Plan Heart Month In Town Wayne

The Township of Wayne will join more than 1,800 other Wisconsin cities, villages and townships on Saturday, Feb. 1, when Wisconsin Heart Association's 1975 Heart Fund officially opens, announced Mrs. James Gutjar, R. 3, Campbellsport, who heads the fund-raising drive here.

"Despite substantial progress in the last 10 years, heart disease continues to be Wisconsin's number one killer, claiming more lives than all other causes combined,' Mrs. Gutjahr said. "Approximately one in every six adults has some elevation of blood pressure, which is the leading cause of heart disease and stroke.

But hypertension (high blood pressure) can be easily detected and controlled. Contributions from past campaigns have helped medical researchers come closer to pinpointing the causes and finding possible cures for heart and blood vessel disease, the local chairman explained. Heart Fund donations also help support public and professional educa-tion, and community service programs, such as high blood pressure screening and emergency resuscitation training.

"But much more needs to be done," Mrs. Gutjahr added. "The 1975 Heart Fund in the Town of Wayne will continue to help scientists search for the answers to these community health problems. These gifts will also help increase direct educational and

At the same time an open house was also held at the addition to the Elementary Kewaskum School at 1550 Reigle Drive. No occupancy dates have been set for the new high school addition, the last of the building projects to be completed.

Shown above is a sketch of the interior of the well-planned, beautiful middle school which also includes a gymnasium. The high school addition when completed will in-

clude another new gym, making a total of four in the Kewaskum schools. The middle school has a total building area of 47,900 square feet and is designed for an enrollment of 325-350 students. Total construction cost is \$825,-000.00.

The entire building program in the Kewaskum District includes three elementary school additions of approximately 7,000 square feet each; a high school gymnas-


ium and shop addition of approximately 31,500 square feet and the middle school of

approximately 48,000 square feet. All construction is to remain within the limits of the \$1,600,000.00 bond issue.

The photo at the left shows the entire structure of the new middle school. Note the lack of snow on the ground for January, which has been exceptionally mild with very little snow and above normal temperatures.


