## Oppenorth Speaker at Woman's Club 'Founder's Day Dinner'

With their husbands as guests, members of the Kewaskum Woman's Club held their annual "Founder's Day Dinner" here on Feb. 1 to mark the 62nd anniversary of the club's founding.

Club President Mrs. Charles Miller noted in her opening remarks that the club has been affiliated for the entire 62 years at the district, state and Federated Women's Clubs levels.

Special tribute was paid to Mrs. Louis T. Oppenorth, who with 43 years of continuous membership, has the distinction of being the member of longest standing. The speaker's table floral centerpiece was given to her by Mrs. Miller.

Speaker for the event held at Glacier Inn was Atty. Gerald Oppenorth of Madison, youngest of four children of Mrs. Oppenorth and the late Louis T. Oppenorth.

"Big Brothers" Organization was his topic. After his graduation from the University of Wisconsin - Madison Law School in 1967 and after six months in Europe, Atty. Oppenorth said he decided he wanted "to do things for people. I gave myself two years in law, promising to do something for young people." He is presently a member of a Madison law firm.

Uncluttered with creeds, "Big Brothers" is an organization designed for men willing to spend some time with fatherless boys on a one-to-

one basis, explained the young attorney. The program is for boys up to age 17.

"Big Brothers" deals with the preventive, rather than the after-the-fact concept of help. Atty. Oppenorth said he has made two observations about the organization, however. He said he believes that in some cases the wrong type of man is getting involved, observing that perhaps it is not fair to the boy to be matched with the professional man, that it might be better to have him work with a farmer or a tool and die maker instead.

His second observation was that a more and more different type of boy is getting involved in the organization, citing some of his own experiences with boys.

But Oppenorth firmly believes that "the one-to-one relationship is where it's at." Writing a generous check to a local community fund which apportions money to the various organizations is "a cop-out," Oppenorth believes. It is more important for a boy to have someone to whom he can turn for answers to his questions.

## School Board to Hire Negotiator

The Kewaskum Board of Education decided at its meeting Monday night to hire a negotiator for the district. The Board actually will contract with the Wisconsin Association of School Boards for this service, and one of their staff members, Ken Cole, will be assigned to Kewaskum. Costs to the district are for special services only. Any services normally rendered to districts by the WASB are not charged for. The fees are \$20 per hour for time spent in the district, \$10 per hour for work done in the WASB office and for travel time, plus mileage at 14c. Cole will begin at the session scheduled for Monday, Feb. 17.

The Board approved the purchase of two old, used cars for repair work in the auto mechanics class. This would present a good learning situation, and it would be possible to make use of or sell the cars after they are repaired.

Because of a big drop in student enrollment and difficulty in finding an instructor, the snowmobile safety course will not be held at the Middle School this year.

The Board went into executive session following the regular meeting to discuss negotiations, administrator contracts and possible contract non-renewals.

### ADA Meeting For Area Farmers

Dairy farmers from five area counties will gather at Waupun Feb. 19 for the annual business meeting of American Dairy Association (ADA) of Wisconsin District Five.

The meeting will be held in the Methodist Church Wesley Center starting at 11:30 a. m., for dairymen and their families from Dodge, Fond du Lac, Sheboygan, Ozaukee and Washington counties.

After a hot noon meal, the business session will begin at 1:30 p. m., and adjournment is scheduled for 3 p. m.

Members attending will

receive a complete financial statement for 1974 as well as a detailed report on program activities and results of the past year.

Members also will elect district committeemen and delegates who will, in turn, elect district officers, representatives to the state resolutions committee and representatives to the state ADA board of directors.

Elements of ADA of Wisconsin's current program of dairy farmer-financed advertising, promotion, public relations and research also will be discussed.

### Final Meeting For Emergency Loans to Farmers

Effective Dec. 18, 1974, Milwaukee, Washington and Ozaukee Counties were designated as disaster areas by the Secretary of Agriculture. These counties are eligible for Emergency Loans to farmers for damages and losses caused by killing frost on Sept. 21, 22 and 23, 1974.

The fourth and final meeting will be held on Friday, Feb. 14. Farmers Home Administration in West Bend is accepting applications for these Emergency Loans, and is presenting the meeting to assist applicants in filling out the necessary forms and answering any questions on this program. The meeting will be

held at the Court House, 432 E. Washington St. in West Bend, starting at 10:00 a. m. on Friday, Feb. 14. The meeting room is Auditorium No. 2, on the ground floor.

Applications are being received daily at the Farmers Home Administration office at 2395 W. Washington St., West Bend. (Tel. 334-7850). Anyone interested contact this office for application forms. The West Bend office serves Milwaukee, Washington and Ozaukee Counties.

