### **Bids on Remodeling at High** School Opened at Board Meeting

Bids on remodeling at the high school were opened at the Board of Education meeting Monday evening and were referred to the building committee for review. Four bids were received, including two for the general construction and one each for plumbing and ventilating. Joseph Wittig Co. bid \$15,594 on the plumbing work and \$1,837 on the ventilating. Bids on the general construction work were \$32,584 from Joseph P. Jansen Co. and \$28,-569.00 from W B. No bids were received on heating.

There was discussion of the location of various kindergarten sections. It was reported by Mr. Brenholt that to take enough students from Kewaskum to Wayne to make up a class would require either additional costs for bus routes or else the students from town would be picked up first and ride a full route. The additional costs were projected at about \$4,000 to avoid the longer bus ride for the village students and others who might leave the Kewaskum attendance area to go to Wayne.

The petition presented by the Farmington PTO was raised. There was no motion to add back the Middle School teachers as requested in the petition.

Discussion was held on the proposal for three additional special education staff. The proposal had been for two teachers of emotionally disturbed (one elementary and one secondary) and a learning disabilities teacher for the secondary schools. The board approved one position, the teacher for emotionally disturbed at the elementary levels. A previous motion and second to add two teachers was defeated on a 5-2 vote, with Jerry Secor and Tom Gundrum voting in favor of the motion.

Approval was given to accept the proposal from Industrial Appraisal to do a complete new inventory. Cost will be \$4,035.00. The board also approved ordering of supplies, materials, and textbooks for next year. The position of Services Manager was cut to a half-time position. Payroll and vouchers payable were approved.

A resignation from Karen Kuehl was accepted. Mrs.

### Dr. Joe Darin **Receives Honors**



A Hurley native whose wife is from the Kewaskum area has received the highest honor a surgeon can receive in this country. Dr. Joseph C. Darin was inducted into the American Surgical Association on May 7. The ceremony took place at the Chateau Frontenac in Quebec, Canada.

He is professor of surgery and vice chairman of the Department of Surgery of the Medical College of Wisconsin, Milwaukee.

The American Surgical Association is the highest honor an American surgeon can achieve. Membership in the association comes after nomination and election to this select group of surgeons in North America.

Dr. Darin received his Bachelor of Science degree from Marquette University and his Doctor of Medicine degree from Marquette University School of Medicine (now the Medical College of Wisconsin).

He served a rotating internship at Columbia Hospital. Milwaukee. His surgical sidency was taken at the Medical College of Wisconsin Affiliated Hospitals.

Miss Strack was elected one of six supervisors for the City of Elm.





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

The Kewaskum Indians split 2 games the past week and had 2 rained out. Last Tuesday night at Regner Park, West Bend, they were defeated by West Bend East, 7-3, and Thursday they won their first conference game at Germantown, 2-0.

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




