Armin Oppermann Dies



Armin A. Oppermann, age 52 years, of 1208 Parkview Drive, Kewaskum, Superintendent of Public Works and Fire Chief in Kewaskum for many years, passed away shortly before noon Saturday, April 19, at St. Luke's Hospital, Milwaukee. He was active in community affairs and well known and liked in the community.

Oppermann was first admitted to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, on Feb. 18. He submitted to open heart surgery at St. Luke's Hospital on March 4. He returned home twice but both times he was re-admitted to the hospital.

He was born Dec. 1, 1922 in the Town of Auburn, Fond du Lac County, a son of the late John and Amelia Bartelt Oppermann. He married Virginia Staeger in Trinity Lutheran Church in the Town of Scott on Oct. 2, 1943. Armin was an area resident all of his life.

He was a member of St. Lucas Lutheran Church many years, helped organize and was active in the Kewaskum Rescue Squad, was a member of the Kewaskum Sportsmen's Club and a past member of the Kiwanis Club.

His wife, Virginia, survives along with a son, David (Bonnie), of 6758 Eastwood Trail, West Bend; one daughter, Debra, at home; three grandchildren; two brothers, Walter of Port Washington

and Wilson of R. 2, Campbellsport; two sisters, Mrs. Marvin Garbisch of R. 1, Kewaskum, and Mrs. Paul Sprenger of Sheboygan; his mother-in-law, Mrs. Martha Staeger, of Kewaskum; eight sisters-in-law; five brothers-in-law; one aunt; other relatives and a host of friends. One sister and six brothers preceded him in death.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Tuesday at St. Lucas Lutheran Church with Pastor Paul Hoenecke officiating. Burial was in Lutheran Memorial Park. A great number of relatives and friends paid their respects at Miller's Funeral Home, 215 Forest Ave., where visitation was held from 2 to 9 p. m. Monday and from 8 to 11 a. m. Tuesday and at the church from noon to the time of services.

Memorials to the Wisconsin Heart Fund would be appreciated by the family.

The club will hold its Charter Night Banquet at the Glacier Inn on April 28. Wisconsin Jaycee President Jim Leonhart will be the featured speaker.

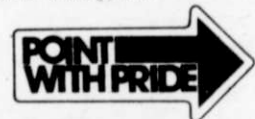
Mike Berger joined the club, becoming its 27th member.

## Esser Presented 'Outstanding Conservation Teacher Award'



At the April 15 meeting of the Washington County Board of Supervisors Roy Esser, teacher at Kewaskum High School, was presented the "Outstanding Conservation Teacher Award" for Washington County.

The award was given for the first time this year by the Junior Board of Soil and Water Conservation to recognize a teacher who has been exceptionally active in teaching conservation of our natural resources. Principals and administrators of public and parochial schools throughout Washington County could nominate a teacher from their staff who displayed this quality. The award was not limited to just high school teachers because many times elementary school teachers play an important role in getting young students interested in conservation.

Esser was picked as this year's award winner not only because of what he's doing now for conservation, but what he has done over the past fifteen years at Kewaskum High School.

Presently Esser is the vocational agriculture teacher and advisor for Future Farmers of America. He has done landscaping on the school grounds and is in the process of establishing an outdoor classroom complete with pond and wildlife habitat. He has planted an estimated half million trees with his vocational agriculture classes and with farmers on their land. Because Roy Esser and his students are primarily interested in farming, he has been especially

dedicated to the area of soil and water conservation.

One of Roy's particularly impressive achievements has been his initiative in stimulating the interest of over 100 Fond du Lac, Sheboygan, and Washington County farmers to be cooperators with the Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District. By working through his students and going out to talk to farmers, he convinced them to have the Soil Conservation Service help them plan their farms so the land is not damaged by erosion and other soil related prob-

lems. The farmers know Roy and he has the ability to talk to them and make sense. He has gone out of his way to promote conservation practices.

In addition, Esser is active in Knights of Columbus, Jaycees and the County Agriculture Group. In connection with the Kiwanis he has been involved in the promotion of Farm City Week and helped with the picking of a winner for the Conservation Farmer Award. His work certainly goes beyond that of an ordinary school teacher!

For his award Esser receives a scholarship to the "Trees For Tomorrow" camp and he is now eligible for the state contest.