It is necessary to have sustained a 10 per cent loss of total farming operation to be eligible for a Disaster Loan. Interest rate is 5 per cent. There is no forgiveness (grant). There is no check for credit elsewhere. Applicants are urged to file applications as soon as possible.

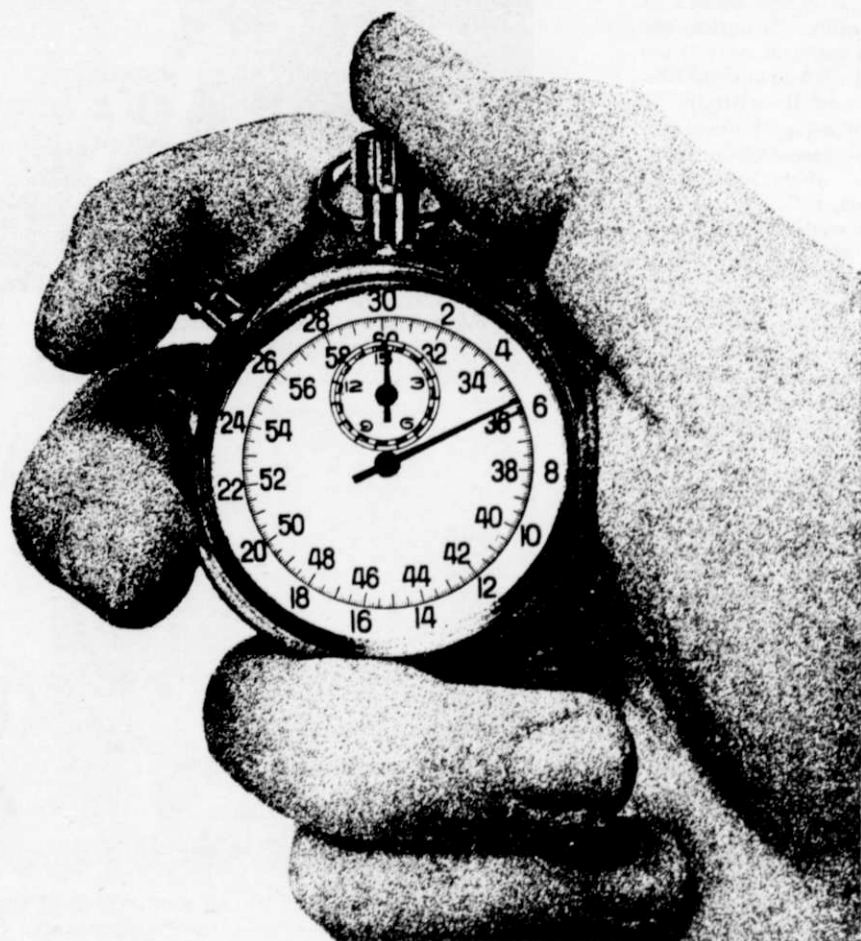

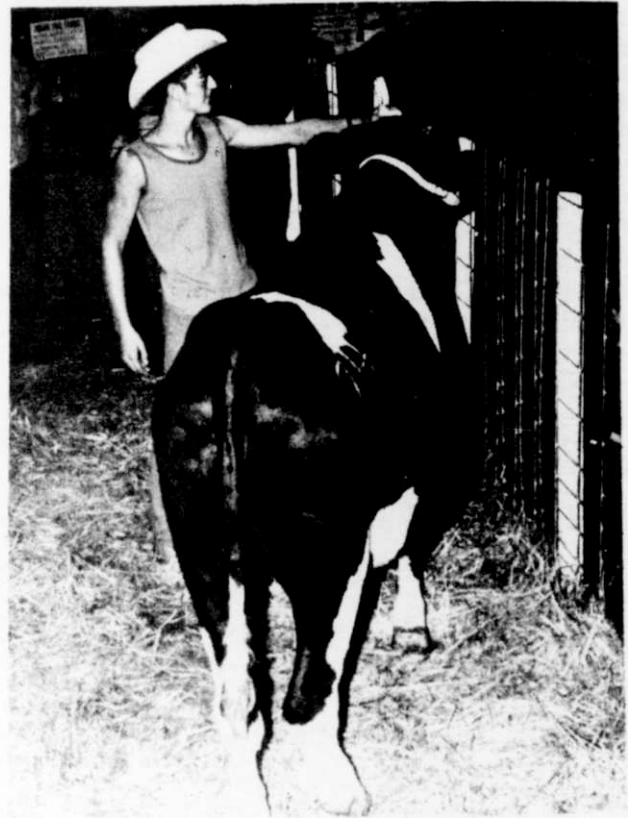

## Archbishop's Fund Appeal Begins Feb. 16

With the start of the 1975 Archbishop's Fund Appeal only a few days away, campaign leaders in Washington County made final preparations for an all-out effort to reach the county's \$116,000 goal.

