Third Member Of KHS Senior Class Dead

Cynthia Ann Gadow of 1810 Shalom Dr., West Bend, passed away Wednesday, May 7, at her residence at the age of 17. Coroner Robert Boltz said death was caused by a gunshot wound, apparently self-inflicted.

Miss Gadow was a member of the senior class at Kewaskum High School. She was the third member of her class to lose her life during the past school year. Two others died in traffic accidents. Patrick Kelly McCambridge, 17, was killed when he was struck by a car while skateboarding near his home late in November and Alan Erdmann was killed in an auto accident three weeks ago, on April 25.

Miss Gadow was born Oct. 28, 1957 in Milwaukee and has lived at the present address since October, 1974.

She is survived by her mother, LaVerne Gadow, of the same address; her father and step-mother, Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Gadow of Milwaukee; two brothers, Richard and Charles, both of Milwaukee; maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Bucher, Napa, Calif., and her paternal grandmother, Mrs. Ione Gadow, Oshkosh.

Private funeral services were held Saturday at 10:30 a. m. at the Schmidt Funeral Home, West Bend.

Barn Fire at Van Assche Farm Sunday

A Mother's Day barn fire called out Kohlsville, Allenton and Kewaskum volunteer firemen Sunday morning. The fire was on the David Van Assche farm on County Trunk W one mile south of Wayne.

Kohlsville firemen were called to the scene before 10 a. m. and requested additional help from the two other departments. Kewaskum firemen received the mutual aid call at 11:01 a. m. with 13 men responding. No siren was sounded locally.

Smoke was spotted by the Van Assche's and they called in an alarm. Flames were limited, but there was heavy smoke caused by burning straw and dried corn stalks in the bottom of the barn. The firemen carried the straw out of the barn with pitchforks and used a blower to throw the contents into the nearby barnyard. The smoke, at times, was so dense that the firemen were required to use Scott Air Packs while working inside.

There was also minor damage to the barn roof and the inside of the barn suffered scorching but the barn was saved.

Van Assche said that the loss was estimated at about \$1,000.

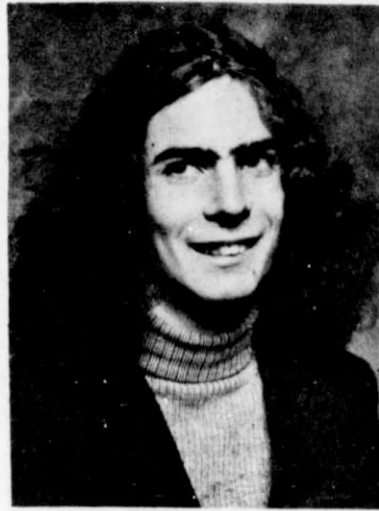

School Board Votes to Refinance \$430,000.00 in Outstanding Notes

At the Kewaskum Board of Education meeting on Monday, May 12, the Board voted to refinance the \$430,000.00 in outstanding promissory notes. In reference to the March 17 meeting, the Board discussed the proposed sale of the note issue for the amount of the \$430,000.00 to refund outstanding notes of the District due Oct. 1, 1975 and Jan. 1, 1976 which was authorized by resolution of the Board on May 28, 1974. Raymond W. Osness, from the First Wisconsin National Bank of Milwaukee, the financial consultant to the district, presented the information on the bids received. The sealed bids were opened at Floyd Brenholt's office in the afternoon of the day of the meeting. The successful bidder was the Marine National Exchange Bank at a net interest of 5.63075%.

The Board unanimously approved the summer school program for the Driver's Education, Pre-Kindergarten screening, and the beginning band program. The Board also approved the hiring of the district's two speech therapists for the pre-kindergarten screening.

Kewaskum has been asked to participate in a dental research program being conducted in middle schools. The board had no objection to the program, pending checking with the local Dental Association.

A question was raised concerning a lack of substitutes at the middle school on Monday, May 12. There are

apparently some substitutes who have expressed a wish to not teach at the middle school.

Payroll and vouchers payable were approved. The Board unanimously extended a vote of thanks to the two retiring teachers, Mrs. Minerva Martin and Mrs. Rebecca Erber. The Board also approved Graef and Van Der Jagt of Sheboygan, to again do our district's audit. The Board adjourned to executive session to discuss salaries, negotiations, personnel questions and financial information provided by the Johnson Bus Company.

This Sunday the team will resume Lakes play at West Bend at 1:30 p. m.

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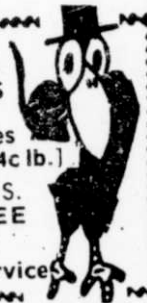

Local historians tell us it was one of the most popular spots in the area for large groups to hold their outings. Many fraternal orders from Milwaukee arrived by train to spend the day at the park. The train pulled into a spe-

cial siding that was located near the area where Regal Ware, Inc. now has their large plant.

Note the two young lads standing at the concession stand dressed in their finest suit of clothes and each wear-

ing a hat.

