

Hold Workshop to Plan Bicentennial Youth Debates

Representatives of Kewaskum High School were among 319 participants from 29 schools who attended a University of Wisconsin-Whitewater workshop in preparation for the federallyfunded Bicentennial Youth Debates competition which will begin this fall.

Bicentennial Youth Debates is a program of the National Endowment for the Humanities and the national Speech Communication Association to involve young speakers in the Bicentennial. All interested students, not just those enrolled in forensics, are urged to take part.

The program provides for a contest in each of the country's high schools to select its best extemporaneous speaker, persuasive speaker, and one-man-team (Lincoln-Douglas style) debater. Local winners will go on to district competition, and top speaker in each category at district will go on to compete at regional with speakers from the seven other regions of the country. The top 24 speakers then will compete in a national contest.

Scholarships of \$1,000 are planned for sectional winners and of \$6,000 for regional winners. The awards are to be used for any educational purpose, including travel, and their use may be deferred.

To provide additional competition for the local contestants, the UW-Whitewater Robert C. Williams Alumni chapter of Pi Kappa Delta, national forensic honorary, is planning a tournament involving those contestants who do not advance to district af-

ter their own school contest, to be held at UW-Whitewater soon after all local contests have been completed. In addition, community service clubs, church, and civic organizations are expected to

Bi-Monthly Meeting May 19, 1975 8:00 P. M.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in bimonthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

President Miller presided and all Board Members were present.

The minutes of the meeting of May 5 were approved as printed. Motion by Trustee G. Nigh, seconded by Trustee Herriges. Unanimous vote.

The Board approved the purchase of a 4th of July Fireworks Show from Spielbauer Fire Works Company, Green Bay, at a net cost of six hundred dollars (\$600.00). Motion by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Herriges. Unanimous vote.

Dennis Reha was granted a variance to the Zoning Ordinance from six (6) feet to eight (8) feet for the erection of a fence can his rear lot line. Variance was granted because of a difference in the elevation of the adjoining lot to his lot. Motion by Trustee D. Nigh, seconded by Trustee Herriges. Unanimous vote.

Al Tennies and William Ruth discussed with the Board as to what could be done to encourage village residents to contribute a greater volume of paper to the Lions Club monthly paper drive.

Recreation Director Tom Larsen discussed with the Board the tentative swimming and recreation program for the summer months. Mr. Don Miller was engaged as swim instructor upon motion by Trustee Herriges, seconded by Trustee Strack. Unanimous vote.

RESOLUTION NO. 75-7

APPLICATION FOR PAR-TICIPATION IN THE NATIONAL FLOOD INSURANCE PROGRAM VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WASHINGTON COUNTY,

WISCONSIN
WHEREAS, certain areas
of the Village of Kewaskum
are subject to periodic flooding from the Milwaukee River causing damages to properties within these areas; and

WHEREAS, relief is available to the Village residents in the form of federally subsidized flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum to require the recognition and evaluation of flood hazards in all official actions relating to land use in the floodplain areas having special flood hazards; and

WHEREAS, the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum on the 6th day of November 1972 adopted appropriate floodland regulations designed to carry out the land use and flood control objectives set forth in the comprehensive plan for the Milwaukee River watershed as prepared and adopted by the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission; and

WHEREAS, such floodland regulations meet or exceed all applicable floodland management standards set forth by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources in Chapter NR 116 of the Wisconsin Administrative Code.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum hereby:

1. Assures the Federal Insurance Administration that it will maintain in force for those areas having flood hazards adequate land use control measures with effective enforcement provisions consistent with the criteria set forth in Chapter NR 116 of the Wisconsin Administrative Code and in Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations; and

2. Vests the Village Zoning Administrator with the responsibility, authority, and means to:

a. Enforce the provisions of the adopted Village of Kewaskum floodland regulations and provide to the Federal Insurance Administrator maps delineating the limits of the areas having special flood hazards as determined by the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission under the Milwaukee River watershed study.

b. Provide such information as the Federal Insurance Administrator may request concerning present uses and occupancy of the floodplain.

c. Cooperate with federal, state, and local agencies and private firms which may undertake to study, survey, and identify for flood insurance purposes floodplain areas, and further cooperate with neighboring communities with respect to management of floodplains in order to prevent aggravation of existing flood hazards.

d. Submit on the anniversary date of eligibility for federal flood insurance an annual report to the Federal Insurance Administrator on the progress made during the past year within the Village of Kewaskum in the development and implementation of

floodplain management mea-

3. Appoints the Village Administrator Zoning maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request a record of elevations related to Mean Sea Level Datum of the lowest floor, including basement, of all new or substantially improved structures located in the 100recurrence year floodplain, and to further record the elevation of any floor immediately above the lowest floor if the lowest floor is below grade on one or more sides.

4. Agrees to take such other official action as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program.

- Keep right. Ride single file. Don't weave in and out, swerve, race or stunt in traffic. Never hitch a ride on a truck or other vehicle.
- 3. For night riding be sure to have reflectorized pedals, a white light and white reflector in front and a red light or state-approved reflector in the rear. Have a clear sounding horn or bell to warn others of your approach.
- 4. Slow down at all intersections, look both ways, then proceed with caution.
- 5. Always give pedestrians the right of way.
- 6. Watch out for cars pulling into traffic or for doors opening.
- 7. Don't carry passengers or prackages that interfere with your vision or control.
- 8. Always use proper hand signals for stopping and turning.

Kewaskum High School will be well represented the Madison area hosts the WIAA's State Track & Field Meets this weekend (Friday and Saturday, June 6 and 7) with the boys competing at Mansfield Stadium in Madison and the girls at Monona Grove High School.

Kewaskum's girl speedster in the 100, Carrie Kempf, won the Sectional in 11.5. The sophomore was a triple winner in the Regional (in the 100, long jump and with the 440 relay team). This prompted one area boys' track coach to comment "she could run on our varsity, leaving the other boys far behind." Carrie's relay team in the 440 had two bad exchanges in the Sectional but will still go to state because the Lake Mills foursome was disqualified. Sisters Lynn. and LuAnn Kempf and Chris Staehler round out this team.

As a team the Kewaskum boys placed third in the Mayville Regional with 79 points and fifth in the Watertown Sectional with 36 points. The girls finished first in the Mayville Regional with 97 points.


