Roy Esser Named to Half-Time Assistant Principal Position

Questions on staffing once again occupied a major portion of the Board of Education meeting held Monday evening. The board heard a number of reports and took action in some areas and requested further information in others.

The action taken created a half-time assistant principal's position at the high school as well as half-time teaching positions in social studies and English. The board also voted to offer the half-time assistant principal position to Roy Esser, who has taught agriculture in the high school for 14 years and in recent years has spent half-time as Local Vocational Education Coordinator.

A lengthy discussion was held on Middle School staffing, particularly on the reinstating of two of the four positions eliminated. In relation to the 13 standards, the board was informed that the counselor and librarian at the Middle School might have to be used part-time to meet requirements at the elementary levels. The question was asked whether the Middle School Principal could teach half-time. This was opposed by Mr. Brenholt. The board requested further information, but no action was taken.

In other business, the board approved an all-risk insurance policy on buildings at a cost of about \$1,600 a year. This would cover such problems as pipes leaking or breaking and causing damage to the building or contents.

The question of who produced and mailed the paper on the Middle School house plan was asked, since some people apparently believed it was sent by the schools. Mrs. Zemlicka indicated the Ke-

waskum Education Association had mailed the materials.

Payroll and vouchers payable were approved. An addition of \$500 to the original contract with Merv Thompson was approved. Mr. Thompson will work with the district through the remodeling projects.

The resignation of Mrs. Patricia Baker as speech therapist was accepted. A committee of Allen Tessar and Richard Theusch was appointed to work on wages of non-certified personnel.

Approval was given for the Johnson children to complete the school year here this year if tuition is paid. Mr. Brenholt was asked to determine why it's necessary to charge tuition in cases like this where the move is late in the year and does not have an affect on final costs.

The long-range planning committee appointed in 1972 was disbanded at the request of the Chairman, Wayne Rempel. He expressed the thought that the committee had completed the work set for it. The board did disband the committee with its thanks for the work they did. Committee members included: Mrs. Janet Hubbell, Gary Gerhartz, Leander Kempf, Al Ciha, Ralph Eisenman, Stanley Woolman, Al Bremer, Wayne Rempel, Doug Strack, and James Gaffke.

A request was made by the Kewaskum Baseball Team to sell beer at its games played on the school grounds. No action was taken pending checking with the village on regulations concerning this.

The board adjourned to executive session to discuss salaries and negotiations.

She is at present a supervisor at the Milwaukee County Mental Health Center, South Division, responsible for 475 patients in 17 wards in four buildings. The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Martin of Kewaskum, Dawn emphasized the fact that her work is interestingly different from surgical and medical nursing. She feels that care and attention are especially important to these psychiatric patients, particularly in geriatrics, and she has been instrumental in planning activities for them.

Local Police Attend Seminars On Delinquency, Sex Crimes

Members of the Kewaskum police force are participating in seminars on delinquency control and sex crimes.

Last month Patrolman Richard Knoebel attended a two-week session of a delinquency control institute at Madison. Instructors were persons schooled in juvenile delinquency. Course study covered a wide area including delinquency theories and human growth and development; rehabilitative programming; the abused child and the law; the police role and juvenile justice system; community social agencies; alcohol and other drugs of abuse, and how to control the problems. There will be a follow-up session next year.

Examinations were held at the end of each week. The seminar was funded with 90 per cent coming from the federal level; five per cent from the state and five per cent from the Village of Kewaskum.

Police Chief Don Hlavaty and Patrolman Tom Bauer will attend a three-day seminar on sex crimes in May sponsored by the Glendale Crime Laboratory and Glendale Police Department in Glendale.

The program will be presented by The Department of Justice-Federal Bureau of Investigation. On the instructional staff will be Special Agents Frank A. Sass, Washington, D. C., and Charles G. Southworth, Milwaukee. Sass is one of the world's foremost authorities on sex offenses with current assignment to the staff of the FBI Academy. He has spent 20 years in this specialized area.

