Kewaskum, West Bend Young Men Killed in Crash

Two young men were killed in a car-truck crash on the outskirts of Slinger at 9:16 p. m. last Thursday at Hwys. 144 and 60.

The victims were Thomas Burg, 18, of 376 North Ave., Kewaskum, and Dale Vernon Jordan, 18, of R. 5, State 144, West Bend. Burg was currently residing in Slinger.

The driver of the semi-truck, Neil Rickert of Florida, said he was westbound on State 60, traveling at about 45 miles an hour, when the car crossed in front of him. The auto was northbound on Bonnie Lane (State 144). Rickert braked and the truck swerved right, but he was unable to avoid an accident.

Coroner Robert Boltz said both men were dead on arrival at the hospital. A third person in the car was not seriously injured, Boltz said.

The deaths were the first on county roads in 1975.

Thomas J. Burg, Jr. was born Aug. 11, 1956 at Hartford. He was a 1974 graduate of Kewaskum High School and was employed at the West Bend Company. He also worked part time at Little Switzerland.

Survivors include his parents, Thomas J. Burg, Sr., Slinger, and Mrs. Annabelle Kreuser, Kewaskum; one sister, Ann Elizabeth, and one brother, Timothy, both at home; his grandmother, Mrs. Esther Burg, Slinger; stepbrother Rick, Jr., and two step sisters, Kim and Karen Kreuser, all of Kewaskum.

Funeral services were held Monday at 9:30 a. m. at the Rothenbach Funeral Home, Slinger, and at 10 a. m. at St. Peter's Catholic Church, Slinger. Fr. Robert Wolf officiated and burial took place in the parish cemetery. Visitation was after 2 p. m. Sunday at the funeral home and the rosary was said at 8 p. m. Sunday.

Open House at New Middle School, Elementary School Addition Jan. 26

An Open House will be held on Sunday, Jan. 26, from 1-4 p. m. in the new Middle School, 1676 Reigle Drive, Kewaskum, and in the Kewaskum Elementary School addition, 1550 Reigle Drive, Kewaskum. This date was approved by the School Board at its meeting Monday evening, as a report was made on the building program. No occupancy dates have been set for the new high school addition, the last of the building projects to be completed.

Policies on duties and responsibilities of the Superintendent, as well as on student records were approved as printed.

A discussion was held relative to pay for substitute teachers. A request had been made for a pay increase, and the Board considered the request along with a survey taken by Mr. Brenholt of the substitute pay scales of neighboring schools. The matter was tabled until a future meeting.

It was agreed by the board to reopen the present teacher contract to consider the question of pay for coaches of women's sports. Discussion was held concerning tying any change to a formula agreed on for next year, but the feeling expressed by Kewaskum Education Association representatives was that this was a matter to be settled in the negotiations, and this was accepted.

The next regular meeting will be held Jan. 20 instead of the regular date of Jan. 27.

Since the Board must meet no later than Jan. 21, to verify candidates for the election, it was decided to hold the regular meeting at the same time.

A budget committee of Allen Tessar and Dr. Ogi was appointed. Byron Gessner was appointed alternate.

A brief discussion was held on obtaining outside assistance in negotiations. There was a general favorable feeling on this, but no action was taken. It will be discussed a gain at the Jan. 20 meeting.

Rather than approve hiring someone to open the Farmington gym on Saturday afternoon, the Board suggested the PTO be contacted to see if volunteers can be found.

A contract was approved for Christine Lessner for special education. She will replace Mrs. Manders who resigned her position effective the end of first semester.

The Board went into executive session following the regular meeting to discuss negotiations and to hold its annual evaluation session with the superintendent.

Incumbents Dr. Charles Ogi, R. 2, Kewaskum, and James Oelhafen, R. 1, Allenton, made their declaration of candidacy on Tuesday, Jan. 7. The other incumbent, Allen Tessar, Kewaskum, and a newcomer, Daniel W. Stoffel, R. 2, Kewaskum, officially became candidates on Monday, Jan. 13.

