Village, School Board Candidates Tell Qualifications for Office

The voters of the Kewaskum area will have an opportunity to hear candidates for the Village Board and the School Board this coming Tuesday evening, March 18, in the Kewaskum High School Cafeteria.

The Kewaskum Woman's Club and the Washington County League of Women Voters are co-sponsoring the Forum which will start at 7 p. m. with the appearance of the Village Board candidates. Running for the three open trustee positions are incumbents Alfred Kral, Daniel Schmidt, Roger Strack and challengers Oscar Knoeck, David Nigh and Roger Schmitt. Charles Miller, unopposed, seeks the village presidency again.

In response to the question, "Why do you feel qualified to be an effective village board member?" David Nigh made the following statement: "Having been an area resident my entire life, I have a deep concern in all matters that will affect our village, not only for the present, but also for the future. These are challenging times we live in and I would like to take an active part in some of the decisions concerning our community."

Roger Schmitt stated, "I have lived in the village for the past 13 years, been a member of the Kewaskum Fire Dept. and Rescue Squad for the last 8½ years, and have been a home owner and taxpayer of the village for the last 7 years. I have attended 18 monthly board meetings in the last 22 months so you can see I am interested in what the village board is doing at the present time."

Daniel Schmidt said, "I am a concerned and dedicated citizen of our community. I have researched the different issues and worked hard with others on them and have tried to maintain an open mind on the issues. I have tried to make myself more knowledgeable on the different subjects in which the Village is commonly involved. This I have done by attending federal, state and county sessions.

When asked about what he felt was the major problem with the Village at present, David Nigh mentioned "the economy, inflation and rising prices. I feel one item in most people's mind is how to hold the line on taxes and to get the most value out of every tax dollar spent." Daniel Schmidt likewise felt the local, state and federal economy to be the main problem at present.

At 8:30 p. m. candidates for the Kewaskum Scho.! Board will present their views. Vying for the three seats are the incumbents James Oelhafen, Charles Ogi, Allen Tessar and challenger Dan Stoffel.

Blood Bank to Be Held Mar. 25

The Kewaskum Blood Bank will be held on Tuesday, March 25, from 1:00 to 7:00 p. m. in the high school gym.

This year something new will be tried. The hours of 1:00 to 2:30 will be designated for high school students but no other donor should be discouraged from coming if the hours after 2:30 are impossible. You will be taken with the students. Everyone is needed!

You may donate at age 17 if your parent or guardian signs a consent form. If you are 18 or over, you can make your own decision to be a donor. You may donate to age 66 if you have been a regular donor (at least once a year); if not a regular donor, then to age 60. You may donate once every 10 weeks or 5 times per year.

If you have a medical history of hepatitis or jaundice due to hepatitis, or diabetes requiring regular insulin therapy, you will not be able to donate. You will be unable to donate for 6 months after: pregnancy, travels to a country with a malaria problem or major surgery.

All donors must eat a low fat meal 4 hours prior to donating. You must have had at least 6 hours of sleep the night before. You must weigh at least 110 pounds.

In reply to the question on their qualifications to be an effective school board member, Dan Stoffel stated, "I feel the basic requirements of an effective school board member are concern for the welfare of the schools in the district and to have the time available to do a proper job of managing the business of the district. I think I can honestly say that I fulfill these two requirements, and my interest in giving the people of the district the best education possible within the limitations of the system is also important."

To the same questions James Oelhafen said, "As a businessman, I feel I am acquainted with the problems of the area. My entire life has been spent in the Kewaşkum School district, ranging from student, to parent, to taxpayer . . . gaining valuable experience in each phase. The experience gained in my first term of office gave me the ambition to want to continue."

Allen Tessar commented, "This is a very broad question, however, I feel the priresponsibility of a board member is to the student. We must offer the best education possible at a reasonable cost to the taxpayer. This education must be directed to all students not just potential college students."

Responding to the question of major problems in the school system at present Dan Stoffel said, "I think the major problems of the school system can be looked upon in a positive rather than a negative light. First, I think school board - teacher relations must be improved so that the two become a more cohesive group rather than groups on opposite poles of many issues. Second, we must keep a careful watch on the population trends in our district as the population influences any further building needs. Whether we follow the rest of the state with leveled-off population growth or not should be observed so that we do not end up with empty rooms. Third, debt retirement should be completed on the present bondings as soon as possible."

According to James Oel-"Problems are everhafen. present in any educational system, but I see no major problems that an open mind and positive atittude cannot solve. It takes a combined effort of all parties concerned to eliminate problems as they occur."

