School Begins Tuesday, Sept. 2

Tuesday, Sept. 2, is the date for opening of school in the Kewaskum District. All students will report on that day. and it will be a full day.

School times are the same as last year. Grades 1-6 will begin at 9:05 and be dismissed at 3:40. Grades 7-12 will begin at 7:45 and dismiss at 2:45. Letters are being sent to parents of kindergarteners giving the times of their classes.

Letters are also being sent to all students who will be in grades 7-12, giving rules, fees, etc. If you don't receive one, please call the school office or the administrative office. Bus students will be receiving approximate pickup times shortly before school begins. Questions on bussing should be directed to the Johnson Bus Company office in Kewaskum.

Lunch prices for weekly tickets are \$2.40 for students, grades 1 - 6, and \$2.65 in grades 7 - 12. Daily tickets are 65c and extra milk at meals, milk-break cartons and sack-lunch cartons are 4c each for students.

Mrs. Edward Volm Dies of Injuries in Car-Truck Crash

A Route 2, Kewaskum, woman was the victim of a crash with a semi-trailer about 1½ miles east of Kewaskum on State Hwy 28 Monday morning. The accident occurred at 9:25 a. m.

Mrs. Edward (Adeline) Volm, 46, of Highland Drive, R. 2, Kewaskum, died of massive internal injuries about two and a half hours later in St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend.

The truck driver, Dean Roerdink, 26, of Sheboygan, told sheriff's officers he was braking to negotiate some curves when the brakes locked. The trailer, which was not a maximum length semitrailer, swung into the other lane, colliding with the left front of Mrs. Volm's Chevrolet Caprice.

The accident report described the collision as a sideswipe where the two vehicles were traveling in opposite directions.

Mrs. Volm's 15-year-old son, Kevin, a passenger in her car, suffered facial injuries. The two were taken to the hospital by the Kewaskum Rescue Squad.

Mrs. Volm was the eighth person killed in county traffic accidents in 1975, as compared to 12 at this time last year.

on Monday, Aug. 18. James Arthur of Arthur & Arthur Associates opened the bids for construction of curbing and gutter. Rennhack Construction of Reeseville, Wis. entered a bid of \$2.89 per lineal foot, total price \$11,126.50, with starting date Sept. 15, 1975, and completion in thirty days. Lifetime Construction of Sussex, Wis. entered a bid of \$3.78 per lineal foot for a total of \$14,-553.00, starting date of Sept. 15, 1975, and completion in 10 days. Discussion centered, upon whether property owners have to be notified before the contract can be awarded. James Arthur stated there were two alternatives before awarding the contract, although it isn't necessary to notify property owners. One is receiving 100% waivers from people who are to be assessed, or hold a public hearing for special assessment. 

that the village has to declare an emergency, showing need for extra revenue, then contact the Dept. of Revenue with a resolution asking for expert help for re-appraisal. After the state answers, another resolution must be sent to the Dept. of Revenue. If approved, then the village can proceed with re-appraisal. The re-appraisal would not take place until 1976, but all groundwork will be estab-lished now. The Department of Revenue will send a list of certified appraisers. Trustee Schmidt made a motion authorizing the commissioner to petition for re-assessment. Trustee Strack seconded. Motion passed.

James Arthur also ap-peared with the revised plan for the new park. The board asked him to prepare plans for pool structure, shelter house, playground area, tennis courts and baseball diamonds by the Sept. 8 meeting. The pond area is now 1.2 acres. Some discussion on size of the pond led to Trustee Strack asking Arthur to make an overlay of a 2-acre pond to see size difference.

Tesch & Tesch Associates of Fond du Lac appeared with a preliminary sketch of the new fire station. The building will be a one story structure totaling 13,000 square feet. The building will have two large doors, two small doors and entrance doors facing south. The building is large enough for eight trucks, with conference rooms, training room, equipment room, chief's office, kitchen facilities and storage areas which can be designed for living quarters for possible future use for full time firemen. The building is ap-proximately 88 ft. by 120 ft. with parking to the north and east. Representatives of Tesch & Tesch met with the board and the fire department building committee on Aug. 20 for further discussion

Bicentennial Notes

Kewaskum Statesman Friday, August 22, 1975



Reliable records in Washington County show that Bishop John Henni, the first Catholic Bishop of Wisconsin (Milwaukee) owned land on the east side of the Milwaukee River for the use of St. Trinity Society in the Village of Kewaskum Center, Wisconsin in 1862 (R. Pledl abstract).

