## Many Changes Through the Years

### Open House at Miller's Large Furniture Expansion



The above photograph of the old original Miller's Furniture Store and the huge newly enlarged store which has just been completed show the progress made by Miller's through the years.

Attached to the rear of the store is a large warehouse. This makes a far greater, convenient, practical and economical operation to serve their customers even better

than before.

Miller's of Kewaskum has been well known in both the furniture business and funeral service for many years: In 1910 Mr. and Mrs. Edward F. Miller (parents and grandparents of the present owners) purchased the business from Frank Zwaschka, which at that time was a rather small store with living quarters upstairs. In 1928 E. E. "Pat" Miller joined his

parents in the business, and shortly thereafter a 40' x 60' addition was added to the rear of the old store. On January 2, 1942, the old store was destroyed by fire. Due to wartime restrictions they could not rebuild immediately, so Miller's Furniture was temporarily located in the old Marx Building on Main Street until April, 1946, when their large new furniture

store was ready for occupancy.

Miller's of Kewaskum has long been a family business, as at an early age "Pat's" brothers Joe and Fred also became active in the business, and then through the years so did his children, Mary Ellen, Donna, Joan, Ed, Isabelle, Ted and Clare, daughter-in-law Sharron, and wife Virginia.

## Refunding \$430,000 in Building Notes Major Item at School Board Session

Refunding \$430,000 in building notes was a major item on the agenda of the Kewaskum School Board Monday evening. The refunding will pay off notes coming due on the original Farmington building and on the 1966 High School addition. The board passed resolutions authorizing issuing notes for refunding and to publish the notice of sale. Ray Osnes of First Wisconsin was present to discuss the notes. The Board also authorized calling notes dated January 1, 1966 in the amount of \$265,000.

With the refunding, the district has its debt service set up so that all taxes for present debts would be levied by the 1983-84 school year. After that year, the district would have paid all of its building debts, assuming no further building is necessary before that time. The dollar levies for each year would remain at or below the levy for the present school year.

In other business, Gene Bohn made presentations to the Board on some insurance coverage the Board would want to consider. This included all-risk insurance to cover water damage from piping breaks, etc., as well as extra expense coverage at the high school in the event something happened to cause the buildings to be temporarily unuseable for school purposes. The third

area would add to the glass protection since certain types of breakage are not presently covered.

Authorization was given to pay a bill to Westra Construction for \$17,301.50. This covers some remodeling costs necessary in the new buildings. They included wall coverings for remodeling the TMR room at the Kewaskum Elementary School, carpeting for the two classrooms at the same school which opened into the new addition, and a water heater at the High School to serve the locker and shower area to be put into the old building. The Board also approved the ordering of Tarkett for the High School gym floor. The district will handle this and receive a credit of some \$38,000 on its final payments to Westra Construction.

The Board approved April 11 as a snow makeup day. This was originally scheduled as a teacher convention day.

## Blood Bank to Be Held Mar. 25

The Kewaskum Blood Bank will be held on Tuesday, March 25, from 1:00 to 7:00 p. m. in the high school gym.

This year something new will be tried. The hours of 1:00 to 2:30 will be designated for high school students but no other donor should be discouraged from coming if the hours after 2:30 are impossible. You will be taken with the students. Everyone is needed!

You may donate at age 17 if your parent or guardian signs a consent form. If you are 18 or over, you can make your own decision to be a donor. You may donate to age 66 if you have been a regular donor (at least once a year); if not a regular donor, then to age 60. You may donate once every 10 weeks or 5 times per year.

If you have a medical history of hepatitis or jaundice due to hepatitis, or diabetes requiring regular insulin therapy, you will not be able to donate. You will be unable to donate for 6 months after: pregnancy, travels to a country with a malaria problem or major surgery.

All donors must eat a low fat meal 4 hours prior to do-

ating. You must have had at least 6 hours of sleep the night before. You must weigh at least 110 pounds.

### INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

The following instructions are given for the information and guidance of electors:

(a) Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of 2 ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

(b) To vote for a person whose name is printed on the ballot, make a cross (X) or mark in the square after the name of the person for whom you desire to vote. To vote for a person whose name is not printed on the ballot, write the name in the blank space provided for the purpose.

(c) The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

(d) After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

(e) An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. If an elector declares that he is visually handicapped, he may have anyone assist him in marking his ballot. The presiding official may administer an oath as to a person's disability.

(f) Any qualified elector who is absent, or expects to be absent from the village in which he is a qualified elector, or who, because of sickness or physical disability cannot appear at the polling place on election day, may vote at such election by means of an absent voter's ballot to be secured upon application to the Village Clerk, not more than sixty days and no less than three days, or by personal application, not later than the close of office hours on the day prior to such election.

**INFORMATION TO ELECTORS**

Voting instructions shall be given substantially as follows:

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of two ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

At a non-partisan election, the elector shall place a cross or other mark in the square at the right of the candidates name for each office for whom he intends to vote or insert or write in the name of his choice for a candidate.

If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsement and ballot clerk's initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may be assisted by two election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. If an elector declares that he is visually handicapped, he may have anyone assist him in marking his ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath as to a person's disability.

The following is a facsimile of the official ballot:

**Official Town Ballot**

To vote for a person whose name is printed on the ballot, make a cross (X) in the square after the name of the person for whom you desire to vote. To vote for a person whose name is not printed on the ballot, write his name in the blank space provided for that purpose.

