Board Approves \$200,000 Loan to Buy Schmidt Property for New Fire House, Also Geidel Property

The Kewaskum Village Board met on July 7. Board members authorized Village President Charles Miller to borrow \$200,000.00 at 5½% interest for 10 years from Valley Bank. This money will be used for purchase of the Clarinda Schmidt property on the south side of the village for a new fire house, the Wallace Geidel property on Fond du Lac Ave., and anticipated village projects. The unused portion of money will be reinvested until needed.

Motion was made to approve payment to LaVerne Geidel of \$18,466.88 for purchase of the Wallace Geidel property. Original purchase price was \$19,700.00 with \$1,000.00 down on day of sale. Prorated taxes of \$233.12 were deducted from original price leaving the \$18,466.88 amount.

Motion was made and passed for Chief Hlavaty to attend Robert Buddenhagen's graduation from Police Academy at Camp McCoy on Aug. 1. He was also granted permission to attend the Chiefs Convention at Rhineland Aug. 18-20.

It was decided after discussion on repaving, sweeping and crack filling of various streets and Main St. in Kewaskum in the amount of \$6,936.32, to meet with the village attorney before signing contracts.

A letter was received from Phil Majerus with a reminder that as of July 1, 1975 there was an increase in refuse fee of .75 per cubic yard which raises the price per load from \$9.60 to \$12.00 per load.

Motion made by Dan Schmidt and passed to approve certified survey map of Wilmer Ramthun for property on Werner Drive.

Two building permits submitted by Ronald Johann and Bldg. Associates of West Bend were approved.

Arthur & Associates have submitted a progress report on construction of curbing in new subdivisions and a layout plan of the new park. Soil test borings have been sent to Sheboygan with no report received as yet.

Motion was made and passed to grant a raise to Dan Tessar who has worked part time for the past five summers. The raise will be retroactive to starting time this summer.

Question was raised as to blocking off one parking spot in front of Miller's Furniture. This had been discussed previously and now will be acted upon.

Gregor Nigh made motion to adopt Resolution No. 75-10 establishing charges for the replacement or repair of sidewalk and curb and gutter. Motion passed.

Dave Nigh raised the question as to garbage pick-

up on Thursdays when a holiday falls on a Friday. It was decided people would probably not see a notice in advance and garbage would be at the curb on the regular days.

Roger Strack brought up the subject of sidewalk from Bel-Ric Acres. The Kewaskum School Board had requested such sidewalk in order to eliminate some bussing. Several board members stated the village would be better off paying a share of bussing rather than the expense of sidewalk construction. Another factor brought up was that if sidewalk is constructed in one area, all areas without sidewalk now, would request sidewalk and this is financially impossible. Board members will check into the matter.

Registration for Second Session Of Swim Lessons Monday, July 14

Registration for the second session of swim lessons will be Monday, July 14, at the Municipal Building from 9:00 a. m. to 11:00 a. m.

Fees for this second session will be \$.50 (fifty cents) for persons beginning lessons who reside within the village and \$1.00 (one dollar) for those beginning lessons who reside outside of the village limits. No additional charge will be made for persons who were previously registered for the first session.

Classes for beginners will be offered in four sections—10:00, 10:30, 11:00 and 11:30; advanced beginners at 12:00 and intermediate and swim-

mers at 12:30. Lessons will begin Tuesday, July 15.

Swim lessons so far have been well attended and the response to the life saving course has been gratifying. The weather has co-operated allowing children to enjoy swimming activities. However, this year there seems to be more foreign objects on the river bottom than usual, and, due to gradual erosion, the rocks on the east shore present a hazard when entering or leaving the water. Therefore it is more important than ever to practice general caution and to obey all rules when swimming at the village beach.

Annual Firemen's Picnic Sunday

All is in readiness for this year's annual Kewaskum Firemen's picnic to be held in the village park this Sunday, July 13, and plans have been completed to make this year's event another outstanding one.

An excellent parade at 12:30 p. m. sharp will highlight the picnic and get festivities underway. The parade will feature such famous musical units as the Central Airs Drum & Bugle Corps of Stevens Point, St. Matthias Drum & Bugle Corps of Milwaukee, Racine - Kenosha Scouts Drum & Bugle Corps, Cardinal Cadets Band of Wauwatosa, Challenger Band of Milwaukee, Milwaukee Junior Band, Hartford Civic Band, our own Kewaskum High School Band, plus other musical organizations. Other units will include the Electrolytes Baton Corps of Menomonee Falls, Emerald Baton Corps of Greenfield, Tripoli Motor Corps of Milwaukee, drill teams, beautiful floats, baton twirlers, majorettes, children's specialties, visiting firemen and equipment, Legionnaires, comic entries, orchestras, ancient cars, riding horses, clubs, or-

ganizations and many more.

Hundreds of persons will participate in the mammoth parade, which will last approximately one hour. The parade will form at the high school and adjacent streets, from where it will proceed to the park. All participants should be present to line up no later than noon. Persons wishing to enter the parade should contact Bob Staehler, parade chairman, or Jim Staehler. Theme for this year's parade will be "Kewaskum's Heritage." All area businessmen and others are invited to enter a float in the parade.

