Board Approves \$200,000 Loan to **Buy Schmidt Property for New** Fire House, Also Geidel Property

By Karen Schmidt The Kewaskum Village Board met on July 7. Board The members authorized Village President Charles Miller to borrow \$200,000.00 at 5½% interest for 10 years from Valley Bank. This money will be used for purchase of the Clarinda Schmidt property on the south side of the village for a new fire house, the Wallace Geidel property on Fond du Lac Ave., and anticipated village projects. The unused portion of money will be reinvested until needed.

Motion was made to approve payment to LaVerne Geidel of \$18,466.88 for purchase of the Wallace Geidel property. Original purchase price was \$19,700.00 with \$1,000.00 down on day of sale. Prorated taxes of \$233.-12 were deducted from original price leaving the \$18,-466.88 amount.

Motion was made and passed for Chief Hlavaty to attend Robert Buddenhagen's graduation from Police Academy at Camp McCoy on Aug. 1. He was also granted permission to attend the Chiefs Convention at Rhinelander Aug. 18-20.

It was decided after discussion on repaving, sweeping and crack filling of various streets and Main St. in Kewaskum in the amount of \$6,936.32, to meet with the village attorney before signing contracts.

A leter was received from Phil Majerus with a reminder that as of July 1, 1975 there was an increase in refuse fee of .75 per cubic yard which raises the price per load from \$9.60 to \$12.00 per load.

Motion made by Dan Schmidt and passed to approve certified survey map of Wilmer Ramthun for property on Werner Drive.

Two building permits submitted by Ronald Johann and Bldg. Associates of West Bend were approved.

Arthur & Associates have submitted a progress report on construction of curbing in new subdivisions and a layout plan of the new park. Soil test borings have been sent to Sheboygan with no report received as yet.

Tornado Warnings Will Come Via Radio in County

In tornado weather county residents should tune in to their local radio stations, WBKV in the West Bend area and WTKM in Hartford, for information.

The Washington County Sheriff's Department has made arrangements to contact the two radio stations about tornadoes that have been sighted and may be heading for the county.

WBKV-FM broadcasts at 92.5 frequencies and WTKM-FM broadcasts at 104.9. Although WTKM-FM normally goes off the air at 10 p.m. and WBKV at midnight, both stations can continue broadcasting after hours in case of emergency.

Both stations also broadcast on AM in daylight hours, WBKV at 14.70 and WTKM at 15.40. But because of the interference stormy weather creates on AM, listeners

wanting information on tornadoes are urged to tune FM. To keep the stations' telephone lines open in case of emergency, people are urged not to call the stations for information, but to turn on their radios.

Sheriff Clarence Schwartz said the arrangement with the stations was made because of growing public concern about tornadoes. He said he had received requests from mobile home parks, factories, nursing homes and other institutions to call them with tornado warnings. The department would be willing to communicate with the radio stations rather than trying to call everyone who has requested it, the sheriff said.

If a tornado is heading for a town in the hours the radio stations are off, dispatch cars will go through the town to alert the people, Schwartz said.