300 Students in School District Missing With Flu

The flu bug has hit the Kewaskum School District. On Monday there were 300 students absent from school out of the 2,100 which attend the six schools in the district. There were also some 14 teachers ill, which brought most of the district's substitutes into service.

School Supt. Floyd Brenholt reported the large absentee list at Monday night's school board session.

The 300 figure included 90 from the high school, some 55 from the Elementary School and 60 from the Middle School. The remainder were from the outlying schools in the district at Wayne, Farmington and Beechwood.

CATTLE DRIVE—Anyone remember this? Local historians tell us the picture was taken shortly before the turn of the century. Area farmers at that time drove their livestock to town to the stockyards which were located along the railroad tracks in the area south of the Herriges Oil Company Bulk Plant. They were shipped from there by rail to distant markets.

If you look closely at the

right of the picture, many will recognize the former printing shop and Lay Lumber Company buildings which were razed when the Sentry Store and large parking lot was built. The printing shop building was later used for storing materials by the lumber company. In the background is the present Corner Drug Store partially hidden by the hay wagon with a small portion of the top of the L. Rosenheimer

Dept. Store in view in the upper left corner. The photo was taken before the former Bank of Kewaskum building was built between the lumber company and drug store buildings. The bank was established in 1904.

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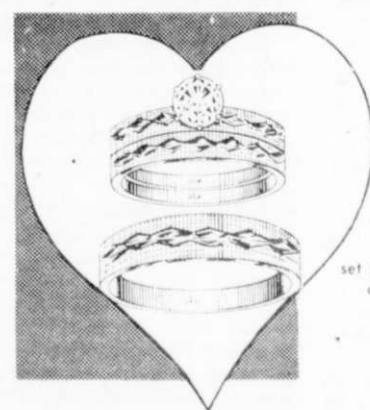

AFS Student Is Woman's Club Speaker

"I like it here," is the way AFS student Gundrun Gans-ter summed up her comments when she spoke to members of the Kewaskum Woman's Club on Saturday afternoon.

Seventeen-year-old Gundrun from Vienna, Austria added "I'm glad I came; I am having no problems with the English language in school and I think the AFS is a good organization."

A charming miss, Gundrun arrived here in August to spend a year. She lives with the Elmer Wilkens family at 488 E. Newark Drive in the Fillmore area. She attends Kewaskum Community High School with her American sister Cheryl.

In Vienna, a city of two million, Gundrun attends a private boarding school and she observed that "school here is less strict" and finds that a big difference is having the students moving from classroom to classroom rather than remaining in one room all day in her board-

ing school.
Her claim that she is not having any problem with the English language is borne out by the fact that she made the honor roll at Kewaskum High the first quarter. She has a background of seven years of English.

Gundrun described Vienna as "a culture city," with narrow streets, good parks for children and beautiful architecture, all made real with colored slides.

Austria has many lakes, Gundrun said. Popular sports are skiing, mountain climbing and boat races. Goat fights remain as an old custom and there are folk dances and concerts.

All males are drafted at age 19 for six months duty.

Education is free even in universities, a big attraction to non-residents. One of every six students is a foreigner, Gundrun stated.

Austrians are 90 per cent Catholic, four per cent Lutheran with the remainder having another or no religious

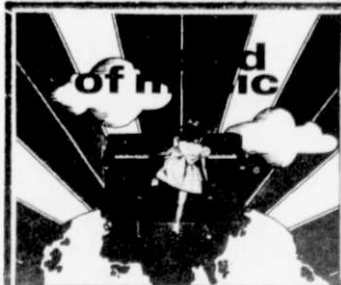
affiliation.

Asked for a comparison of foods, Gundrun noted Austrians eat dark rye bread and mostly fried foods. Is there any American food she particularly likes, she was asked. "Jello," was the reply.

Gundrun, smiling easily, appeared in her native costume for her first speaking engagement — a red dirndl

skirt with apron, both embroidered, and a white blouse with puffed sleeves.

