Downed Power Line Causes Outage; Firemen Respond

Residents and business places of parts of the Village of Kewaskum and the Towns of Kewaskum and Wayne were without electrical power from shortly before 10 p. m. Friday until after midnight. Dances were in progress at the Wigwam and Amerahn halls at the time.

A downed power line caused the power shortage. Mrs. Walter Spradau of 1130 Roseland Drive reported the downed line at the rear of her property at 9:50 p. m. One end of the broken wire arced on the ground and threw off flashes of electricity while the other sputtered in trees it had fallen into.

The Kewaskum fire department responded to the call and stood by until crews of the Wisconsin Electric Co. arrived to shut down the power and make repairs. Power was restored after midnight.

Firemen were also called out at 12:40 p. m. Saturday to put out two grass fires apparently caused by a passing train. One of the fires was along the railroad tracks south of the village and the other north of Kewaskum.

The firemen invite residents of Kewaskum and surrounding community to add to their holiday enjoyment by attending the fireworks and having a good time. Come early and spend the evening.

In the event of rain Thursday, the fireworks will be held Friday, July 4.

County Receives \$105,962 Grant For New Park

(Washington, D.C.)—Washington County has received a \$105,962 grant from the Department of the Interior to purchase farm land for a new county park, U.S. Rep. Bob Kasten (R.-Wisc) announced Friday.

The funds which were applied for May 30, will be used for the "Gundrum Acquisition" of 210 acres of land, located outside of Slinger. The park will feature facilities for hiking, picnicking and summer and winter sports.

"This is an important aid for acquiring park land," John Beale, deputy secretary of Wisconsin's Department of Natural Resources said when notified of the grant's approval. "We have exhausted all of our state funds for this purpose and we are delighted because this will be a great help to us," Beale said.

Republicans Hold State Parley

Over 1,000 Republican delegates from around Wisconsin gathered at the Green Bay Arena Saturday for their 1975 statewide convention.

Congressman William Steiger presided as chairman; State Senator Thomas E. Petri served as parliamentarian. Party Chairman George Parker spoke with optimism about Republican chances in the next few years, and reported that the party debt has been reduced by almost \$200,000 since last December.

Congressmen William Steiger and Robert Kasten attacked the performance of Democratic representation in Congress. State legislative minority leaders Senator

Clifford Krueger and Assemblyman John Shabaz then gave similar reports on the Democratic leadership in Madison.

Krueger and others were particularly critical of the secret meetings held by state Assembly Democrats on the budget bill.

The keynote speech was delivered by Washington journalist Neil Peirce. Peirce indicated he felt that the United States would face serious economic and political crises in the near future, but predicted the survival of the two-party system.

Efforts to amend the state party constitution were postponed for another year.

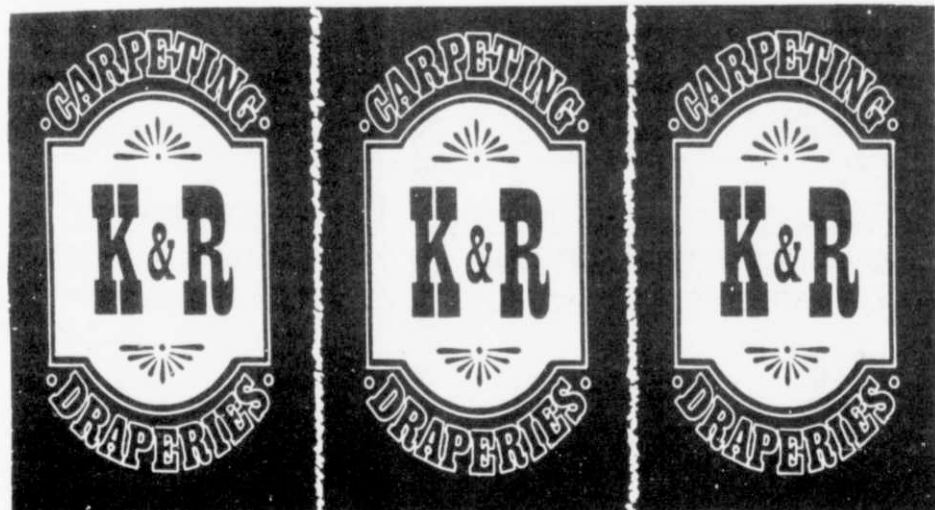