The program will include police responsibility in sex motivated crimes; motivations and terminology of sex offenses; rape investigations; the child molestation investigation; victim-witness and suspect-subject interview pitfalls.

Earth Week to Be Observed in County

It was five years ago that Wisconsin's Senator Nelson instituted Earth Day. In commemoration, the Washington County Environmental Council is urging county residents to observe Earth Week USA, April 20-26. "Look around you. See what you can do in your area to conserve our resources and make our finite space ship, Earth, a better place to live," council members advise.

The council has designated a different activity for each day of the week. Copies of a schedule listing these activities and suggested actions have been distributed to the county schools, youth groups, home-makers and civic organizations. If anyone would be interested in receiving a copy of this schedule, he should contact the University of Wisconsin Extension office in West Bend.

A bus tour of the northern unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest is being sponsored by the council on April 20, "Nature Appreciation Day." The tour is open to the general public and will leave at 1 p. m. from the parking lot of the Washington County Courthouse, West Bend. Five stops will be made at the most interesting sites in the park for short hikes. Guides will be on each bus to point out geological formations, plants and birds. Cost for the four hour tour will be \$1.50 per person. Anyone interested should call the extension office, 334-3491.

Those who are unable to participate in the tour should take time out to visit one of the three state parks, Lizard Mound, Pike Lake, and the Kettle Moraine, or the county's Ridge Run or Albecker park. Be sure that

when you visit a park that it is a better place because of your visit. Don't litter, and pick up any litter that you see.

If there is no chance to visit a park, a walk in your back yard, down the road or around the block is suggested. Notice all of the plants coming back to life, listen to the birds sing.

Monday is Food Day. Plan a healthy, light meal and notice how you can save food. Then continue the practice once each week. While Americans over-eat, two-thirds of the world goes to bed hungry. Learn more about nutrition. While we over-eat, often what we eat is nutritionally bankrupt. Bulletins on nutrition are available from the UW-Extension Home Economist.

Tuesday is for Gardening. Save money, get exercise, and enjoy fresh vegetables and flowers from your own garden. Buy seeds, plan your garden on paper and perhaps even plant the early vegetables like asparagus, beets, carrots, chard, kohlrabi, lettuce, onions, peas, potatoes and radishes. Such flowers as snapdragons, larkspur, poppies, iris and mignonette can also be sown now. If you don't have space for a garden rent a garden plot. Two areas are available, one north of the twin high schools in West Bend and one at the junction of Highway 33 and County Z. Call the UW-Extension office.

Wednesday you are asked to beautify around your home. Clean up the litter that accumulated over winter, paint-up and patch-up. Thursday plant a tree or a shrub. Trees are nature's air

conditioners and purifiers. Friday is wildlife and habitat day. Make a home for our friends in nature. They are necessary for nature's balance. A brush pile is good protection for many small animals. Bird houses are needed because natural nesting places have been destroyed. Shrubs that produce berries provide food and shelter for birds and animals.

Saturday is community action day. Numerous projects have been planned around the county. In West Bend trees will be planted in front of the twin high schools and at Green Tree School. Work will also be done on the nature study area adjacent to Silver Brook school. Anyone interested in helping should contact Dale Houdek, 338-6394. Several 4-H clubs are planning litter clean-ups. In Kewaskum the Junior Woman's Club is offering trees for sale to be planted along the streets. Five varieties will be available at a cost ranging from \$3 to \$6.

In Hartford Boy Scouts will clean up the Rubicon River bank area and plant trees and shrubs adjacent to Willowbrook park. The Girl Scouts will plant trees and shrubs at Rossmann school and Woodlawn park and the Hartford 4-H will plant trees at Pike Lake park.

