A number of items concerning next year's programs were discussed by the school board at its Monday meeting. A building report was also given, and the board agreed to reducing the retainage of the bills from Westra Construction to \$6,-000 at the architect-engineering firm's advice. buildings are substantially completed as far as the work of the contractors is concerned. The board also approved an additional \$2,610.-56 in work done toward completion of the remodeling.

A budget report was given on the latest state budget information. The latest information raises the allowable spending level, leaving the projected budget about \$75,-000 under these allowable li-

A map was presented giving enrollments and locations of the kindergarten students for next fall. The total registered now numbers 198 children. As a result; the board re-created the halftime kindergarten position which had previously been eliminated. This will leave the number of kindergarten sections at eight. the same

number being held this year There was a good deal of discussion about where the sections should be held, particularly whether there should be four in Kewaskum and one in Wayne or two at Wayne and three in Kewaskum. If two are held at Wayne, to keep the sections relatively equal in size would require the transfer of some 20 students from what is normally the Kewaskum area to Wayne. Those who favor this approach point to better facilities at the Wayne

A petition was received from the Farmington PT0. The petition called for recreating the three Middle School positions which at this point have been eliminated. Two concerns were expressed. The first was that the educational programs, now considered good, worsen. The second concern was that discipline, already being questioned by some, would become worse with fewer teachers. Some complaints of students moving cars and defacing cars during the noon periods were ex-pressed. The board took un-





At the Village Board meeting May 19, Donald Koerble and Bob Danielson appeared on behalf of the Lions to review the problems with their monthly paper drive. They undertook this project initially to make money to use community projects. When they started the price of paper was \$20 per ton, it has now dropped to \$8 per ton and the amount of paper has dwindled to almost nothing. The last drive netted between 1 and 2 ton and the Lions believe if everyone cooperated a village the size of Kewaskum should net 10 ton.

The board authorized the Lions to increase the size of their newspaper ad relating how this project is backed by the village board and also stating where the proceeds of the drive will be used—back in the community. If this ad does not increase participation, a flyer will go out with the July water bills urging full cooperation and participation by all people

They voted to hire Dan Tessar for work with the village crew for the summer months.
