August Bilgo, Jr. Appointed Village Supt. of Public Works; Option Land for New Fire Station

At its meeting Monday, May 5, the Village Board appointed August Bilgo, Jr. to the position of Superintendent of Public Works effective May 12, to succeed the late Armin Oppermann. Bilgo was recommended for the position by the administrative committee and the board unanimously accepted the recommendation. Bilgo has worked for Winninghoff and Bradley Construction Company, West Bend, for the past 15 years. He is also the assistant fire chief in the village.

Tom Bartelt appeared on behalf of the Kewaskum Lakes baseball team to request permission to sell beer at home ball games. He stated the team would use some of the proceeds to pay the village a percentage for the lighting at the park. When asked his opinion, Police Chief Don Hlavaty stated he was not in favor of this proposal for several reasons, citing people living in the area as one. After more general discussion, a motion was made and passed to deny the request.

Dennis Reha appeared to ask permission to fence his backyard which lies adjacent to the Wigwam parking lot. Village ordinance calls for a 6' fence and since adjacent property is 3' higher than his, he would need a 9' fence in order to insure privacy. He stated many reasons for the need for the fence and the board will check the property to see if a variance in the ordinance is in order.

Phillip Majerus, owner of the landfill site that Kewaskum uses, appeared to tell the board of a rate increase of \$2.40 per load effective July 1, 1975. The point was raised that this was an 8% cost of living increase. Majerus told the board of his increasing labor, fuel and equipment costs and also noted his site was the only one available to Kewaskum at this time.

A representative from Spielbauer Fireworks Co. from Green Bay appeared to present a catalog of current fireworks displays for this 4th of July. The board decided to send in an order at a later date.

A resolution of condolence for the late Armin Oppermann, Supt. of Public Works for the Village of Kewaskum will be sent to the family.

A motion was made and passed to charge a fee of \$5 per family unit for library cards for non-residents of the village effective July 1, 1975. The year will run from July 1 to June 30 of the following year. The librarian will keep a record of the number of family unit cards from each township.

A resolution for participation in National Flood Insur-

ance program was brought up. It was pointed out that in order to qualify for insurance, the resolution must be passed. The resolution was tabled until next meeting in order to study pertinent facts.

The board tabled until the next meeting a decision on Summary Judgement-Pasche Tax Case, until a corporation lawyer can check all details surrounding the case.

The board will attend the League of Wis. Municipalities Regional meeting to be held at the Ramada Sands in Wauwatosa on May 22.

The Robert G. Romaine American Legion Post extended an invitation to the board to ride in the Memorial Day Parade May 26 starting at the high school at 9:00 a. m. Ceremony in high school auditorium immediately following parade.

at the Valley Bank in Kewaskum. This will be the kick-off of a membership drive for the society. The date of this event is May 24.

Approval was given to purchase a truck chassis from Stocker Ford - Mercury for \$6,823.00, and a dump body from Truck Equipment for \$2,175.00, also to have the chassis and dump body zebard.

Discussion was held on purchasing a hookup for the snowplow for new truck. The board will contact Central Equipment for price quotes.

Alan Kuehl was hired on a permanent basis with the village crew after Al Rohlinger returns to his position. He is now filling in for Rohlinger.

Motion was made and passed to exercise a 120 day option to purchase on the Clarinda Schmidt property for the purpose of erecting a new fire station.

It was decided to try on a trial basis holding board meetings twice a month instead of the current once a month. Meetings will be the 1st and 3rd Monday of the month at 8 p. m. Board members questioned if this extra meeting would alleviate some of the impromptu meetings that are now called. It was stated there would still be some extra meetings called but generally hope to have fewer extra meetings.

Building permits were issued to John Kudek to add a second story to existing home and Chester Czoschke to erect a garage.

Motion made and passed to raise the insurance on the village ambulance.

Approval was given to pay \$25.00 towards expenses of Mark Smucker who will be interviewing Ada Deer of the Menomonee Tribe of Keshena, Wis. to find out where Chief Kewaskum is buried.

The dry grass and brush will be burned off in the new park area so the area is more defineable. Work will be concentrated on the two pool areas. A two acre pool and a one acre pool will be staked out at this time.