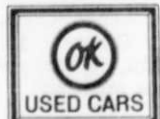

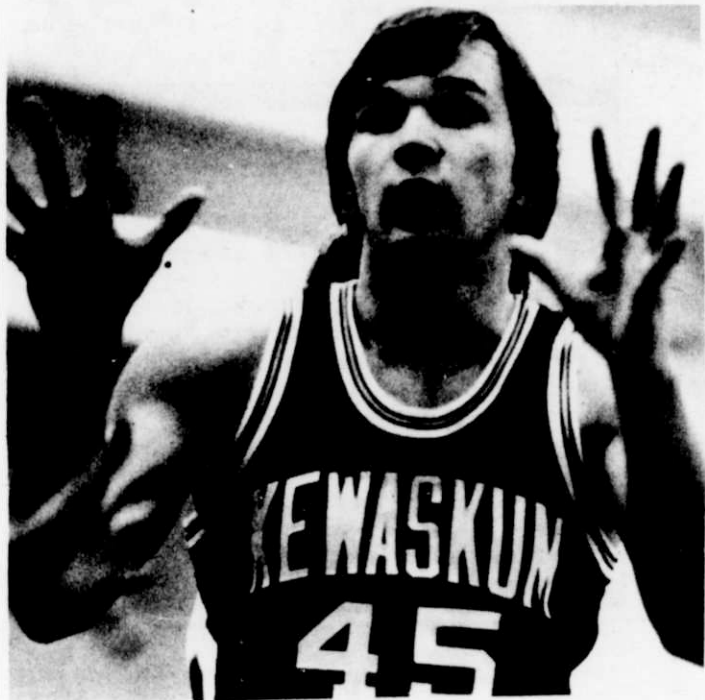

## Mike Koepke All-Conference



Mike Koepke, an all-around athlete for Kewaskum, was a first team selection on the Scenic Moraine All-Conference basketball team picked last week by the coaches.

Recognized as a strong rebounder, 6-2 Koepke hauled down 152 rebounds and also scored 188 points in 14 conference games, a 13.4 average, in leading the Indians to an 8-6 conference season, good for 4th place. Mike received honorable mention as a soph and was an all-conference 2nd team member as a junior last year. This is Koepke's second all-conference honor of the year. He was also chosen as an end on the all-conference football team and is the only member of the first five to have this double honor.

St. Norbert College formally concluded the 1974-75 basketball season early this week at a joint banquet honoring both the men's and women's squads as well as the cheerleaders.

The Knights, who finished 10-13 but who peaked at the best possible time — for tournament play, honored two individuals in particular.

Named MVP was SNC's lone senior and captain, Clark Eichstedt, a 6-4 forward from Kewaskum. "Ike" ended the season with 435 points, giving him 1,102 points for his four-year career and placing him 12th on the all-time scoring roster. Eichstedt also received awards for his selection to the First Team All-WICA and for honorable mention All-District 14.

Replacing "Ike" as captain next winter will be his fellow forward, Paul Schramka. A 6-3 junior, Schramka added 345 points for the year, averaging 15.0 points per game. He also marked the top shooting percentage for the total 23-game stretch, .482. He, along with sophomore center Tod Danen, received an Honorable Mention-All-WICA certificate.

Danen, who competed only in the last 14 games, led the percentage category in field goal accuracy with 51 per cent and 16.0 points per game. All five Knight starters finished in double

figures with guards Kim Pierce and Chuck Albers. Top reserve Kerry Kennedy, truly a sixth starter for SNC, added 8.8 points

Emphasis was on optimism for the coming year, particularly after such a strong finish in tourney play when St. Norbert bounced Carthage and gave UW-Parkside a scare before succumbing 76-67. Parkside eventually won the right to represent Wisconsin in the NAIA.

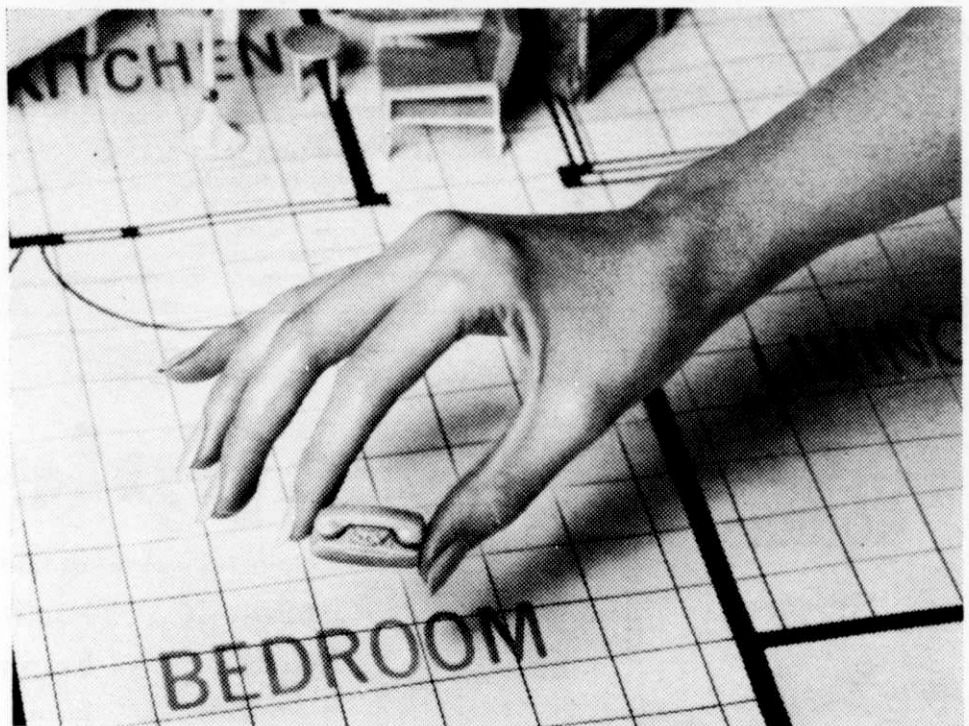
