All dogs in Washington County, over 5 months of age, must be licensed by Feb. 28. After this date, if no license is obtained, owners will be reported to the District Attorney. State Statute 174.10 provides for a maximum penalty of \$500.00 for harboring an unlicensed dog. Officers may enter the premises of the owner to seize an unlicensed dog. The li-cense fee is \$1.00 for male and spayed female dogs and \$2.00 for female dogs. Some municipalities charge additional fees.

This dog license may be obtained from your local treasurer - the treasurer of the town, village or city in which you reside. Payment for the license can be made when real estate taxes are paid.

It is not necessary for local treasurers to remind dog owners that they must obtain a license. This is the responsibility of the dog owner.