North Side Park

Up to about 1920 Kewaskum was well known throughout this area for its famous North Side Park. It was on land first owned by Jesse Meyer, who bought it from the government about 1847—at this time Kewaskum was called Town of "North Bend." Later the land was owned by the Nic Guth family and later by Christ Bilgo about 1888.

The south line fence of the park was located near the north end of the large Regal Ware warehouse. The gas tanks are on land once in the park. A narrow road along the C. & N.W. right of way was the entrance. Those who came by horse and buggy tied their horses along the south side of the park.

When the Kewaskum aluminum plant was built about 1919 it closed the road to the park. This road was quite narrow and many found it difficult to meet or pass another buggy, especially on the way home after a few too many beers.

George Schleif, Jr. was head bartender and bouncer. In the early days there was an open air dancing platform and a beer stand with a place

above it for a band to play. Joe Eberle, Sr. leased the park and built a new dance hall and dining room with a kitchen. Have not been able to find out what year this was done.

A number of boats were kept on the river for rowing and fishing on the mill pond, until the dam was washed out on Feb. 15, 1911. The dining hall was taken down by August Bilgo about 1919-1920 and the hall was moved to the Kewaskum Aluminum Company in May, 1921, to be used for a warehouse. When Regal Ware bought the company and began to expand, the hall was no longer used and was torn down.

Many picnics and dances were held in the park. Homecoming picnics were held every year on July 3-4-5. Groups like Butchers - Meatcutters, Railroad Employees, Turner Society and others from Milwaukee would fill a passenger train, come to Kewaskum for a day and evening. The train would come in the morning and park on the side track and wait for all the picnickers to get back on the train for the ride back to Milwaukee.

From what I have heard from some of the old timers, many had to be helped back on the train.

No doubt some of the old timers left in the area have memories of the good times they had in this fine park.

"John, I found this letter in your coat pocket this morning. Do you realize that I gave it to you a month ago to mail?"

"Yes, dear. I remember. . . I took that coat off for you to sew a button on and I'm still waiting."

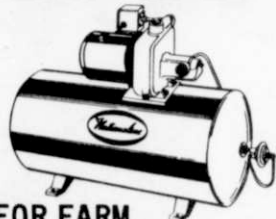

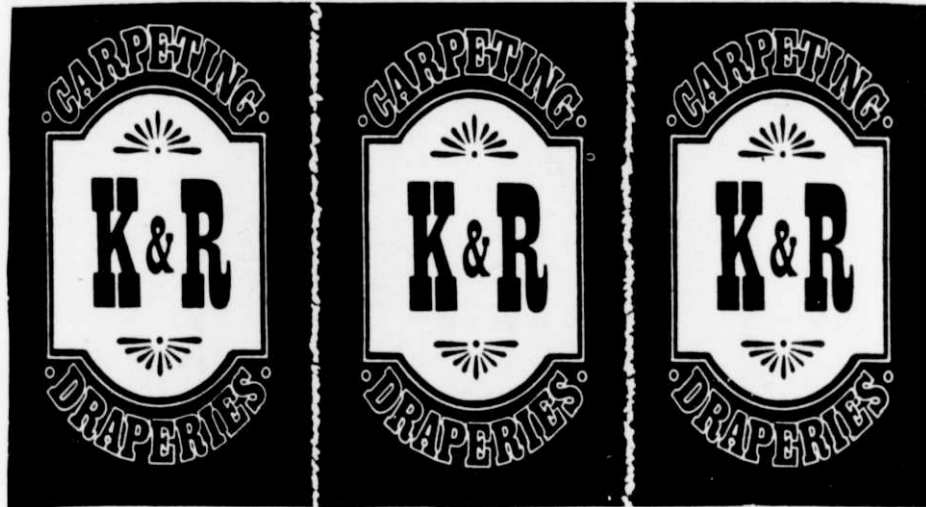

International Affairs Committee reported a balance. A motion was made and passed to divide the balance between

