\$3.54 Million Budget Passed at Annual School Meeting Monday

A \$3.54 million budget was passed unanimously and with almost no discussion at the annual meeting Monday of the Kewaskum Community Schools, Joint School District No. 2.

The local levy next year will be \$1.45 million, plus an additional \$240,000 owed in back taxes, for a mill rate of about 14 as compared to 14.77 last year. In addition, projected state and federal aids will total almost \$1.2 million.

Actual spending last year totalled almost exactly \$5 million, but it must be remembered that this included the \$1.6 million building program approved in 1973. Only \$45,000 is budgeted this year for new buildings and additions, which will cover the cost of remodeling the new high school wrestling room.

Superintendent of Schools Floyd Brenholt reported that \$361,000 in back taxes are still owed to the district this year, as compared to \$240,000 in previous years, creating a shortage of cash, consequently \$2,500 has been budgeted for interest on short term

In answer to a question by a member of the audience, high school principal Clark Pearson reported that the school would be evaluated by a team from the North Central Accreditation Association sometime in February, instead of October, as originally planned, but that the de-lay was "at their request, lay was not ours."

School board member Gerald Secor spoke out on two subjects that he was concerned about, only nine teachers in the middle school, and the failure to hire a learning disabilities teacher at the junior high level and a teacher for the emotionally disturbed at the junior high and high school level, even though 75% of their salaries would be funded by the state. Calling the new middle "understaffed," felt that the members of the board who voted against rehiring a teacher at that level were concerned about the economic situation.

In response to the statements made on the special education teacher, board president Dr. Charles Ogi responded by reading excerpts from an editorial stating that our children are categorized too much today, and part of the problem was due to immaturity.

A concerned citizen asked about some discipline problems which are present in the middle school. Ogi assured the audience that they would be taken care of this year. When asked how the elimination of three middle school teachers would help alleviate this situation, he replied, "sometimes the more people you have present, the harder it is to get things done." He also felt that it is hard for

the board to make decisions sometimes, because school board meetings are so poorly attended and the voters' wishes aren't always known.

Brenholt replied that everyone present knew his stand on the issue, and that the board had given him an ample opportunity to express its feelings, as well as anyone else in the district, who may have cared to do so, and that he felt that the board acted in good faith.

Re-Elect School **Board Officers**

The Kewaskum School Board met in the high school library following the annual meeting on Monday, July 28.

The incumbent officers were re-elected for the 1975-76 term. Dr. Charles Ogi was re-elected as president of the board, James Oelhafen was re-elected clerk and Byron Gessner was re-elected trea-

The board unanimously approved the resignations of Barbara Bechler, 3rd grade teacher at Farmington teacher at Farmington School; Chris Lessner, speech therapist for the Kewaskum Elementary School and Peggy Cook, business education at the Kewaskum High School.

Contracts for four new teachers were unanimously approved. The bids on fuel oil and school lunch program milk were opened and the bids will be tabulated and acted on at the next school board meeting.

The bid was accepted from Scott Construction, Inc. for the installation of an asphalt parking area on the south side of the new high school gymnasium.

The board adjourned to executive session to discuss the opening in the Business Education Department that was vacated by the resignation of Ms. Cook.

ents and human history. Included in the plains portion of the trip will be camping stops in the Badlands and Black Hills of North Dakota and at the Oglala National Grasslands and Agate Fossil Beds of Nebraska.

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

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
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Back-to-Back No-Hitters

In his latest gem, Koth retired all 21 batters he faced. The senior right-hander struck out 14 and didn't walk a batter. His teammates supported him with errorless ball. In his last outing, Koth pitched a no-hitter against Lomira, Flyway Conference champs, in Regional play here last week. During the season Scott lost three 1-0 games and one other by one run.