Allen Tessar felt, "I would prefer to be positive and state that we can be very proud of the majority of our administration, staff and student population. Few schools are offering the curriculum of Kewaskum at the same cost per student ratio. We had excellent guidance in our building program with the problems involved. The potential problem is the misin-terpretation of misleading statements by a few looking for personal gain."

There will be an opportunity for written questions from the audience as well as informal discussions with coffee and refreshments immediately following both Forums.

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

When they were built in the late 1880's by Rosenheimer Brothers the buildings pictured above must have added a sense of job security to Kewaskum residents. The business was incorporated in 1891 and the name was changed to its present name of L. Rosenheimer Malt and Grain Company. The brothers chose the name to honor their father, the first L. Rosenheimer.

The building on the left was the elevator; the low part, the malt house; the tall buildings contained the kilns: the 3 large storage tanks were usually used for storing

In September of 1911 the elevator burned to the ground with some damage to the malt house. The elevator was rebuilt to the south of its original location. The business is still thriving today and is owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Kroncke. Mrs. Kroncke is a granddaughter of one of the found-



Kettle Moraine State Forest North Unit Notes Increase in Visitor Use

Despite the country's energy and economic problems, the Kettle Moraine State Forest-North Unit experienced a significant increase in visitor use in 1974. Nearly 800,000 recreational visits, and 130,000 camper days were recorded during the 1974 calendar year.

A camper reservation system was put into effect dur-ing the 1974 summer season. The reservation bill passed by the Legislature allows up to 50 percent of the campsites to be placed on a resererally favorably


eration on weekends. In addition, snowmobiling is allowed on designated trails.

While the lack of adequate snowfall has curtailed skiing and snowmobiling for much of the winter season, has been considerable ice fishing and hunting activity on the forest.

Indians Edged Out by Rated Kiel Team in Regional, 50-46

The Kewaskum Indians gave Kiel one heck of a battle before being edged out in the opening game of the WIAA Class B Regional Tournament at Sheboygan Falls Friday night, 50-46.

Sheboygan Falls and Kiel were the No. 1 and 2 finishers last year in the State Tournament at Madison, with the Falls Falcons winning the state Class B title by beating the Kiel Raiders in the finals. Falls (now 16-3) shared the Packerland Conference title this year with Algoma, while Kiel (16-5) took third.

In the second game Friday, defending state champ Falls had to come from behind in the final minutes to nip a stubborn New Holstein team, 70-63. In the Regional finals Saturday night Falls downed Kiel, 69-57, for the title and will advance to the Whitewater Sectional this weekend. Other Regional winners in the Whitewater Sectional along with Falls will be Ripon (Horicon Regional winner), Whitewater (Jefferson Regional winner) and Elk-(Edgerton winner). Sectional winners go to state the next weekend.

Both Falls and Kiel were rated in the state polls this year among the top 20 teams.

Kewaskum, which placed 4th in the Scenic Moraine with an 8-6 mark and wound up with an overall 12-8 mark, was only trailing Kiel by 2 points late in the game and had the Raiders stalling and hanging on for dear life in the last 35 seconds. The Indi-

ans missed a chance to tie it up when 2 close-up shots by Mike and Randy Koepke rimmed the hoop but wouldn't go in in the closing seconds. Kiel rebounded and an intentional foul by the Indians to get posesssion of the ball gave the Raiders 2 free throws for a 4-point lead at the end as they held off Kewaskum in the last few seconds.

Kewaskum played one of its best games of the season, especially defensively, against Kiel. The game was close throughout and the Indians led by as many as 4 points early in the 3rd quarter but their shooting cooled off. Kewaskum's press was able to control Kiel's offense pretty well. They went into a press to compensate for the Raiders' tall front line led by 6-6 Eric Hermanson and 6-4 Dave Felton. Kiel was just too tall for the Indians.

Trailing 12-9 at the quarter, Kewaskum rallied for a 25-25 tie at halftime, although they shot only 27 per cent in the first half on 9 of 32 shots. The Indians' shooting improved in the second half with 31 per cent on 17 of 54. Kiel made 21 of 48 attempts for a 44 per cent average. Rebounding was also a big factor with the tall Raiders holding a 35-25 ad-

vantage.

Randy Koepke, normally a
real good outside shooter who

was held scoreless.

Felton paced Kiel with 18 points, while giant Hermanson added 12 and Calvin

Zorn scored 11, all in the first half, as he got into foul trouble. Scott Koth, who finished the season strong for Kewaskum, led all scorers with 19 and Don Gruber chipped in 16.