Prizes will be awarded for floats as follows: 1st, \$100; 2nd, \$60; 3rd, \$40; 4th, \$20. There will be the children's specialties section for those 12 and under with prizes to be awarded as follows: 1st, \$12; 2nd, \$8; 3rd, \$6; 4th, \$4; 5th, \$2.

Immediately following the parade there will be exhibitions by drum and bugle corps in the park. From then on there will be continuous music and entertainment throughout the afternoon and evening. Live music will be furnished on the park stage and in the popular beer garden by Joe Karman's band of Milwaukee on the stage in the afternoon and in the beer garden at night and Ferd Buchel's band in the beer garden during the afternoon. Admission to the beer garden will be free.

Adding to the festivities there will be kiddie rides, concessions, games and a variety of refreshments and food, including tasty hamburgers and brats.

The popular water fights will again be held at 6:30 p. m. with neighboring fire departments competing.

Tickets are available for 89 valuable prizes which will be awarded in conjunction with the picnic. First prize will be \$500 cash. Winners will be announced at a later date.

Everyone is invited to come for "gemuetlichkeit" and a good time at the annual Kewaskum picnic.

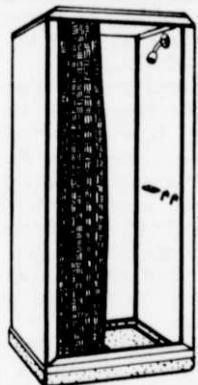

Tornado Warnings Will Come Via Radio in County

In tornado weather county residents should tune in to their local radio stations, WBKV in the West Bend area and WTKM in Hartford, for information.

The Washington County Sheriff's Department has made arrangements to contact the two radio stations about tornadoes that have been sighted and may be heading for the county.

WBKV-FM broadcasts at 92.5 frequencies and WTKM-FM broadcasts at 104.9. Although WTKM-FM normally goes off the air at 10 p.m. and WBKV at midnight, both stations can continue broadcasting after hours in case of emergency.

Both stations also broadcast on AM in daylight hours, WBKV at 14.70 and WTKM at 15.40. But because of the interference stormy weather creates on AM, listeners wanting information on tornadoes are urged to tune FM.

To keep the stations' telephone lines open in case of emergency, people are urged not to call the stations for information, but to turn on their radios.

Sheriff Clarence Schwartz said the arrangement with the stations was made because of growing public concern about tornadoes. He said he had received requests from mobile home parks, factories, nursing homes and other institutions to call them with tornado warnings. The department would be willing to communicate with the radio stations rather than trying to call everyone who has requested it, the sheriff said.

If a tornado is heading for a town in the hours the radio stations are off, dispatch cars will go through the town to alert the people, Schwartz said.

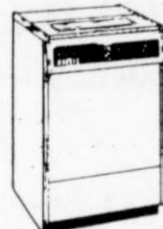

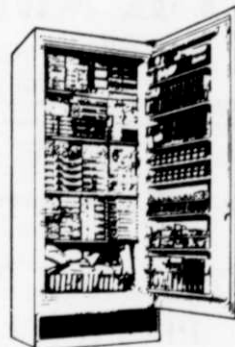

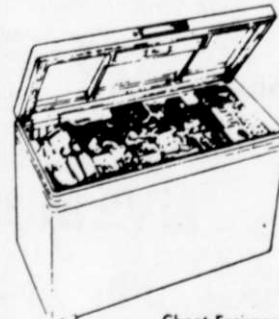

The "Deutsche Apotheke" was built and was operated for 37 years by Charles Miller, who died in 1913. It was the first drug store in Kewaskum and Mr. Miller also established the first photographic studio. He took this

picture in the early 1890's with the "young lads," Edward C. Miller (his son), Oscar Koerble, August Backhaus and Carl Meinhardt posing on the store steps. Main Street has been lowered by almost three feet since that

time. Edward C. Miller then operated the photographic, patent medicine and sporting goods store for 24 years. This is Charles F. Miller's 38th year conducting Miller Electric & Miller Studio at this historic location. Charles F. Miller is a grandson of the

Esser Attends UW Session

When it was first used a few years ago, the computer as a tool in managing forests was something which aided only big companies.

That's all changed now, and it was evident during the weekend when 25 high school vocational agriculture teachers from small communities in the state got firsthand coaching at the University of Wisconsin - Stevens Point on how to use a computer in planning future woodlot harvests on family farms.

Professor William Sylves-

ter of the UW-Stevens Point College of Natural Resources, led sessions for group with such exercises as using computer formulas to determine what the crop would be if a hypothetical plantation went untrimmed for 25 years as compared with thinning pro-

jects in varying time slots. The teachers did field study in the Isaak Walton League plantation near Stevens Point.

Sylvester said many school districts in Wisconsin now have their own computers which can be used by "vo-

ag" teachers in helping their students better manage forest lands in their family farms.

Sylvester arranged the program with Wayne Ganser of Stevens Point, representing

the Wisconsin Association of Vocational Agriculture Instructors.

Teachers who attended included Roy Esser, Kewaskum.