The Fund appeal will begin officially Feb. 16 in the 285 parishes and missions of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, although advance solicitations have already begun in some of Washington County's 21 parishes and missions. The total Fund Appeal goal for the ten counties of the Archdiocese has been set at \$3,310,000. The Washington County goal represents a 3.5% share of the total goal.

Leo F. Schlaefler, Washington County chairman, called on Fund Appeal leaders and workers to stimulate increased participation by individual Catholics in the 1975 Fund Appeal.

"Increased participation is the key to our success in 1975," Schlaefler said.

"It will take a lot of work and a lot of sacrifice by many, many people, but if we have that kind of effort and that kind of response we can reach our goal."

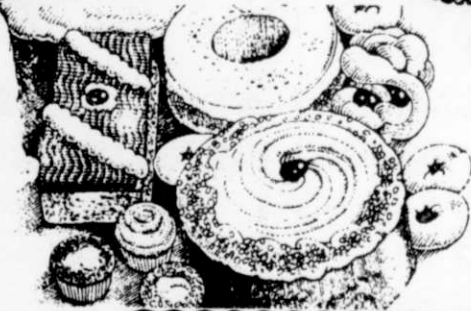



## County Licenses 7,517 Dogs in 1974

The total number of dogs licensed in 1974 in Washington County was 7,517, County Clerk George F. Nehrbass reported this week.

The City of West Bend reported the greatest number of licensed dogs with 1,291, followed closely by the Town

of Richfield with 862. The Village of Germantown reported the smallest number with 71 licensed dogs. Total receipts from all districts in Washington County were \$9,979.00.

The State Department of Agriculture supplies the tags and collects 5% of the total collections. Any other expenses, such as receipt books, dog affidavits indicating

death or disposal of a dog, and dog pound expenses are paid from this fund. Dog damage claims are also paid out of this fund, and last year Washington County paid \$1,185.14 in claims. Any injured or dead livestock must be viewed by the town board filing the claim for a resident.

Any surplus in the fund over and above \$1,000.00 is

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## Leading Grafton Defeats Indians With Last Quarter Barrage, 69-52

Leading Grafton broke open a close game with a last quarter barrage to down Kewaskum, 69-52, in a key contest before a noisy, standing room only crowd here Friday night. There was even some "extra-curricular" activity among the students of these rival schools after the game.

The victory moved Grafton (8-2) back into undisputed first place as Kettle Moraine was upset by Germantown, while the loss dropped Kewaskum (6-4) into 4th place and terminated a 3-game winning streak. The setback also faded the Indians' title hopes as they are now 2 games behind with 4 to go.

It was a real tight contest for three quarters and it appeared like the outcome would go right down to the wire. Grafton led by 1 point at the quarter, 13-12, and their lead remained at 1 at halftime, 25-24. It was still a barn burner at the end of three periods, with the Blackhawks only ahead by 3, 43-40. Kewaskum hung in there until the last 5 minutes when Grafton went on a rampage and scored 15 straight points to take a bulging lead in a game that was closer than the final score indicates.

The Indians took an early 4-0 lead on two rebound shots by Mike Koepke but Grafton tied it up and the rest of the quarter was tight. It was the same story in the 2nd period with the lead changing hands. It was still close in the 3rd quarter with the Blackhawks taking a 3-point lead at its end before Grafton broke loose in the last stanza with a commanding 17-point advantage. Guard Rick Hubacek made a 3-point play to spark Grafton's late surge.

Hubacek led all scorers with 22 points and Wollner added 17. Mike Koepke was tops for Kewaskum with 19. Don Gruber, who was 6th in Scenic scoring, was held to 10 points, while Koepke, who was 8th, bettered his average of 14.1. Being held to 52 points hurt the Indians on offense, who were leading the conference with an average of 73.4 per game.

In other games Germantown upset Kettle Moraine, 60-52, as mentioned above. Hartland gained a tie for 2nd by beating Slinger, 72-65, and Mayville edged Pewaukee in 2 overtimes, 62-60.

The JV's beat Grafton for their 5th in a row, 52-41, and are now 6-4. Center Leon Laatsch led the way again with 20 points, 14 of them in the 4th quarter when Kewaskum forged from behind to win. The winners hit 16 of 20 free throws.

The Indians have an equally tough assignment this Friday when they travel to Hartland to face the 2nd place team on their own floor. Kewaskum won the first game here. Then Tuesday the Indians play at Slinger. The Owls beat Kewaskum on their home floor in the first outing.
