Village Beach to Open on Monday, June 16; Rules Listed

The Kewaskum Village Beach will officially open Monday, June 16. Supervised swimming hours will be from 10:00 a.m. to 8:00 p. m. weekdays and Saturdays. Sunday hours will be 12:00 noon to 8:00 p. m.

Swim lessons for youth 5 to 18 years will be tentatively conducted from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. in two 4-week sessions. Specific lesson times and the number of classes will be determined after registration. Students will be notified of this at an orientation meeting to be held on Monday, June 16, at 10:00 a.m. at the beach.

This year beginning swim lessons will be held for adults 18 and over if there is a sufficient response. These will be conducted in the evening from 6:00 to 7:00 p.m. with separate classes for men and women. You may register by contacting Dan Miller or Dan Meilahn at the beach after June 16.

In the event of bad weather listen to WBKV West Bend Radio for notification of lesson cancellation.

Additional activities are also being planned for the beach. Informal swim competition may be conducted and the second annual River Float inner tube race will be held. Notice of these and any other special events will be given in newspapers and also posted at the beach.

Personnel at the beach will be Dan Miller, head swimming instructor and assistant life guard, Dan Meilahn, head lifeguard and assistant instructor. Assistant lifeguards will be Karen Bade, Ellen Secor and Scott Albers...

Parents are urged to remind their children of the rules which must be obeyed.

1. Rocks, sand, gravel, muder other chiefts must not be

or other objects must not be thrown anywhere in the beach or swimming area.

2. Floating devices and swimming aids (inner tubes, inflatable rafts, large beach balls, etc.) are not permitted in the water as such devices can carry an inexperienced swimmer to water of dangerous depth where he may

3. Glass and metal objects are not allowed on the beach. Soft plastic pails are acceptable but must never be

4. Pushing, shoving and horseplay is not permitted on either the raft or pier. Running on the pier is prohibited as it is dangerous to yourself and others, especially when the pier is wet and slippery. Swimming is never allowed under the raft or pier because if someone bumps their head or injures themselves they may not be spotted in due time. Going down the slide in a standing position is not allowed. This is extremely dangerous.

5. Bikes are to be parked well away from the beach area, preferably in the avail-

able bike rack. Bicycles are never to be ridden on the beach and certainly not into the water

Twelve students from the Kewaskum FFA Chapter were delegates to the State FFA Convention from June 10 - 12 at Green Lake, Wis. Delegates to the State FFA Convention are selected by each chapter and are usually members of the chapter officer team. Each chapter is permitted to send two delegates from its active mem-

bership.

During the State Convention the delegates are seated in a special section at the front of the auditorium. They initiate, debate and vote on all convention business. At the 1975 Convention, delegates voted on several important items including constitutional changes, acceptance of individuals for honorary degrees and distinguished service citations, and selection of the 1975-76 state FFA officers.

Kewaskum FFA was one of the state's most active FFA chapters who were recognized on June 11 with the presentation of the National Chapter Award at the state level at the 46th State FFA Convention, for their superior performance in activities relating to the vocational agriculture / agribusiness and Future Farmers of America programs. This is a prestigious award since it is an evaluation of the overall pro-gram conducted by the FFA during the year. The National Chapter Award encour-ages active FFA chapters and member participation in de variety of educational FFA activities. They were awarded a bronze medal for their efforts.

Kewaskum FFA was one of 42 chapters to be presented with an award for outstanding achievement in the National FFA Chapter Safety Award Program sponsored at the state level jointly by the Wisconsin Power Equipment Retailers Association, Madison: the Wisconsin Farm Electrification Council, Madison: and the University of Wisconsin, Madison. The awards were presented on June 10 at the State Convention at Green Lake.



9. The matter of jumping and diving off the dam is a critical one. This is extremely hazardous and foolhardy. Above the dam, tree limbs and other jagged objects can collect and may not be seen by a jumper. Below the dam, there are deep holes and swifter currents which pose threats to novice swimmers. Also there is a con-crete ledge which can be struck by jumping or diving. The greatest hazard is that the antics of older children attract younger inexperienced swimmers to the dam area where an accident may occur. Again this year no one will be allowed to jump or dive off the dam. Guards will discourage these actions and the police will co-operate to enforce this rule.

The bride is a 1974 graduate of Kewaskum High School. Her husband attended Campbellsport High School and is employed by Zielieke Well Drilling.



In Class B finals, Mike Koepke, Kewaskum senior, finished third in the shotput. He missed second by six inches with a toss of 52'5.5", two and a half feet under his best throw of the season. First place went to Brian Campbell of Chetek with 56'11". Mike finished 11th in the state meet last year with a toss of 50 feet and ½ inch. Dennis Bremser finished sixth in the mile with a time of 4:48.9. The winner was Bill Markwardt of Verona, 4:28.2. John Marino also competed in the 220, won by Don Wier of Omro with a time of 22.8.

Kewaskum's girls' team in the 440 yard relay race placed second being edged out by Lake Mills by a foot or less. Lake Mills had been disqualified in the Sectional but was reinstated. The local girls thus repeated as runnersup to Lake Mills. The three Kempf sisters, Lynn, a senior, LuAnn, a junior, Car-

rie, a sophomore, and Chris Staehler, a senior, were clocked at 51.1, which was also Lake Mills' clocking in almost a photo finish.
