Annual Firemen's Picnic and Parade Here Sunday, July 13

This year's annual Kewaskum Firemen's fund-raising picnic will be held in the village park on Sunday, July 13, and plans have been completed to make the event another outstanding one.

An excellent parade at 12:30 p. m. sharp will highlight the picnic and get festivities underway. The parade will feature such famous musical units as the Central Airs Drum & Bugle Corps of Stevens Point, St. Matthias Drum & Bugle Corps of Milwaukee, Racine - Kenosha Scouts Drum & Bugle Corps, Cardinal Cadets Band of Wauwatosa, Challenger Band of Milwaukee, Milwaukee Junior Band, Hartford Civic Band, our own Kewaskum High School Band, plus other musical organizations. Other units will include the Electrolytes Baton Corps of Menomonee Falls, Emerald Baton Corps of Greenfield, Tripoli Motor Corps of Milwaukee, drill teams, beautiful floats, baton twirlers, majorettes, children's societies, visiting firemen and equipment, Legionnaires, comic entries, orchestras, ancient cars, riding horses, clubs, organizations and many more.

Hundreds of persons will participate in the mammoth parade, which will last approximately one hour. The parade will form at the high school and adjacent streets, from where it will proceed to the park. All participants should be present to line up no later than noon. Persons wishing to enter the parade should contact Bob Staehler, parade chairman, or Jim Staehler. Theme for this year's parade will be "Kewaskum's Heritage." All area businessmen and others are invited to enter a float in the parade.

Prizes will be awarded for floats as follows: 1st, \$100; 2nd, \$60; 3rd, \$40; 4th, \$20. There will be the children's specialties section for those 12 and under with prizes to be awarded as follows: 1st, \$12; 2nd, \$8; 3rd, \$6; 4th, \$4; 5th, \$2.

Immediately following the parade there will be exhibitions by drum and bugle corps in the park. From then on there will be continuous music and entertainment throughout the afternoon and evening. Live music will be furnished on the park stage and in the popular beer garden by Joe Karman's band of Milwaukee on the stage in the afternoon and in the beer garden at night and Ferd Buchel's band in the beer garden during the afternoon. Admission to the beer garden will be free.

Adding to the festivities there will be kiddie rides, concessions, games and a variety of refreshments and food, including tasty hamburgers and brats.

The popular water fights will again be held at 6:30 p. m. with neighboring fire departments competing.

Tickets are available for 89 valuable prizes which will be awarded in conjunction with the picnic. First prize will be \$500 cash. Winners will be announced at a later date.

Burglary, Arson Suspect Ordered To Join Program

Wayne Erickson, 19, of 179 E. Paradise Dr., West Bend, charged with arson for a fire occurring early Sunday at the county jail, was ordered Tuesday to sign up with a Milwaukee program called Wisconsin Family as an alternative to jail.

Erickson was charged Monday with arson for allegedly setting fire to the mattress in his jail cell. He was being held in custody for suspected involvement in a Kewaskum burglary, for which he was also charged Monday.

\$80 in cash, some food, a camera and wrist watches were reported missing and the house was ransacked in the burglary at the John Hammes residence on First Street, Kewaskum, Saturday night. Mrs. Hammes was taken to the hospital in the Kewaskum rescue squad ambulance when she became ill from the excitement after discovering the burglary.

At his first court appearance, bail for Erickson was set at \$3,000 cash or surety, but it was modified Tuesday to an unsecured recognizance bond.

Paul Salerno of Wisconsin Correctional Service described the Wisconsin Family program in which Erickson will be participating as a residential treatment program for drug and alcohol abusers. He said the therapeutic program was designed as an alternative to incarceration.

The court ordered Erickson to report to his attorney within 24 hours if he leaves Wisconsin Family and to report to the court in person the following Monday. The matter was adjourned on a day-to-day basis not beyond Aug. 25.

Prisoners in the county jail had to be evacuated from their cells Sunday morning after the prisoner set a mattress on fire. The fire department was called at 4:28 a. m. There was no threat of the building being on fire but the smoldering polyethylene mattress produced heavy smoke. The damage was minimal. The Sheriff Clarence Schwartz, said the prisoner complained of being sick because of some drugs he had taken. He was checked at the hospital, released and returned to his cell. Apparently disgruntled by his treatment, the young man set fire to his mattress with matches he had.

Attend Convention Of Kiwanis International

ATLANTA, GEORGIA—Mr. and Mrs. Marvin A. Martin of Kewaskum, attended the 60th annual convention of Kiwanis International in Atlanta, June 22 - 25.

Mr. and Mrs. Martin were among 18,000 people attending the convention, representing 280,000 Kiwanians in 47 countries. Martin is a member of the Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum. As a delegate he elected new Kiwanis International officers and trustees, passed resolutions upon which the organization's 1975-76 community service programs will be built, and amended the Kiwanis International constitution.

