Older Adults Bus to Provide Free Transportation

Members of the local senior citizens XYZ Club had a chance to inspect the older adults bus that will provide free transportation to persons over 60 years of age under the Older Adults under the Transportation Program that officially begins March 3 in Washington County.

The van-type bus is tour-ing senior citizens centers designated sites this month and it was here in Kewaskum last Wednesday during the weekly meeting of the XYZ Club.

The bus will be available for pre-arranged medical and dental appointments; for social services and library visits; and for food shopping, if necessary, according to Mrs. Mervin Thompson, program director of the XYZ Club.

It is not necessary to be a member of any senior citizens group in order to use the bus. However, there must be four or more persons per trip. A special feature of the 16-passenger vehicle is a lift for anyone in a wheel chair. A schedule of when and where it will pick up riders will be published in the Kewaskum Statesman at a later date, Mrs. Thompson

Gary Sauter of Hartford has been hired as chauffeur. He has experience as a driver of a commercial vehicle. The new bus was obtained by Washington County through funding of the Title 3 Older American Act. The Hartford Municipal Recreation Department will service and maintain it.

School Board to Eliminate Some Teachers on Budget Cuts

The Kewaskum Board of Education accepted the resignations from three teachers at its Monday night, Feb. 24, meeting held at the Ad-ministration Office. The teachers resigning are: Mrs. Rebecca Erber, Language Arts, at the Middle School, Monica Sierp, 6th grade, at the Kewaskum Elementary School, and Minerva Martin, 6th grade, also at the Kewaskum Elementary School.

A lengthy discussion regarding the estimated 1975-76 budgets made up a major part of the meeting. It was unanimous decision that a first grade position at the Kewaskum Elementary be eliminated because of the decrease in the number of students at that grade level. It was also unanimous that one ½ time Kindergarten teacher be cut from the district staff. The elimination of a Business Education teacher at the High School received an unanimous vote of approval. These cuts had been recommended by the administrative staff.

It was proposed to cut back on 2 teachers on the Middle School staff, not as a desirable cut, but out of budget necessity. On a 4-3 vote, the Board cut four Middle School staff members, with Allen Tessar, Jerry Secor, and Tom Gundrum voting against cutting four members. A vote to cut the administrative assistant at the high school was unanimous. The Board voted in favor of passing a resolution to ask the Village to provide sidewalks to Bel-Ric to eliminate the bussing expense. This would lengthen other bus routes and help eliminate some routes, thereby a cost savings for the district will be realized.

An unanimous vote was cast to eliminate summer school unless the state would decide to fund this area of education again. The district will keep the kindergarten screening, pre-kindergarten program and possible begining band program.

The Board adjourned to an executive session following the regular board meeting.

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Norbert Dettmann Attends National SWCD Convention

The National Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCD) held their annual convention at Denver, Colo. from Feb. 2 to 6. Two thousand district supervisors from 50 states attended including 28 from Wisconsin counties.

Norbert Dettmann, Washington county supervisor and president of the Wisconsin Assoc. of Conservation Dis-tricts, carried the vote of Wisconsin districts to the floor of the national council to decide the nation-wide policy of the local counties. One of the major points at the Denver convention was a stand on federal landuse legislation in this year's congress. The association believes that the need is here for proper landuse and that most decisions must be made at the local and state levels of government.

Washington and Ozaukee county citizens are fortunate in having broad zoning laws for 30 years. In recent years these laws have been strengthened by use of the soil survey to determine the best use of the land. However, in many parts of Wisconsin and the United States, people are first being exposed to zoning and landuse laws.

World wide energy and food shortages were emphasized at the convention. A water shortage by the year of 2000 could be of a more serious nature than the energy shortage in 1975. A food shortage would be tied directly to the water shortage. The amount of agriculture products are tied directly to the amount of soil and water available to produce the crops. There has been good weather for crops for about 35 years. The pendulum could swing the other way and there would be much starvation. The soil and water conservation movement

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acknowledge these facts and re-emphasized their stand at the convention that American agriculture needs production with protection.

We are fortunate in Washington and Ozaukee counties to have so many land owners and land users cooperating in the district's soil and water conservation programs. Services of the Washington county district office at 2395 W. Washington St., West W. Washington St., Bend, and the Ozaukee county office, Courthouse, Port Washington, are available to assist landowners and units of government with proper land management.

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

Breast cancer is the most deadly killer of women 35 to 50 years of age. It is also the number one cause of deaths from cancer at any age for the female population. Eighty percent of all tumors which take seven years to grow the size of a nickel in the breasts, are found by women themselves. Until recent years, the only detection a woman had for breast cancer was her own monthly examination and her doctor's yearly examination.

In the past ten years, the x-ray of the breasts, called mammography, has become a highly refined and specific test to determine breast cancer in a much earlier stage. Where routine annual x-rays are used for women over 35 years of age, more than 50 percent of the cancers that will be found, cannot be felt by the patient or the doctor. Most national experts in the field of mammography re-commend that every woman past the age of 35 have an x-ray of the breasts at least once a year, to be sure that she does not have a breast cancer. This is as important for every woman as is a yearly pap test.

Thermography is a examination done with an infrared sensor camera to detect those women who have increased heat in the breasts. This examination can be done on a mass mobile basis to identify with even more certainty, those women who should have an annual mammogram. Any woman with a hot thermogram has two reasons for an annual x-ray: one, that it is recommended as a routine, and two, the indications of a hot pattern adds the second incentive for having a breast x-ray.

The Wisconsin Breast Cancer Detection Foundation has been established to see that in the near future every woman in the State of Wisconsin obtain annual thermograms just as an annual pap. The Foundation is creating much interest by providing the women and the doctors education and service in the use of mammograms and thermograms in screening for breast cancer. These tests will find cancer that is not otherwise found.

The Wisconsin Breast Cancer Detection Foundation has a mobile thermography

screening program. Its sole purpose is to encourage and to educate as many women to have an annual mammogram, and to this end, we are using thermography as a method to encourage theis pro-cedure. We hope that the leadership of your community will recognize the technical as well as educational need to do more for earlier breast cancer detection; and the Foundation is at the service of any of your readers or any local organizations, both to educate about and provide the service of this screening technique.