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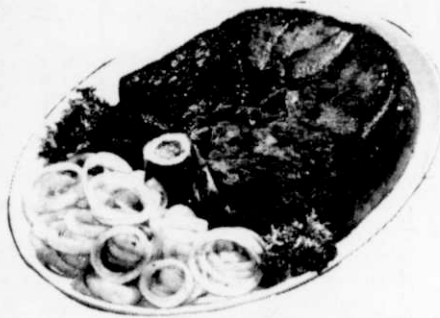
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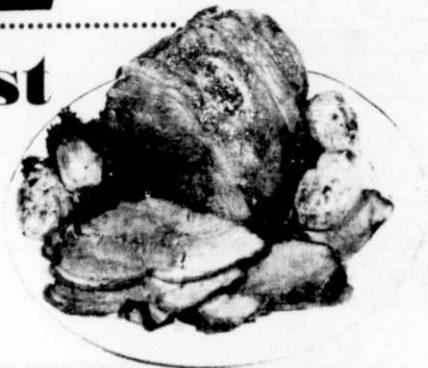
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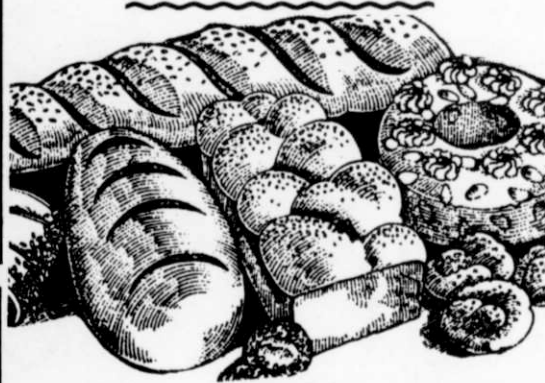

Kewaskum School Officials to Attend WASB Convention

Richard Theusch will be the official voting delegate representing the Kewaskum school board at the Delegate Assembly of the Wisconsin Association of School Boards (WASB). The Delegate Assembly will meet on the first day of the 1975 Joint State Convention of school board members, district administrators (WASDA) and school business officials (WASBO) to be held Jan. 22-24, in Milwaukee.

The voting delegates will act on 17 proposed resolutions which have been recommended by the WASB Policies and Resolutions Committee from resolutions submitted by member school boards. These resolutions deal with such issues as compulsory attendance, teacher licensing, school finance, employee relations, school district reorganization and cable television.

Also attending the convention from the Kewaskum school district will be Floyd Brenholt, Supt., and Jack Sutton, Services Manager.

The 1975 convention program revolves around the theme, "Equality in Education." Resource centers, panels, general sessions and roundtable discussions will focus on issues related to this theme as well as on other issues of concern to school officials.

Dr. Glen Eye, professor of educational administration at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and a veteran of 60 years in the profession of education, will be the opening general session speaker on Wednesday afternoon of the convention. Dr. Dudley E. Flood, second vice president of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers and an assistant state superintendent for North Carolina, will also speak at that session.

State Superintendent Barbara Thompson will give her annual State of Education message; and George Tipler, executive secretary of the WASB, will give his annual report to the school district representatives at the Thursday morning general session. Also on the Thursday morning program is Dr. Darold Treffert, director of the Winnebago Mental Health Institute.

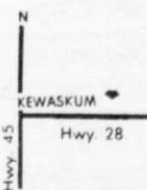

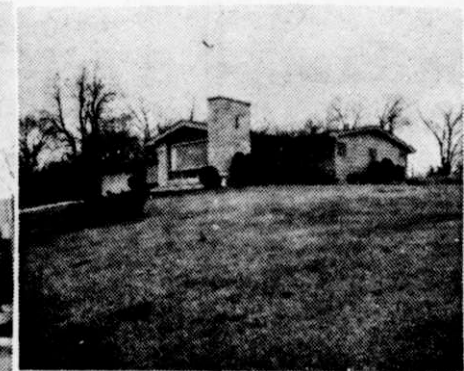

Women Voters to Hold Consensus On Land Use

Jan. 21 and 22 have been selected as the dates of the League of Women Voters-Washington County Consensus on the issues of Land Use. This consensus will be used as a springboard in the continuing development of broad-based national and state land use attitudes throughout the league.