Other convention activities included addresses by Dr. William S. Banowsky, president of Pepperdine University; Dean Rusk, former Secretary of State and currently professor of International law at the University of Georgia; Kiwanis International President Roy W. Davis; columnist Ann Landers; and a host of other personalities. Other convention activities included various award luncheons and banquets; workshops and clinics; youth tours and dances for the young people; special ladies programs for the wives; and a series of conferences on contemporary issues headed by experts in various socioeconomic fields including Andre' Raynauld, chairman of the Economic Council of Canada; Clarence Kelley, director of the FBI, and Elliot Rapaport, president of the American Heart Association.

Village Recycling Center Open Every Third Saturday

Every third Saturday of the month the Jr. Woman's Club opens their recycling center at the village garage. From 9 to 12 they take in cans, glass and aluminum, sort it, crush it and end up with sore muscles but much accomplished.

The glass they recycle goes into new glass, glassphalt, building materials, etc. The cans make new metals and metal products. Recovering these reduces the volume of waste, thus saving landfill space. Industry uses these recycled products—steel uses up to 52% of secondary materials, paper 45% and glass 15%.

Board OK's Kindergarten Classes, Remodeling, Bus Contract, Budget

A number of decisions affecting the coming school year were made at the Kewaskum School Board meeting held Monday.

The first topic discussed was the location of kindergarten classes next year. Ery Gorecki was present to discuss with the board the bussing which would be involved in taking enough children from the Kewaskum area to Wayne to hold two sessions at Wayne. It would have resulted in higher costs or relatively long bus rides for the children involved. Depending on the method used to transport, the costs could have gone as high as a maximum of some \$4,300. A motion to set two sessions at Wayne and three at Kewaskum was defeated 4 to 3, with Jim Oelhafen, Byron Gessner and Dr. Ogi voting yes. A motion creating one section at Beechwood was then passed unanimously. A motion was then made to hold four sections in Kewaskum, one in Wayne, two in Farmington, and one in Beechwood. This motion passed 4 to 3, with the same members who had voted yes on the previous Wayne-Kewaskum vote voting no on this motion.

Bids on remodeling were accepted totaling \$64,023, with directions to change the flooring in the proposed wrestling room from Tarkett to tile. This will reduce the total somewhat, and the building committee was authorized to negotiate other necessary changes with the various contractors.

At the recommendation of the board transportation committee, a one year contract was approved with Johnson Bus Company. The total rate increases will amount to about 9 or 10%. The previous contract had been in effect three years, with one rate change during that time.

The budget, with a tax levy of \$1,685,728.99, was tentatively approved for presentation to the annual meeting. This would represent an increase of \$34,367.95 over this year, with a tax rate of about 14 mills. The rate this year was 14.77 mills. It was anticipated most of the increase would come from new building, rather than previously existing property.

The agenda for the annual meeting was approved, and the board then adjourned to executive session to discuss negotiations and other salaries.

School Board, KEA in Tentative Agreement at Bargaining Session

The Kewaskum School Board reached tentative agreement with the Kewaskum Education Association on the school calendar for the 1975-1976 term at a negotiations session June 23. Under the tentative agreement, school will begin September 2 and end June 3.

Following the Monday night bargaining session, the KEA and school board announced that agreement has been reached on all but three of the language items for the 1975-1976 master agreement. Monetary issues have not been discussed yet.

Those language items which have been tentatively agreed upon include the grievance procedure, retirement age, layoff procedure and teacher inservice days.

The length of the teachers' school day will remain the same, as will the fair share provision in the present agreement.

The board and teachers agreed to mandatory retirement at age 65 for teachers. The probationary status for first and second year teachers was eliminated; and a layoff clause providing for a set procedure when staff reduction is necessary, was added.

A limit was placed on the time that teachers are required to attend inservice sessions. A minimum of five and one-half days is required; in addition teachers may be re-

quired to attend 10 additional hours of training.

The board and KEA have been bargaining since early February. The next bargaining session is scheduled for July 7.

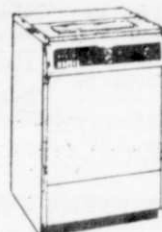

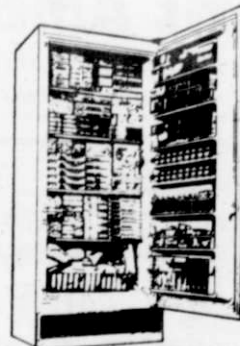

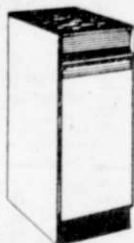

A benefit dance for Sally Tyda Gartzke, a resident of Kewaskum since 1967, will be held on July 25 at Amcrahn Hall in Kewaskum. Music by Normie Dogs with advance tickets \$1.00 and \$1.50 at the door. Tickets may be purchased from members of the following sponsoring organizations: Kiwanis, Lions Club, Jaycees and Junior Woman's Club.

Sally Tyda Gartzke was involved in an automobile ac-

cident on April 10, 1970 in which she incurred severe facial injuries and leg injuries. She spent five months, 24 days in the hospital. During this time she submitted to six surgeries. She received an out of court settlement with the lawyer receiving over half the settlement and the remaining did not cover her original hospital bill. In the spring of 1972 she was hospitalized and again in the summer of 1972 for surgery to reconstruct her kneecap. In the fall of 1972 she was hospitalized for an infection in that same knee. Fall of 1973, January 1974 and Ap-

ril 1974 she submitted to three surgeries on her knee and finally in September of 1974, her left leg was amputated above the knee. Twice more in 1974 she spent additional time in the hospital. The last extended stay being Dec. 17, 1974 when she fell and dislocated the left hip and had a metal pin inserted in that hip.

