neil Rickert of Florida, said he was westbound on State 60, traveling at about 45 miles an hour, when the car crossed in front of him. The auto was northbound on Bonnie Lane (State 144). Rickert braked and the truck swerved right, but he was unable to avoid an accident.

Coroner Robert Boltz said both men were dead on arrival at the hospital. A third person in the car was not seriously injured, Boltz said

The deaths were the first on county roads in 1975.

Thomas J. Burg, Jr. born Aug. 11, 1956 at Hartford. He was a 1974 graduate of Kewaskum High School and was employed at the West Bend Company. He also worked part time at Little Switzerland.

Survivors include his parents, Thomas J. Burg, Sr., Slinger, and Mrs. Annabelle Kreuser, Kewaskum; one sister, Ann Elizabeth, and one brother, Timothy, both at home; his grandmother, Mrs. Esther Burg, Slinger; stepbrother Rick, Jr., and two step sisters, Kim and Karen Kreuser, all of Kewaskum.

Funeral services were held Monday at 9:30 a. m. at the Rothenbach Funeral Home Slinger, and at 10 a. m. at St. Peter's Catholic Church Slinger. Fr. Robert Wolf officiated and burial took place in the parish cemetery. Visitation was after 2 p. m. Sunday at the funeral home and the rosary was said at 8 p. m. Sunday.

Bicentennial Notes



CATTLE DRIVE-Anyone remember this? Local historians tell us the picture was taken shortly before the turn of the century. Area farmers at that time drove their livestock to town to the stockyards which were located along the railroad tracks in the area south of the Herriges Oil Company Bulk Plant. They were shipped from there by rail to distant markets.

If you look closely at the

right of the picture, many will recognize the former printing shop and Lay Lum-Company buildings which were razed when the Sentry Store and large parking lot was built. The printing shop building was later used for storing materials by the lumber company. In the background is the present Corner Drug Store partially hidden by the hay wagon with a small portion of the top of the L. Roseneimer

Dept. Store in view in the upper left corner. The photo was taken before the former Bank of Kewaskum building was built between the lumber company and drug store buildings. The bank was established in 1904.

This is only one of the many pictures that the Bicentennial Committee hopes to be able to reproduce in the proposed history of Kewaskum. Seventeen-year-old Gundrun from Vienna, Austria added "I'm glad I came; I am having no problems with the English language in school and I think the AFS is a good organization."

A charming miss, Gundrun arrived here in August to spend a year. She lives with the Elmer Wilkens family at 488 E. Newark Drive in the Fillmore area. She attends Kewaskum Community High School with her American sister Cheryl.

In Vienna, a city of million, Gundrun attends a private boarding school and she observed that "school here is less strict" and finds that a big difference is having the students moving from classroom to classroom rather than remaining in one room all day in her board-

#### Kewaskum School Officials to Attend WASB Convention

Richard Theusch will be the official voting delegate representing the Kewaskum school board at the Delegate Assembly of the Wisconsin Association of School Boards (WASB). The Delegate Assembly will meet on the first day of the 1975 Joint State Convention of school board members, district administrators (WASDA) and school business officials (WASBO) to be held Jan. 22-24, in Milwaukee.

The voting delegates will act on 17 proposed resolu-tions which have been recommended by the WASB Policies and Resolutions Committee from resolutions submitted by member school These resolutions deal with such issues as compulsory attendance, teacher licensing, school finance, em-ployee relations, school dis-trict reorganization and cable television.

Also attending the convention from the Kewaskum school district will be Floyd Brenholt, Supt., and Jack Sutton, Services Manager.

The 1975 convention program revolves around the theme, "Equality in Educa tion." Resource centers, panand els, general sessions roundtable discussions will focus on issues related to this theme as well as on other issues of concern to school officials.

Dr. Glen Eye, professor of educational administration at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and a veteran of 60 years in the profession of education, will be the opening general session speaker on Wednesday afternoon of the convention. Dr. Dudley E. Flood, second vice president of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers and an assistant state superintendent for North Carolina, will also speak at that session.

State Superintendent Barbara Thompson will give her annual State of Education message; and George Tipler, executive secretary of the WASB, will give his annual report to the school district representatives at the Thursday morning general session. Also on the Thursday morning program is Dr. Darold Treffert, director of the Winnebago Mental Health Insti-

Lt. Governor Martin Schreiber will speak at the Friday morning general session, a session which will be devoted to federal and state legislation.

Panel sessions on Wednes-day and Thursday of the convention will feature the discussion of such issues as Chapter 89 (handicapped education), negotiation impasse, b board - administrator career education student use of drugs, school communications, accountability, interscholastic athl etics, special education programs, and student needs.

For help with specific pro-blems and answers to particular questions, school officials can ask the experts who will be staffing centers. Convention goers can also get answers on facilities and school equipment by visiting the exhibit show. Approximately 2,600 school board members, district administrators and school business officials from around

the state will attend this

year's convention which will be held in the new Milwaukee Convention Center, the Marc Plaza Hotel and the Pfister Hotel.


