Fire Destroys Large Barn On Neuman Farm Sunday

Pictures on page 4 on the Roger Neuman farm, one mile west of Kewaskum on County Trunk H Sunday afternoon. The blaze also damaged the lower story, an adjoining new milking parlor on the south end of the

barn and a milk house on the north end.

The Kewaskum fire departmen was called out at 2:40 p. m. The barn was totally involved in fire when they arrived. The fire started in the vicinity of a hay dryer and a neighbor heard what sounded like an explosion, according to acting fire chief Augie Bilgo, Jr. Most equipment and all livestock, including some 40 calves, were saved. The barn was approximately 40 b y140 feet long. About 250 tons of hay was lost but no estimate could be given of the total loss.

The Kewaskum department had 37 men and all their equipment at the scene, including two tank trucks to haul water from the village. Mutual aid calls were placed with the Kohlsville Campbellsport departments. Kohlsville had two tank trucks and 25 men present. Campbellsport also supplied a tank truck and a number of firemen. A local milk hauler, Glenway Backhaus, also

had a tanker truck present. Fire destroyed a large barn The six tankers couldn't haul the Roger Neuman farm, water fast enough for a time.

The firemen were on the scene until 12:30 a.m. Monday, a period of almost 10 hours. Lunch and refreshments were served them while they worked in hot weather. Approximately 45 tank loads or 90,000 gallons of water were hauled from the hydrant at the fire house with sirens screaming.

Mr. and Mrs. Neuman were away on a weekend up north but Roger's father, Walter Neuman, who had just sold the farming operation to his son, was home. He spotted smoke and called in the report. A neighbor, William smoke fire from his home across the street. The barn foundation and portions of the first floor were all that remained.

About 70 firemen from the three departments fought the blaze. Kohlsville was called immediately. It is not known whether the fire might have from spontaneous combustion. Smoke could be seen for miles and curiosity seekers hampered the operation until Kewaskum police and sheriff's deputies blocked off the roads leading to the scene. The house was not touched.

The heat from the fire and

weather took its toll on several Kewaskum firemen. A new member, Ken Bonlender, was overcome and treated on the scene. Ron Amerling suffered minor burns on his leg. one other fireman had a small cut on his forehead when he scampered from the milk house when part of the roof caved in, and others had to lie down for short periods

Re-Appraisal Proposed at Board Meeting

By Karen Schmidt The Kewaskum Village Board met in regular session with all board members present on Aug. 4.

An explanation of Resolution 75-13 to purchase the Clarinda Schmidt property for construction of a new fire station was given. Payment will be \$1,000.00 annually off the principle at 5% interest.

Donald Mlodzik appeared to inquire as to adjustment of sewer charge as discussed at the previous meeting. It was explained that if there was to be an adjustment, it wouldn't be until the year was in and that the village has to create rates according to EPA regulations. Rates are based on volume, BOD and suspended solids.

Motion was made to approve a building permit for a one family residence for Wilbur Ratzburg in Roseland Hills Subdivision, addition No. 2 built by Hetzel Builders.

At the July 21 meeting, Dan Schmidt proposed a reappraisal for the village due to growth of economy and population. At that time, Village Clerk William Martin was to check the cost of the last re-appraisal and the year it was done. The last complete re-appraiasl was done by Doane Appraisal Company in 1967 for \$6,600.00. It was explained that the reason they had the low bid in 1967 was due to the fact they had done previous appraising work for the village and used previous work cards. If a new firm had received the bid the cost would have been higher as they would complete their own work cards. During the discussion, it was brought up that a new appraisal cannot be accomplished until it is provided for in the budget and it cannot be in the budget until bids are received so the amount is known to put in the budget. William Martin stated that permission has to be requested from the state to do an appraisal and the state will recommend appraising firms that comply with state regulations. The clerk was advised to proceed with contacting the state au-

Trustee Roger Strack in-

quired as to advertising for bids on the dredging for the pool so when the test boring results are received there would be no delay in waiting for bids. It was explained that the final specifications were not ready, but by the Aug. 18 meeting, the test samples and specifications should be ready. It was decided the board would meet at 7:30 p. m. to go to the park for an on-site inspection before the regular meet-

Trustee Schmidt referred to the July 21 minutes in the previous discussion of low hanging trees. He referred to Ordinance 15-28 which requires the property owner to maintain trees 8 feet above sidewalk and 12 feet above the street. A notice will be placed in the paper to notify property owners to trim trees and if not done the village will have the trees trimmed and bill the property owner.

Dan Schmidt appeared as a representative of the Kewas-kum Historical Society to request the village to have their attorney draft a lease between the society and the village for the old village gagage (which the village has stated the society could

use as a museum). This lease would be for \$1.00 per year for ten years with an additional two ten-year options with the lease commencing Sept. 1, 1975. The Historical Society would carry insurance to cover the entire contents of the building with the village carrying insurance to cover the structure. The village attorney will draw up the lease.

The board discussed the problem of property owners raking leaves, grass, etc. into the street where it eventually ends up in the sewer. A notice had been posted in the paper with no effect; another notice is a possibility.

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

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

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Indians Nip West Hartland Ousts Bend West for Sectional Title

After winning the Regional title here the week before and clobbering Dodgeland in the first game of the Sectional at West Bend last Tuesday night, the Kewaskum Indians went on to edge West Bend West there Friday night in a 2-1 thriller, to cop the Sectional crown and advance, to the state tournament this week.

It was a rematch between ace pitchers Scott Koth of the Indians and John Jazak of West, who faced each other in an early season non-conference game. The first time in a tight duel Jazak was the winner as West eked out a 1-0 win. This time out it was Koth's turn in a 2-1 big one. Koth allowed just 3 hits, struck out and walked Jazak gave up 4 hits, fanned 8 and walked 2.

The Indians, who were the "home team," drew first blood in the 2nd inning. Shortstop Steve Leverenz could not handle a slow rol-ler off the bat of Tom Rohlinger. Kewaskum scored the winning run in the 4th. Rinzel led off with a single and Laatsch followed with a long double to right. Righ fielder Mayer's throw to the plate bounded away from catcher Meyer and Rinzel attempted to score. Pitcher Jazak, who was backing up the play, fielded the ball and threw to the plate. Rinzel was called out on a close call, Laatsch going to 3rd. Don Gruber hit a roller which Jazak fielded and threw to 1st. His throw was wide and Gruber was ruled safe, allowing Laatsch to score the winning run.