The consensus questions have been grouped about five main topics ranging from basic concepts to a specific federal role. Beginning with a philosophical framework, it goes on to list possible land use goals and functions which could be included in a governmental program at some level. It then enumerates the specific federal powers which could be used in pursuit of land use goals. Finally, it deals with defining national responsibility and adjusting conflicts between levels of government, between agencies, and between public and private interests.

Stressing that "Consensus is by no means the end of this subject," assistant Land Use Chairperson, Rose Martin, states that at all levels the league will be continuing research and education efforts with individual leagues addressing themselves to land use issues of local concern. "Land use problems affect all of us in some way," she added. "We all need to be concerned. The issues at stake here are at the same time very basic and yet extremely complex." She then concluded, "The challenge is not only to be informed but to seek solutions."

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Cold, Riddled Indians Are Upset by Slinger, 72-66

It was a warm, rainy evening outdoors and hot inside the gym but nevertheless the Indians were cold here Friday night before a packed house. As a result they were upset by Slinger (1-3), 72-66, dropping them into a tie for 3rd place.

To make matters worse the Indians were without the services of starting junior guard Jim Bilgo, who suffered a bone fracture in his leg in practice Wednesday. Bilgo, who had started every game, is a good ball handler and one of the team's best defensive players. Jack Kern, another junior and a top reserve, was also out due to illness and played only a few minutes. Bilgo will be out indefinitely.

The Indians appeared rusty after the long holiday lay-off and Coach Westphal substituted quite freely. Slinger had a tuneup non-conference game with Hartford Tuesday and no doubt this helped. Kewaskum would have benefited if they had played Horicon Tuesday instead of before the holidays, which was of little benefit.

Slinger, with its full court press and quickness, can make a good team forget all the things they normally do well. This is what happened and the Owls always seem to give the Indians trouble. They were able to bring the ball right up the middle on offense and when the defense converged on them, pass off for easy shots under the basket.

Leading the Owls were Steve Hart with a 21-point performance and speedy Jack Held with 19. Kewaskum was paced by Scott Koth with 19 points, while Mike Koepke and Don Gruber were held to 11 and 10 respectively.

The Indians started out good enough and led by a 25-18 margin just before the quarter ended. But the 2nd period was Slinger's as Held scored 10 points in leading his team to a 20-12 margin to bring the halftime score to 39-37 in favor of the Owls. The Indians never regained the lead after that.

In the 3rd quarter the Owls stretched their lead to 10 points at one time as they again outpointed the Indians, 17-12. In the final stanza Kewaskum made a comeback and closed the gap to 2 points, 66-64. But with 1½ minutes to go the Owls pulled ahead again, 70-66, and Hart made 2 free throws to make it 72-66 and put the game on ice.

Slinger easily outshot the Indians, hitting on 28 of 60 shots for 46 per cent. Kewaskum hit on only 25 of 74 for 34 per cent. The Indians also missed 14 free throws. Kewaskum had plenty of good shots but the ball just wouldn't go in. The Owls were emotionally involved in the game, according to their coach, Doug Potter, to out-hustle Kewaskum.

The JV's also lost to the Owls, 56-41. Their lineup also was riddled when Leon Laatsch, averaging 22 points a game, was unable to play because of illness.

In other Scenic games Friday, Grafton remained unbeaten and kept its foothold on 1st place with a 68-49 win over winless Germantown, Kettle Moraine moved

into 2nd place with a 10-49 victory over Pewaukee, and Hartland upended Mayville, 81-39.

This Friday Kewaskum plays at Kettle Moraine (4-1) and can move into a tie with them with a victory. But this won't be easy as Kettle has a fine team this season.
