Village Officials Given First Look at New Park Sketches

Village officials were given their first look at rough sketches of possible layouts of Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park during their Monday night meeting. The Kiwanis Club has donated \$77,000 toward park costs.

Last September, village officials entered into agreement with Arthur and Associates of Fond du Lac to prepare comprehensive park layout and plans for the 35-acre park at the west village limits.

Monday night Jim Arthur presented five different sketches for board consideration. Each contained the same facilities but some were in varied locations on the park land. Several plans called for a one-acre lake, others for a two-acre lake, each with a field house.

Besides the pool, about 15 acres is laid out for playground and picnic areas. Also included are two tennis courts, horseshoe courts, a softball diamond and parking area for 175 or 236 cars, depending on the plan.

Arthur said his planner, Elmer Krueger, had made use of land contours in his planning. He said Krueger had met with Trustee Elmer Yoost and through him had obtained information of what was wanted in the way of facilities. After being told that Yoost and other board members had seen and liked the Winneconne Village Park, Arthur and Krueger went to Winneconne to gather as much information as they could about it.

Arthur asked for board input and suggestions Monday night in order to come up with a master plan that will fill the bill.

Among the suggestions from board members and the audience were adding archery courts, four tennis courts instead of two, basketball courts, a Little League field, more softball diamonds in view of present shortages and also parking space on the west side of the park near the ball diamond and near the picnic area, in addition to the 236 spaces on the east side. It was felt there should be an accessway for an ambulance.

The planned swimming lake would be fed by continuously flowing spring, the flow of which could be accentuated by excavation, it was pointed out. Arthur said the lake can be used for ice skating in winter. Included in the planning are installation of bituminous walkways, drinking fountains, a sprinkler system and fencing around the lake. All facilities will be lighted, he said. He suggested the field house be architecturally designed to insure some aesthetic qualities.

Following his presentation, Arthur named one plan, which contains a two-acre lake, as his recommendation.

No action was taken by the board. The same presentation, with suggested additions, will be made to the Kiwanis Club Monday night. The Village Plan Commission will also go over the plans.

The park will be developed in stages with the swimming lake the No. 1 priority. Entrance to the park will be via Edgewood Road.

School Board President Dr. Charles Ogi was present to ask village officials to take under consideration building sidewalks to the Bel-Ric Acres subdivision so students could walk to school and eliminate present bussing. It would save the district about \$8,000 annually, Ogi said.

Village President Charles Miller told Ogi that the matter came up before and the questions always have been where will the sidewalks be built and who will pay for them. They would have to be built alongside the west edge of Highway 45 and there is a hill to contend with. Miller noted that the village has had engineers look at the situation in the past, trying to decide where to build a sidewalk.

According to a village ordinance, property owners involved along the way must share in the cost. Other ramifications are who will clear the walks in winter; and if this sidewalk is installed, will it prompt other residents, without walks, to also ask for them.

The west side of the highway in question is in village limits while the east side is in the Town of Kewaskum. Miller assured Ogi that "we will definitely talk about it and maybe involve the Town of Kewaskum." Sidewalks could be also used by children in the trailer court and save those bussing costs.

Authorization was given to buy screens on windows in the lift station in the park, according to an estimate of \$170, to prevent windows from constantly being broken and to purchase a scanner for the police car up to a cost of \$200. The scanner would monitor fire and ambulance calls.

A recommendation by Police Chief Doris Hlavaty, tabled last month, to elevate one officer on his force from patrolman to sergeant fell by the wayside. None of the board members spoke in favor of it. After a six-month probation period, the sergeant would have received \$20 per month more pay.

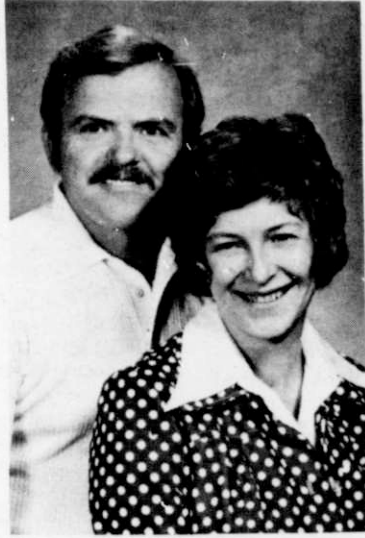

CUT THIS TEACHER OUT

Cutting out quality education in Kewaskum is exactly what will happen if our teaching staff is reduced as a result of proposed Kewaskum School Board action.

Few teachers means soaring class sizes. Children will be squeezed together and receive less personal attention and less of the the 3 R's. As much as 20% less.

WHAT ABOUT COSTS

Obviously the board must be fiscally responsible. Governor Lucey's proposed budget would, if passed, limit expenses for education. It is however, only a proposal. And why can other surrounding districts maintain present class size ratios and not Kewaskum?

We believe that sufficient funds are available. For example surplus funds should first be exhausted. Federal grants might be sought. Or unnecessary expenditures could be eliminated such as the \$20,000 a year hired negotiator.

The point is that many reductions can be made which would be less detrimental to your child's education than to reduce the number of teachers.

Petri Speaks To Kewaskum GOP Chapter

State Senator Thomas Petri, Fond du Lac, was the speaker at a meeting Monday, Feb. 24, of the Kewaskum Chapter of the Republican Party. Sen. Petri spoke to the group, answered questions, and also sought the opinions of his constituents on several matters now pending before the legislature.