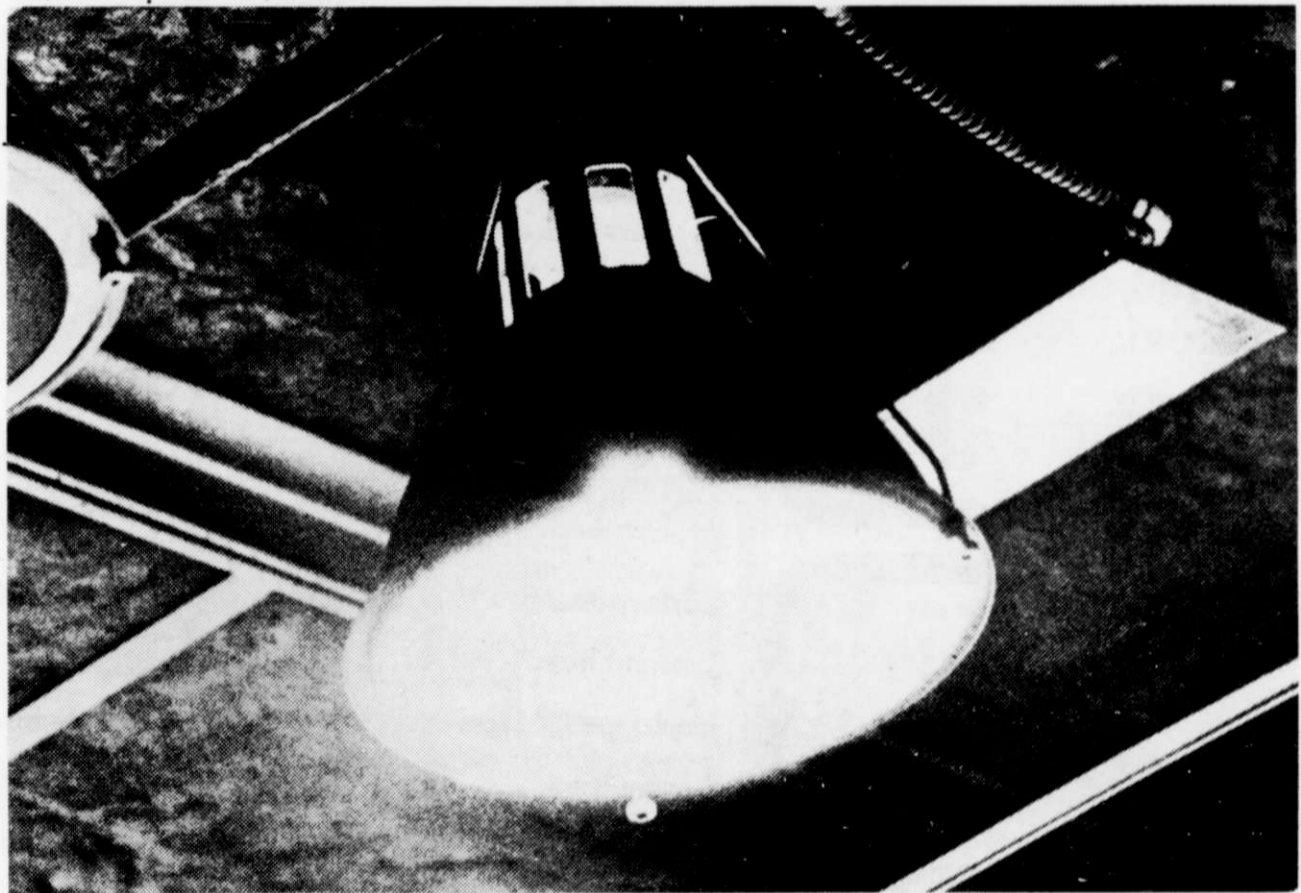

LITTLE LEAGUE WILL HOLD FIRST PRACTICE

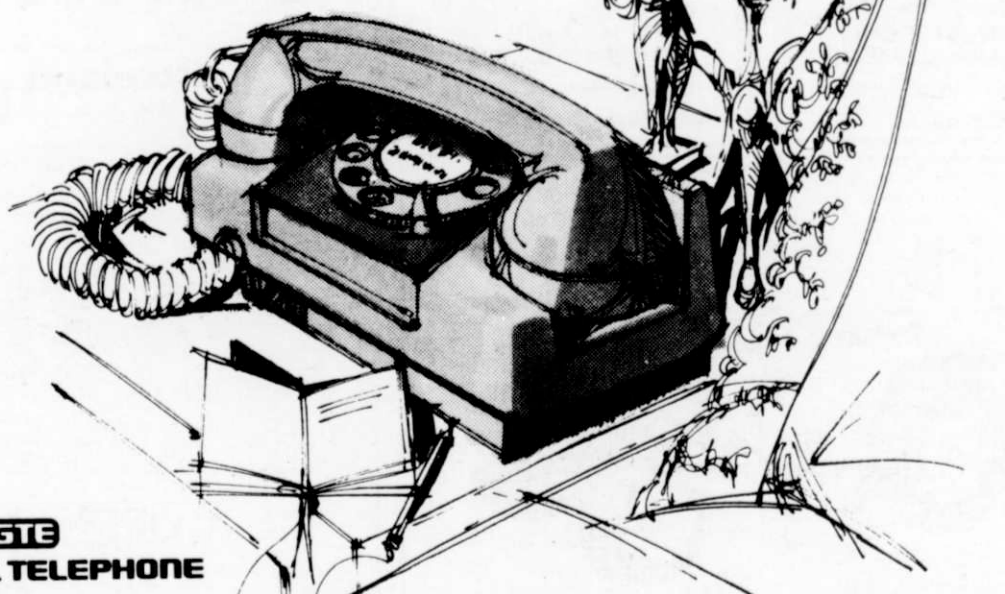
The Kewaskum Jaycees' Little League will hold their first practice session on Monday, May 19, at 6 p. m. at the Holy Trinity school playground.
