School Board Raises Wage Scales 6% for Non-Certified Personnel

Wage scales for non-certified personnel were approved at the Kewaskum School Board meeting Monday evening. The basic scheduled steps were increased 6%, with non-scheduled personnel also receiving a 6% increase. An additional 25c per hour will be paid the supervisor of the night cleaning crew.

Two teacher contracts were approved. They were Wendy Wallner in business education and Janice Hartmann as half-time kindergarten teacher at Beechwood. The milk bid from John Engelhardt was accepted, but the board took no action on oil bids. The board asked Mr. Brenholt to check availability if supplies become tight and to work out the best arrangement possible.

Lunch program prices were approved. Daily tickets will be 65c per meal for students and 75c for adults. Five-meal tickets will be \$3.75. Extra milk with lunch will be 4c for students and 10c for adults.

Mr. Pearson, Mr. Esser and Mr. Brenholt raised the question of setting aside an area near the tennis courts where high school students may smoke. The problem is that students have been creating some difficulties for those living near the schools by smoking on their property. The board agreed this could be done on a trial basis. They also called for increasing efforts to stop the student smoking in the building. A policy of requiring parents of students with a third smoking offense to appear before the board will be considered.

A resolution authorizing short-term borrowing of up to \$500,000 was approved. The money will be borrowed if and as needed to meet necessary expenses if there is a delay in tax or state aid money.

Byron Gessner and Richard Theusch were reappointed to the transportation committee. A towel fee of \$3.00 will be charged all high school and middle school students who use towels. The board adjourned to executive session to discuss teacher negotiations.

Admission is FREE so come and take part in a bit of "farm nostalgia!"

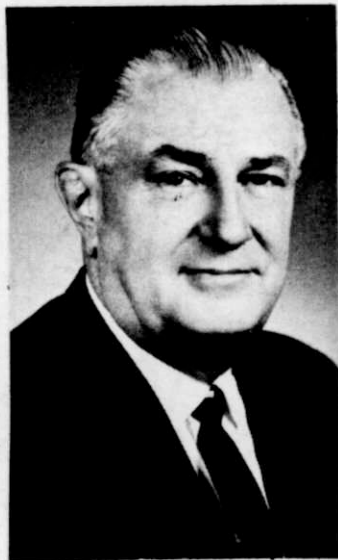
AFS Student Arrives Aug. 7

Bike-Truck Crash Kills Boy, Age 11

Thomas Beck, 11, of R. 3, Campbellsport, died Wednesday, Aug. 6, when he was struck by a truck as he rode a bicycle on a Town of Wayne road near St. Killian.

Beck, the son of John and Patricia Wiesner Beck, turned in front of a passing milk truck driven by Russell Linde of R. 4, Beaver Dam, on St. Killian Heights Road about three-quarters of a mile north of Hwy. 28.

The boy died of head injuries. The accident occurred at 11:30 a. m. within a mile of his family's home.

Linde said he thought the boy knew he was coming because the boy turned around and looked at the approaching truck. Although authorities didn't know why the boy turned in front of the truck, they said it was possible his bicycle wheel hit a stone causing him to swerve.

Thomas Joseph Beck was born May 20, 1964 at West Bend, where he had lived for eight years prior to his present address. He was a student in the sixth grade at Wayne School.

Survivors include his parents; two brothers, Steven, 13, and Robert, 10; one sister, Sharon, 12, all at home; his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Wiesner of Kewaskum; his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. John C. Beck of Milwaukee; uncles, aunts and other relatives.

Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District Supervisor Norbert Dettmann, R. 1, Kewaskum, attended the Upper Mississippi Region seminar held at Bettendorf, Iowa, recently. More than 200 district officials from eight midwest states participated in the 3-day meeting.

"Even though we've been pushing conservation for 30 years in Washington County, there is still a lot of land not under good conservation management," Dettmann said. More erosion occurred on midwest farms during 1974 than in any year in the past 30 years. Practicing conservation is still the choice of the landuser, but the weight of responsibility gets heavier as population pressures mount, he added.
