### Fire Seriously Damages Barn on Schmidt Farm

A barn, approximately 40x feet, on the Arnold Schmidt farm, located threequarters of a mile west of Kewaskum on Hwy. 28, was seriously damaged in an early morning fire Monday. Kewaskum firemen an-

swered the alarm shortly be-fore 6:30 a.m. and more than 30 men responded to the call, along with all of their trucks and equipment. One ambulance was also at the scene in case of injuries or any firemen were overcome by the dense smoke. The equipment and some of the firemen remained at the scene until 4 p. m., a period of 91/2 hours.

Shortly after arriving the Kewaskum department placed a mutual aid call to the Kohlsville department for assistance. They sent three pie-

ces of equipment (tankers) and from 15 to 20 men to help. The Kohlsville firemen were released around 2 p. m.

The fire started as Mr. and Mrs. Schmidt were finishing milking. The alarm was turned in by their daughter-in-law, Bev Schmidt. When the firemen arrived flames were shooting across the whole barn. Kewaskum Fire Chief Armin Oppermann said he believed the fire started at the south end of the barn but the cause of the blaze could not be determined.

Reuben Oppermann, grandson of the Schmidts, said he came to get eggs at 6:10 a. m. and there was no evidence of fire at that time. Later Mrs. Schmidt went into the milk house to get some pails and said it was full of smoke.

All of the livestock, about 20 cows and a few calves

were removed from the barn, with the assistance of neighbors and spectators, and transported to the farm of a Vic Backhaus. neighbor, Vic Backhaus. Much of the farm machinery was also inside the barn. It was removed but damaged.

The barn also contained oats, straw and hay. After firemen had the flames under control they continued to pour water into the barn to avoid flareups. They removed the hay and straw with a front end loader and by hand to get rid of the heat. The hay was still smoldering in the barnyard the next day.

Firemen hauled 40 tanker loads of water from the village and poured 80,000 gallons of water on the fire.

Chief Oppermann estimated that three-quarters of the barn was saved. Firemen did a remarkable job in containing the fire, saving the attached milk house and other nearby buildings, and keeping damage to the barn floor and basement to a minimum.

A terrific amount of smoke poured out of the barn and could be seen for miles around. Firemen set up fans in an effort to blow the smoke away from the areas they were working to sal-vage. The above photo was taken after firemen had the blaze under control and most of the smoke had cleared. Firemen also had to contend with cold weather and freezing ice from the hoses which made walking treacherous.

It was the second barn fire at the Schmidt farm. About 19 years ago their barn burned to the ground and had to be rebuilt.

No estimate of the loss was made immediately

### Board Agrees to Salary Increases For Municipal Employes, Police

By Ruth Held The 1975 salary schedule for municipal employes was ratified by village board members during their monthly meeting Monday night.

The schedule, retroactive to Jan. 1, 1975, reflects increases for all full-time employes that average out to an 8 per cent across the board

Board members also agreed to salary increases for members of the Kewaskum Police Association in a one-year contract. It raises the starting salary to \$759 from \$690; to \$880 instead of \$800 for the second year; to \$918 instead of \$835 for the third . year; to \$962 from \$875 for the fourth year; and to \$1,-006.50 from \$915 for the fifth year.

Part-time police pay remains at \$3.75 per hour. Salaries for summer help was left open depending on what the minimum wage will be.

The new salary schedules are the result of numerous between board meetings members and full-time employes, in separate meetings. Village President Charles Miller commended the board Monday night for their cooperation and willingness to meet so many times. "It is a good feeling to know you want to work that I do appreciate it," said Mil-

Miller abstaining in the voting, a \$20 per month auto expense allowance for the village president was approved. Up to this time, there had been no allowance.

The board also voted to take care of the cost of adult volley ball and basketball evening sessions to be held weekly for the next several months in the middle school. It was estimated the cost should not exceed a total of

Board approval was also given to a certified survey map of the park land site purchased from Mrs. Viola Spoerl, which defines the outlines of the land parcel; to a certified survey map of

Mrs. Spoerl for the creation of two lots adjacent to and south of Roseland Hills Addition No. 2, which defines a small corner left over between the Schulz subdivision and the park land area; and to Mrs. Spoerl's consent and waiver for installation of sanitary sewers, water mains, laterals, storm sewer and curb and gutter. The consent and waiver is a formality that eliminates step-bystep procedures which would be otherwise required.

A width of 90 feet was es-Edgewood tablished for Road, being extended southward from Brooklane Drive to the south village limits, a distance of approximately 295.23 feet.

Approval was given to a request from Civil Defense Director Marvin Martin to attend a two-day conference in Madison and that he be reimbursed at \$25 per day plus motel expense.



