Armin Oppermann Dies



Armin A. Oppermann, age 52 years, of 1208 Parkview Drive, Kewaskum. Superintendent of Public Works and Fire Chief in Kewaskum for many years, passed away shortly before noon Saturday, April 19, at St. Luke's Hospital, Milwaukee. He was active in community affairs and well known and liked in the community.

Oppermann was first admitted to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, on Feb. 18. He submitted to open heart surgery at St. Luke's Hospital on March 4. He returned home twice but both times he was re-admitted to the hospital.

He was born Dec. 1, 1922 in the Town of Auburn, Fond du Lac County, a son of the late John and Amelia Bartelt Oppermann. He married Trinity in Virginia Staege Lutheran Church in the Town of Scott on Oct. 2, 1943. Armin was an area resident all of his life. He was a member of St. Lucas Lutheran Church many years, helped organize and was active in the Kewaskum Rescue Squad, was a member of the Kewaskum Sportsmen's Club and a past member of the Kiwanis Club. 


lems. The farmers know Roy and he has the ability to talk to them and make sense. He has gone out of his way to promote conservation practices.
