6 Candidates Scenic Debate Meet Held Here; Seek 3 Village **Trustee Posts** Slinger Winner

Kewaskum hosted the Scenic Moraine Conference debate meet Saturday with five area schools participating.

Slinger won the meet for the third year in a row with 5-1 and 268 speaker points, while Grafton placed second with 5-1 and 221 speaker points. Kewaskum was third with 3-3, Hartland fourth with 1-5 and Kettle Moraine next with 1-5. The competi-tion was on a rotation basis with the teams being pitted against each other for three rounds.

Kewaskum's team comprised of Julie LaFleur and Roy Peterson, 1st and 2nd affirmative, and Bob Devine and Mark Smucker, 1st and 2nd negative. The affirmative team had one win and two losses, while the negative team scored two wins and one loss (to Slinger).

The resolution dealt with whether or not the federal government should finance all federal campaigns.

Smucker led his team in overall speaker points with 62 out of a total of 90.

This Saturday the Kewaskum debate team will participate in a meet at Homestead High School.

row there will be just one candidate for village president. Incumbent Charles Miller declared himself a candidate for his second term and he will run unopposed. Miller had also served as president previously for about 12 years, spanning the 1940's and 1950's. He also formerly scrved as a trustee on the village board.

Kral is completing his 6th term. Strack and Schmidt were first elected two years ago.

No primary election is required but if one more candidate had entered the trustee race a primary would have been necessitated.

The Board unanimously approved the implementing of the Elderly Nutrition Improvement Program and requested that a cost analysis of the district's food and production expenses be conducted by Jack Sutton, school service's manager and Ruth Gruhle, cafeteria manager so that a contribution of those eating can be given.

Board president, Dr. Ogi, asked Mr. Brenholt, superintendent of schools, to review staffing in the district to consider possible places for reduction.

The Board adjourned to an executive session following the regular board meeting.

Northern Kettle Moraine Snowmobile Association Meets

The January meeting of the Northern Kettle Moraine Snowmobile Association was held at Voelkers Supper Club at Elkhart Lake on Jan. 16.

Sixth District Assemblyman Gervase Hephner, and Fifty-ninth District Assemblyman Calvon Potter were present. Association President Paul Kranig said he had received a letter from Crooked Trails Club stating that they had lost a large amount

of trail signs to vandalism. At that time, First Vice President George Lendved said we now have posters to put up in business places stating a reward offered. At the last meeting, a \$100 reward was approved for the conviction of any person damaging, removing, or stealing snowmobile signs or property.

George Lendved reported that Walt Adams, superintendent of the Northern Unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest, had informed him that the trails on state land were now closed because of the large amount of insurance the clubs are required (by the DNR) to have on state land. No club in the NKMSA carries that amount of insurance. Several clubs are now worried that they will not be able to hold their

rides for Multiple Sclerosis,

etc. because of the trails on state land being closed. Paul Kranig gave a report from Walt Adams that stated the conditions of club trails that should be met before they are used again. The conditions are trails too narrow, bridges too narrow, fences too close to trails, etc.

The next meeting will be held at Parnell and is also the annual meeting for the election of officers. The present officers are President, Paul Kranig of the Kettle Kruisers, also a director in the Association of Wisconsin Snowmobile Clubs: First Vice President, George Lendved of the New Fane Kettle Riders, also a director in the AWSC: Second Vice Presi-dent, Eugene Krahn of the Beechwood Night Fliers: Secretary, John Odekirk of the Sno-Cougars; and Treasurer, Robert Baker of the North Ridge Riders. Club delegates are asked to come to the next meeting prepared to elect officers that are able to carry on the duties of NKMSA.

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

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

Regular Meeting December 2, 1974 8:00 P. M.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

President Miller presided and all Board Members were present.

The minutes of the meeting of November 4, 1974 were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Herriges and unanimously carried.

Robert Kirst and Lloyd Teeselink representing the local Lions Club discussed with the Board as to what could be done to encourage a greater contribution of waste paper by local residents to the Lions Club monthly paper pick-up. It was decided to try a newepaper announcement prior to each monthly pick-up date, which is the third Saturday of each month.

A building permit for the construction of a one family residence on Lot 22, Block 3, Bel-Ric acres was issued to Robert Kirst. Motion by Trustee Nigh, seconded by Trustee Strack and unanimously carried.