Since that year is when records were first officially recorded we can assume that the land was donated for Catholic use prior to that year. Holy Trinity Catholic Congregation officially was founded in 1862 and a church was built at its present location on the west side of the river on land donated by Andreas Miller and Mathias Altenhofen. In the 1880's the old church was enlarged to acgrowing commodate the

membership.

The picture above shows the laying of the cornerstone of a new and larger church (the present one) on June 18, 1905. Mr. Philip Vogt, the father of the pastor at that time, donated five lots for the expansion. The total cost of rebuilding and refurnishing the church was \$23,000. The rectory shown on the left which serves the parish at the present time under the leadership of Rev. John Budde was built around 1885 at a cost of about \$3,000.

The present church also contains a steeple clock which was donated with funds from a drive among businessmen and local and area residents in the 1950's to replace the original antiquated clock.

The church is a landmark

indeed and serves over 1500 parishoners today.

Youngest competitor was Joyce Guse, 10, and the oldest was Richard King, 54, of Chicago, over the Kettle Moraine course.

Wrist wrestling, broken down into 6 classes, drew many entrants. Only defending champion able to repeat was Bruce Kramer who defeated Myron Strobel in the 131-150 class. Another defending champ, Mark Gaffke. lost in the finals to Ron Rollinger in

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the 171-190 class. Sherry Blumer won the women's open, beating Carol Gaffke. Don Kannenberg won over Dale Secor in the under 130 class. Brian Schultz copped the 151-170 class over Gary Thompson and Kim Roden-kirch won the heavyweight over Eric Bergdorf.

Only 18 turned out for the bicycle races. Lloyd Mueller won the 10-11 year old race, covering the 8 miles in 38:55. John Brenholt took the 12-13 class in 37:05. 



AFS Student Writes Again From Tehran

David Ayer, who is spending the summer in Tehran, Iran, as Kewaskum's AFS student, has written another letter as follows:

The time has come to in-form you and A.F.S. of what is going on here in Tehran. First of all, I am getting along well with my family. interests seem to be Our much alike and we have had no major problems, or even minor ones worth mention-ing. From the moment I walked into the house, they accepted me as part of the family.

I am learning Farsi-Persian slowly, but with much help from my brothers. My mother keeps telling me "David, you must try to speak Farsi".So, I'm trying.

The weather here is dry and hot-on an average day, the temperature reaches a cool 47°C, about 108°F. The low humidity is salvation from the heat.

We have been to the Caspian Sea for three days-the temperature is cooler there. 95°F, but the humidity makes. up for that. The water quite warm, but the beaches are crowded in summer, so it is best to go swimming early and beat the crowd. The trip to the sea exposed me to almost every type of terrain Iran offers. from plains to mountains, etc. Tehran, the Capitol, is a

lively city which is quite mechanized on the surface but still contains contradictions. Livestock are sometimes driven through the streets, and the ditches of the old water system are still used in some areas. There are always people on the streets and in the shops. The city does not die at night

like so many in the U.S. We have just returned from a trip to the east, to the city of Mashhad, which lasted a whole eleven days. It comes as sort of a shock to me that already more than five weeks have gone by, and this leaves me with still a lot I'd like to know and see. My older brother Afshin asks me as many questions as I ask him, it seems, and he has taught me very much about the country as well as some Farsi (writing, too!)

These last two weeks were quite fascinating, especially the travel (two different types of train and by car as well) because there was very much to see-terrain, farming, small cities, etc. Plus the added attraction of being kicked out of the bazaar in Mashhad because I was a foreigner. While they encourage our trade here in Tehran, the more religious cities discourage us, and in Mashhad (a "pilgrim" city in winter pop. of 900,000, reaches