Motion was made and passed to have new lighting installed in the municipal offices and lobby.

Discussion was held on having property owners in the village place all leaves, debris, etc. from lawns placed in containers instead of raking in to the village streets. The commission will also check into changing days for garbage pickup.

Recreation Director Tom Larsen stated that no applications have been filled out for lifeguards for the swimming area for the summer. Would like to hire Dan Meilahn for summer.

The Kiwanis of Kewaskum have donated \$100.00 to the library to be used for the refinishing of the library tables and chairs.

Motion was made and passed to pay any school crossing guard who serves five times per day \$10.00 commencing May 1, 1975.

Discussion on trees that need trimming and diseased trees to be removed led to deciding on sending a letter of intent to trim or remove trees to the property owner stating this and stating also they will be billed for this service.

ORDINANCE NO. 75-1

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WASHINGTON COUNTY, WISCONSIN, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Possession or Drinking of Malt Beverages or Intoxicating Liquors on Public Ways. No person shall purchase an intoxicating liquor or fermented malt beverage by glass or in open containers except for consumption on the licensed premises and no person shall be in possession of any glass or open container containing

intoxicating liquor or fermented malt beverage or drink from the same on any public way, public street, sidewalk, boulevard, parkway, safety zone, alley or public parking lot or on/and or in any motor vehicle parked on a public way, public street, alley or public parking lot.

Section 2. Any person who shall violate any provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be subject to a penalty of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) nor more than two hundred dollars (\$200.00) and in default thereof shall be imprisoned in the county jail for a period of not less than ten days (10) nor more than thirty days (30).

Section 3. This ordinance shall become effective upon passage and publication.

ORDINANCE NO. 75-2

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WASHINGTON COUNTY, WISCONSIN, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. No person shall loiter or prowl in a place, at a time, or in a manner not usual for law-abiding individuals under circumstances that warrant alarm for the safety of persons or property in the vicinity. Among the circumstances which may be considered in determining whether such alarm is warranted is the fact that the actor takes flight upon appearance of a police or peace officer, refuses to identify himself, or manifestly endeavors to conceal himself or any object. Unless flight by the actor or other circumstances makes it impracticable, a police or peace officer shall prior to any arrest for an offense under this ordinance afford the actor an opportunity to dispel any alarm which would otherwise be warranted, by requesting him to identify himself and explain his presence and conduct. No person shall be convicted of an offense under this ordinance if the police or peace officer did not comply with the preceding sentence, or if it appears at trial that the explanation given by the actor was true and, if believed by the police or peace officer at the time, would have dispelled the alarm.

Section 2. Any person convicted for violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) nor more than two hundred dollars (\$200.00) and in default thereof shall be imprisoned in the County Jail for a period of

not less than ten days (10) nor more than Thirty Days (30).

Section 3. This ordinance shall become effective upon passage and publication.



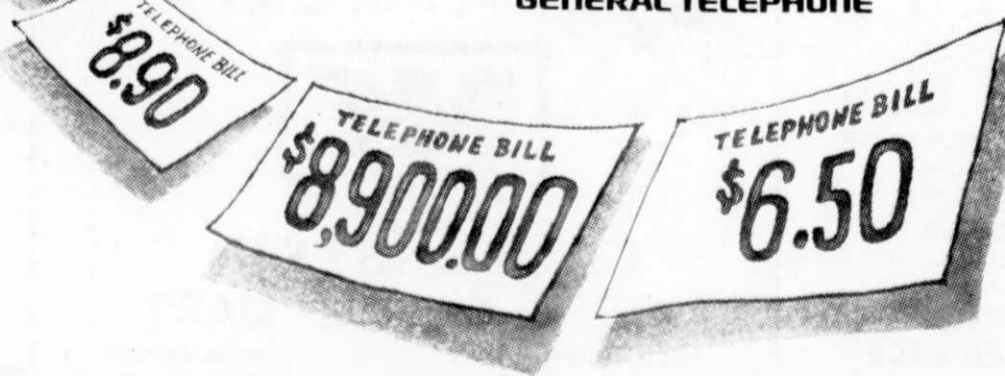