ORDINANCE NO. 74-3 THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KE-WASKUM, WASHINGTON COUNTY, WISCONSIN, DOES ORDAIN AS FOL-LOWS:

Section 1. Repeal and recreate Section 31.022 of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum to read as follows:

31.022 OTHER DIVIS-IONS. Any division of land other than a subdivision within the Village or within its extraterritorial plat approval jurisdiction, of which a plat has not been approved and recorded, pursuant to Section 31.021, shall be surveyed and a certified survey map of such division approved and recorded as required by Section 31,042 of this Chapter.

SECTION 2. Section 31.042 of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum is hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. Section 31.042 of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum is here by re-enacted to read as follows:

31.042 LAND DIVISIONS OTHER THAN SUBDIVIS-IONS.

(1) Definition. A lot division shall be the division of any parcel of land within the Village for purpose of sale or building development. It shall not include:

(a) Transfers of interests in land by will or pursuant to court order.

(b) Leases for a term not to exceed 10 years mortgages sion at which action is desired.

(3) Public Hearing. The Plan Commission may schedule a public hearing on the proposed lot division before taking action. In such case, the Village Clerk shall give such notice of the proposed lot division to property owners within the area in which the lot division is proposed as shall be deemed necessary.

(4) Review of Division. The proposed lot division shall be reviewed by the Plan Commission for conformity with the provisions of this chapter and the Zoning Code and the official map and the master street plan of the Village.

(5) Access To Streets Required. No proposed lot division shall be approved unless the resulting lots front on a dedicated street at least 66 feet in width, as shown on the official map.

(6) Action On Application. The Plan Commission and Village Board shall within 40 days of application, approve, approve conditionally or reject the proposed lot division. The applicant shall be notified in writing of any conditions of approval or the reasons for rejection.

(7) Compliance With Statutes. The Certified Survey Map shall comply with Section 236.34 Wis. Stats., which is adopted by reference as part of this section.

(8) Consent And Waiver. Prior to acceptance of a certified survey map the subdivider shall furnish to the Village of Kewaskum a Consent And Waiver of the statutory provisions and ordinance provisions of the Village of Kewaskum for the installation of sanitary sewer, sewer laterals, water main, water laterals, curb and gutter. storm sewer, street surfacing, sidewalk, electrical distribution for street lighting, and payment of park fees to be in a form approved by the Village Clerk and shall be recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds in the same manner as a Lis Pendens. Such Consent And Waiver shall provide that the installation of such services shall be made at the discretion of the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum.

(9) Other Utilities. All other utilities necessary to the extent reasonably practicable shall comply with the provisions of this chapter hereinafter stated relating to general requirements and design standards and required improvements and installed by the subdivider.

(10) Park Fee. Prior to the issuance of a building permit on lands described on a certified survey map the owner of said land shall pay Two Hundred and No/100 (\$200.00) Dollars per residential unit to be erected, for park, recreation or open SECTION 4. Repeal and recreate Section 31.062(2) of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum to read as follows:

31.062 FACILITIES AND IMPROVEMENTS.

(2) Streets. After the installation of all utilities, the subdivider shall surface all roadways and streets proposed to be dedicated to the widths prescribed by these regulations and/or comprehensive plan or comprehensive plan components. Said surfacing shall include both base material and wearing course and said surfacing shall be done in accordance with plans and standard specifications approved by the Village Engineer. The cost of surfacing roadways in excess of forty-six (46) feet in width, curb-face to curbface, and to standards over and above those which would be required for local streets that are not required to serve the needs of the developer shall be borne by the community.

SECTION 5. Repeal and recreate Section 31.062(13) of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum to read as follows:

31.062 FACILITIES AND IMPROVEMENTS.

(13) Dedication and Guarantee. All facilities and improvements installed prior to final approval of the plat shall be considered dedicated along with streets and other public areas upon the approval of the plat. Facilities and improvements completed under bond or other financial guarantee after the approval of the plat shall be considered dedicated upon their approval and acceptance and release of the bond or other guarantee. The required improvements in the subdivision shall be guaranteed for a period of one year following the completion and acceptance of such improvements. In order 'to insure the good quality of materials, workmanship and maintenance of all sanitary sewers, water mains, storm sewers, streets and all appurtenances thereto, the subdivider shall provide a guarantee bond or other satisfactory financial guarantee to the Village of Kewaskum in the amount of twenty per cent (20%) of the total installation cost of the aforesaid improvements as determined by the Village Engi-neer, for a period of one year after completion of construction and written accep-tance by the Village Engineer.

SECTION 6. Effective date. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect after its passage and publication.