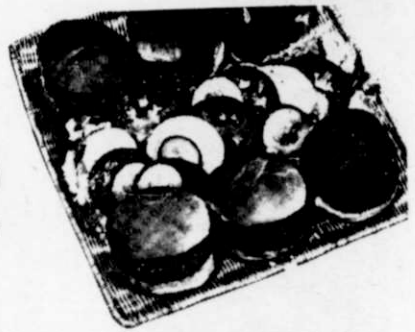

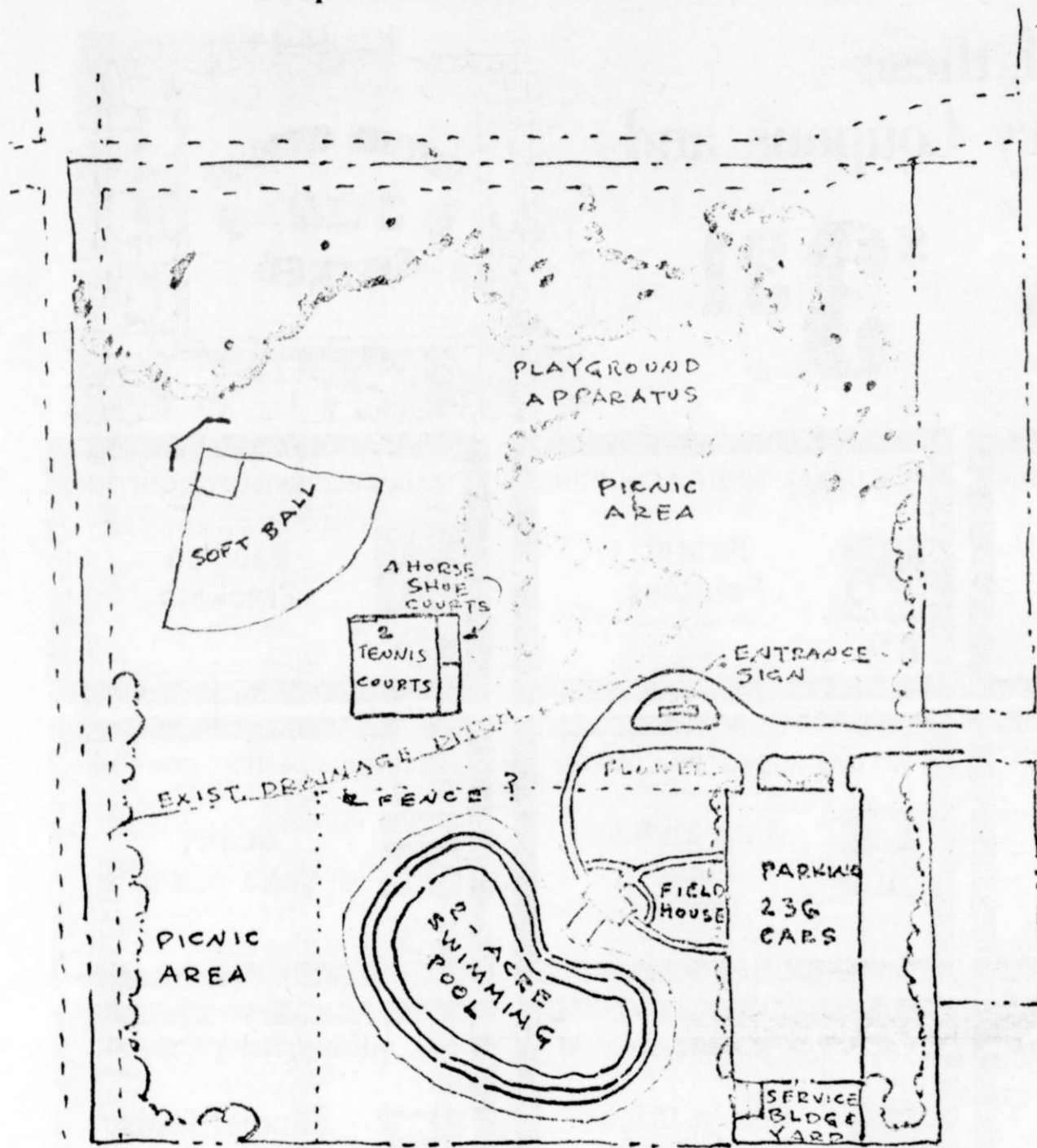

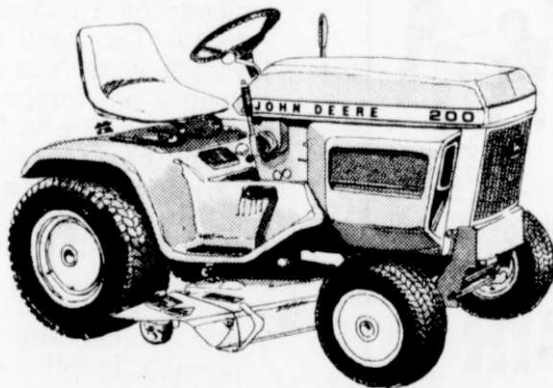
