Kral Loses to Nigh by 2 Votes; School Board Members Re-Elected

Less than half of the eligible voters showed up for Tuesday's election when only 464 ballots were cast in the Village of Kewaskum.

Two of the three incumbent trustees were re-elected for two-year terms. Roger Strack was successful in his bid for a second term. He led the balloting with 354 votes. Also named to a second term was Daniel Schmidt who received 279 votes.

The third incumbent, Alfred Kral, lost to challenger David Nigh, who won by a mere two-vote margin, 229 to 227. Kral had been on the board for the past 12 years.

The other two challengers, Roger Schmitt and Oscar Knoeck received 122 and 95 votes respectively.

Incumbent Charles Miller, running unopposed for village president, was the leading vote getter with 365.

In the judicial race, Kewaskum voters were strongly in favor of Nathan Heffernan, who received 282 votes compared to 124 for Christ Alexopoulos.

All the referendum issues passed with yes votes—No. 1, 200 to 158; No. 2, 200 to 173; No. 3, 225 to 149, and No. 4, 222 to 145.

Board election all three incumbents were re-elected in a close race for three-year terms.

Charles Ogi topped the candidates in the balloting with 1092 votes, 13 ahead of Allen Tessar. Ogi has been on the board for one term, while Tessar was seeking his third. In the battle for the third open seat, James Oelhafen edged out newcomer Daniel Stoffel, 971 to 919. Oelhafen received strong support from his home area, the Town of Wayne, where he received 227 votes to Stoffel's 143. Oelhafen is finishing his first term in office.

Ogi carried the Towns of Barton, Auburn and Kewaskum, while Tessar received the most votes in the Village of Kewaskum and the Towns of Scott and Farmingon. Oelhafen led in Wayne Township. Stoffel received solid support from all areas with the exception of the Town of Wayne.

Ashford reported no votes cast in the school board balloting while Mitchell had two votes and they have not been counted in the final totals.

Building Report to School Board Shows Increase in Costs of \$38,870

A building report was made to the Kewaskum Board of Education at its meeting Monday meeting Monday evening. The report, made by the board building committee, listed all changes from the original plan and showed a net increase in costs of \$38,-870.99, plus the gym flooring which the board had taken over at the previous meeting. The report listed all additions and deletions made from the original plans, in-cluding approximately 5,000 square feet of additional area. The board accepted the report of the building committee and aproved the additional payment from interest monies earned on the building funds. There were two items not finally settled, including costs of gutters for the high school addition, estimated at around \$2,000. The other would be a credit to the district for material which had to be replaced and for which a settlement is being discussed.

The board also authorized the building committee to proceed with soliciting bids on the remodeling to be done under the building program, and to use general materials and specifications used in the rest of the building project. Bids will be reviewed by the Board with the right to reject any or all bids. The type of remodeling

Kewaskum Receives State Funds for Streets and Roads

Senator Thomas E. Petri (R-2nd District) has announced that the state department of transportation has mailed checks totaling \$67,264.60 to every city, village and town in Washington County, of which Kewaskum is to receive \$476.35.

The entire state is to receive \$6.9 million. This is the first payment of more than \$80 million in highway revenues collected by the state which will be returned to all local units of government during the year. The distribution does not include some \$12 million distributed by the state department of revenue under the shared tax program. The highway aid novments