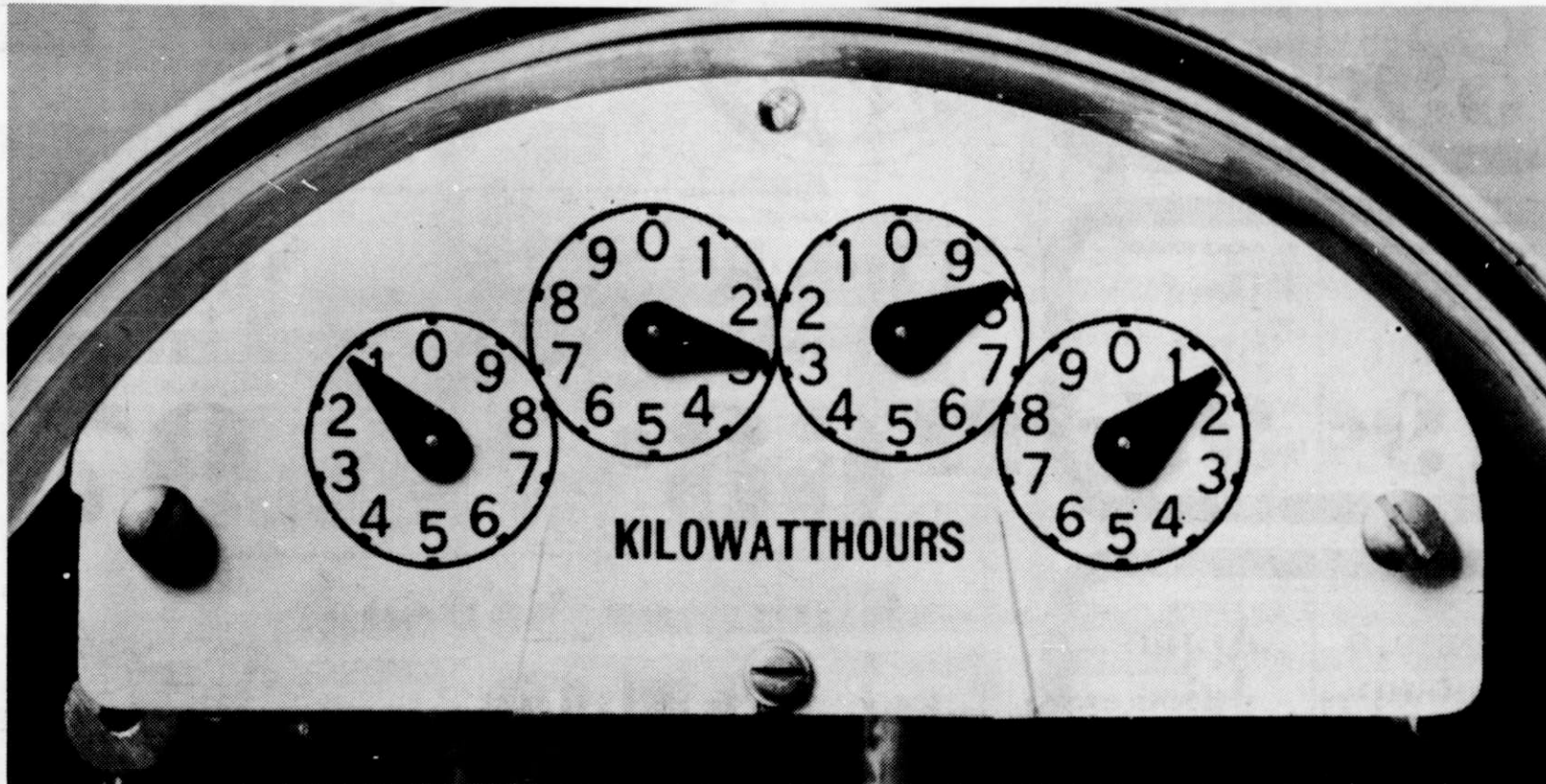

ORDINANCE NO. 75-1

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, does ordain as follows:

Section 1. Possession or Drinking of Malt Beverages or Intoxication Liquors on Public Ways. No person shall purchase an intoxicating liquor or fermented malt beverage by glass or in open containers except for consumption on the licensed premises and no person shall be in possession of any glass or open container containing intoxicating liquor or fermented malt beverage or drink from the same on any public way, public street, sidewalk, boulevard, parkway, safety zone, alley or public parking lot or on/and or in any motor vehicle parked on a public way, public street, alley or public parking lot.