She is in need of EEG's every 30 days at Milwaukee Lutheran Hospital and still does not have an artificial limb. There is nearly \$7,000 in outstanding hospital and doctor bills without the limb. Before her accident she

was a volunteer worker for "Hot Line" in Washington County for two years and was also active in scouting as a Den Mother from 1967-1971.

The community feels they would like to help her now in this time of need. A fund has been established for Sally at Valley Bank in Kewaskum.

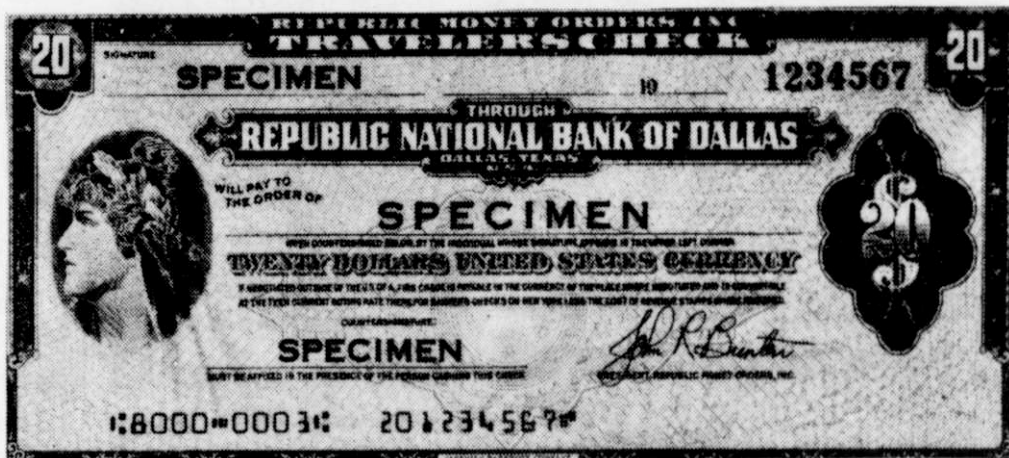

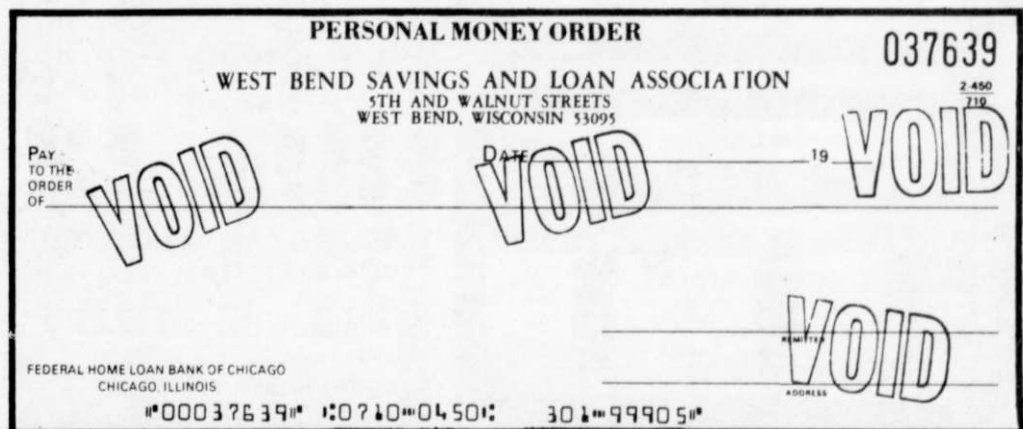

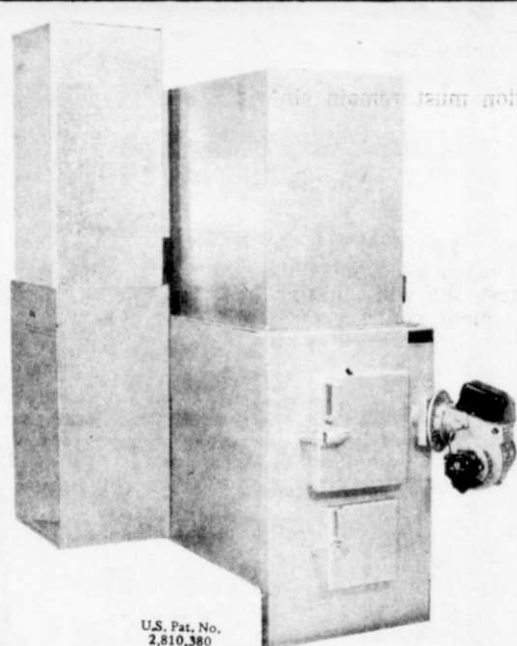

Fairest of Fairs Contest