The Senator discussed the Governor's budget, which is being considered daily. He informed the group that the "budget" includes many items not strictly budgetary, such as the governor's plan to replace Citizens' Boards with a Cabinet of Advisers.

Petri discussed the governor's proposal to impose tuition fees for vocational school students, indicating his opposition to the proposal with regard to vocational education, although perhaps not to "recreational" courses.

The proposal to aid in campaign financing through the state income tax contribution of \$1.00 to any party

is opposed by Sen. Petri. He feels people should not be identified as to party membership on their income tax returns.

In the discussion of strikes by public employees, Petri indicated he is in favor of finding an improved method of arbitration. He is looking into the "sudden death" arbitration, as used in baseball, as a compromise solution.

Petri also discussed the unfairness of the Governor in imposing a 9% increase limit on local governments after having proposed to "dump" many new and extra costs on them. One example of extra cost to local government that he cited is the transferral of pension expense for teachers to local boards.

The Senator indicated he is opposed to an increase in State gasoline taxes now.

To a question about a state lottery, Sen. Petri answered that he was originally opposed, and feels gambling is a waste, but now feels that perhaps the question should be allowed to come to the people in the form of a referendum, passage of which would then necessitate a change in the Constitution.

The meeting was held at the Valley Bank Community room. Constituents were present from Fond du Lac and Washington counties, and participation was lively. Sev-

Tri-County Civic Group Will Meet At Boltonville

Creation of River Basin authorities which would effect the lives of all residents in the upper Milwaukee River basin, will be discussed at the March 11 meeting of Tri-County Civic Association. The 8 p. m. meeting will be held at the Boltonville Firemen's hall.

According to association President Ed Bocher, Rt. 1, Fredonia, several bills have been introduced in the state legislature to create these authorities and also one that would replace SEWRPC with a metropolitan council. These authorities and council would be headed by appointed officials and would have dominance over local elected representatives. Their authority would range from land-use control to taxation. For example land could be condemned for recreational uses

for the metropolitan areas. Transportation, sewage systems, water facilities and population control through land-use would all be under the scope of these authorities. Renewed insistence for a Waubeka reservoir is another possibility.

The officers of Tri-County warn area residents not to become complacent. Vigilance is necessary to combat the powerful lobby of the Mil-

waukee area. All residents of Washington, Sheboygan and Ozaukee counties are invited to attend the meeting and become informed.

Also on the agenda is discussion pro and con on nuclear power plants. George R. O'Mahoney, an electrical engineer, who has worked at the state's nuclear power plants, will be present to answer some questions.





AMPI Meeting Attended by 300 County Members

"Farmers have got to get together to raise milk prices. It is more important now because cheap milk is coming in to undercut prices — and that's not the way to put more money in farmers' pockets."

That was the message Monday night of William Schroeder, West Bend, president of district 8-B of the Associated Milk Producers, Inc. Attending the meeting were more than 300 members from West Bend, Kewaskum and Hartford.

Robert Beck, Lodi, membership director of AMPI, explained how the co-op and 15 other Wisconsin cooperatives have bargained for higher prices, but have had to lower prices in some areas to meet the "cheap milk sales" of the National Farmers Organization and Farmers Union.

"The cheaper milk prices have not resulted in lower prices to the consumer," Beck said.

The meeting was held at St. Frances Cabrini parish hall, West Bend.

Beck noted that 17,000 Chicago grade A farmers lost \$4.5 million last year as a result of having to meet the dumping of milk on the market by the NFO and FU.

"This is so needless, because we have invited over and over both organizations to join us and present a solid price front that doesn't undercut the farmer nor gouge the consumer. If consumers benefited from the price cutting they might have a point, but consumers never see cheap milk," Beck said.

He told the AMPI members to contact their neighbors and explain the need for working together because "dairymen can't afford lower milk prices with current recession and inflation problems."

Paul Affeldt, Sparta, AMPI Mid-States Region president, pointed out that according to the Houston (Tex.) Bank for Cooperatives, AMPI is in one of the strongest financial positions of any dairy co-op in the nation.

AMPI has a ratio of \$1.62 in assets for every \$1 of debt,

he reported.

Affeldt warned, however, that the economic picture indicates hard times ahead for the dairy industry. In his opinion, 1975 will not be easy for the dairy farmer.

Kewaskum Ousts Cougars in Sub Regional, Face Kiel in Regional

In Sub Regional Tournament play at Campbellsport Tuesday night, Kewaskum beat Campbellsport on their home floor for the second time this season, 68-54, and Kiel had little trouble ousting Lomira, 70-44. The two winners will advance to the Regional Tourney at Sheboygan Falls Friday and Saturday.

The Indians will face Kiel in the opening game at 7 p. m. Friday and Sheboygan Falls will meet New Holstein in the second contest at 8:30. Holstein routed Random Lake Tuesday and Falls drew a bye. Kiel, which finished No. 2 in the state tournament at Madison last year, wound up the season in third place in the Packerland Conference and has an overall record of 15-4. Falls, (14-3), Class B champion in the state tournament last year (beating Kiel), shared the Packerland title this year with Algoma (both 12-1) and split in two meetings against Kiel.