### Form County Emergency Search And Rescue Snowmobile Patrol

It has been announced that the Washington County Association of Snowmobile Clubs, Inc., in cooperation with the Washington County Sheriff's Department, have established a County-Wide Emergency "Search and Res-cue Patrol" for the citizens of Washington County. The Patrol will be used only during an authorized emergency period. The Sheriff is authorized by Statute to declare such periods of emergency under Wisconsin Statutes 350.02(3).

Past experiences, during paralyzing snowstorms, have made it evident that emergency services are vitally needed.

All authorized patrol members are provided from the membership of most snowmobile clubs within Washington County. They will be provided with special blaze orange vests, officially marked, as emergency search and rescue patrol. When so offi-cially marked and authorized, they will be able to trav-el on the roads to provide emergency community services. Under present law, citizens are reminded that no one is allowed to operate a snowmobile on a roadway. Only those properly authorized by the Sheriff may do so during the time of emergen-

declared emergency period, provide necessary transportation for such people as Doctors, Veterinarians, Emergency Medical personnel and medical needs

People whose vital services are necessary to keep our area functioning, in a time of emergency, will also be provided with this free service.

Emergency telephone numbers for authorized people to call will be published shortly. Should any true emergency arise during a snowstorm they can call the Sheriff's Department or their local police agency who will, in turn, notify the patrol.

The patrol services, of the unit, will be assigned to patrol sections of roadway to render aid to stalled motorists, ill or injured motorists and will assist all law enforcement agencies, medical and ambulance personnel wherever needed.

Sheriff Clarence Schwartz wishes to caution all snowmobilers that only the authorized, marked patrol machines will be permitted to travel on the roadway dur-ing the period of the emergency. This free services to the community is another fine example of the splendid Community Service work done by members of organized snowmobile clubs. These fine efforts, by many people, should not be abused. We are asking the people to cooperate with the properly authorized patrol and to report the abuses of those not properly authorized.

The continuation of some services is vital to our community. It is the hope of the Washington County Sheriff's department and the Washington County Association of Snowmobile Clubs, Inc. that these services will provide a very necessary link to those in need during an emergency.







A fully trained bloodhound named Mannix was donated to the Washington County Sheriff's Department by Hylda Rose of McFarland, Wis. Mannix was presented to Sheriff Clarence Schwartz for the Department on Jan. 22, by Robert Scherff of West Bend. Scherff is President of the Kettle Moraine Kennel Club of West Bend. The Kennel Club provided Mannix with his six weeks basic training in tracking at a tracking school in Baraboo, Wis.

The Washington County Humane Society helped the Sheriff's Department find a person willing to maintain and handle Mannix. The one and a half year old dog will be cared for by Gene Fleisner of R. 1, Richfield. Fleisner, age 23, lives in the center portion of the county. He is self-employed in construction and owns a pickup truck with CB radio, all of which make him readily available to transport the dog anywhere at any time that he is needed for tracking.

Mannix is valued at \$500 and is registered with AKC. American Kennel Club. Man-

nix with his present training should keep on a track up to 24 hours old. With the proper handling and training he should be able to increase his ability to a 36 hour old trail. Mrs. Rose will give Mannix his final training in early spring with the handler, Gene Fleisner. Mrs. Rose has been raising, training, showing and breeding bloodhounds since 1945. Her ambition is to get bloodhounds in various parts of the state so that when they are needed tracking assignments, there will be a law enforcement agency with a dog within a few hours of the search. Mrs. Rose and her dogs have been called upon many times by law enforcement including agencies, Washington County Sheriff's Department. Many times because of the time that it takes to get to the scene of a search and other incidental

loss of time, the search becomes a tragedy. Mrs. Rose has donated bloodhounds to the Manitowoc Sheriff's Department, Cincinnati Police Department, Winfield, Ш., Police Department, and Wisconsin Crime Lab in Madison. Since that time, the Wisconsin Crime Lab has purchased another bloodhound to work as a team. The new federal prison authorities in Adams County have also inquired about the purchase and training of a bloodhound for their use.

There are many times when in the past a dog of this caliber has been used by our department. We have lost children, we have walkaways from homes for the aged, we have prisoner escapes, and there are times when we could have used them for seeking evidence at a crime scene. It is felt that if one life could be saved be-

cause of this dog, the effort and the time concerned would have been well spent.

The Sheriff's Department would like to thank all the various people, clubs and associations for their concern of giving and maintaining Mannix, ing in mind the advantage of having a bloodhound close to the Washington County area to give the citizens of this county one more advantage that it did not have before. It might also be noted that the services of Mannix will be available to all police agencies in the county as well as surrounding counties in the immediate area.