Section 2. Any person who shall violate any provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be subject to a penalty of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) nor more than two hundred dollars (\$200.00) and in default thereof shall be imprisoned in the county jail for a period of not less than ten days (10) nor more than thirty days (30).

Section 3. This ordinance shall become effective upon passage and publication.

ORDINANCE NO. 75-2

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wash-

ington County, Wisconsin, does ordain as follows:

Section 1. No person shall loiter or prowl in a place, at a time, or in a manner not usual for law-abiding individuals under circumstances that warrant alarm for the safety of persons or property in the vicinity. Among the circumstances which may be considered in determining whether such alarm is warranted is the fact that the actor takes flight upon appearance of a police or peace officer, refuses to identify himself, or manifestly endeavors to conceal himself or any object. Unless flight by the actor or other circumstances makes it impracticable, a police or peace officer shall prior to any arrest for an offense under this ordinance afford the actor an opportu-

ity to dispel any alarm which would otherwise be warranted, by requesting him to identify himself and explain his presence and conduct. No person shall be convicted of an offense under this ordinance if the police or peace officer did not comply with the preceding sentence, or if it appears at trial that the explanation given by the actor was true and, if believed by the police or peace officer at the time, would have dispelled the alarm.

Section 2. Any person convicted for violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) nor more than two hundred dollars (\$200.00) and in default thereof shall be imprisoned in the

County Jail for a period of not less than ten days (10) nor more than Thirty Days (30).

Section 3. This ordinance shall become effective upon passage and publication.

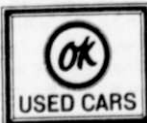

Dennis Bremser was the only other Indian with a 1st place. He won the 2 mile run with a time of 10:19.5, shading Larry Renzaglia of Hartford, whose time was 10:23.3.

The teams who don't run regularly indoors (like Kewaskum) are at a distinct disadvantage in an indoor meet and are looking forward to better success in outdoor tournaments.

However, the meet was again received with great enthusiasm by coaches, athletes and fans. Wouldn't similar county tournaments in other sports be equally successful in determining county champions?

Coach Jim Westphal has 7 lettermen back next year, headed by Jim Bilgo, who was a starter until an ankle injury sidelined him for a large part of the season. The 6 others include Tom Edwards, Jack Kern, Scott Tessar, Tom Rohlinger, Dave

Menzel and Dennis Bremser. All are juniors who won the soph championship a year ago. There should also be help coming up from the leading JV scorer, soph Leon Laatsch and others.

Mike Koepke was the varsity's leading scorer with 270 points. Three others, Gruber 248, Koth 241 and Randy Koepke 214 bettered the 200 mark. Timblin was next with 106. Mike had the most field goals with 112 and Koth the most free throws with 65. Mike and Gruber tied for the most rebounds with 215.

Kewaskum ended up with a 12-8 record in the tough Scenic Moraine Conference which sent 2 of its schools to the Sectionals in Class A competition against strong Milwaukee area schools. Co-champ Hartland beat Menomonee Falls East and Sussex Hamilton in the Regionals to reach the Sectionals, then lost by just 1 point to Mil-

waukee Marshall, which went to the state tournament. Co-champ Kettle Moraine defeated Waukesha South and New Berlin West to reach the Sectionals. The third Scenic co-champ, Grafton, reached the Regional finals before losing to Homestead.

Fourth place Kewaskum also did well. After beating Campbellsport in the Sub-Regionals, the Indians lost to rated Kiel (No. 2 in the state last year) by just 4 points (50-46) in the tough Sheboygan Falls Regional. Sheboygan Falls, Class B defending state champ, won their own Regional (defeating Kiel in the finals), went on to win the Whitewater Sectional, and then won all the marbles again by repeating as Class B state champion at Madison.
