Hopefully, by the end of August, work will begin on the museum, with the first priority to paint the outside.



### School District Announces Policy for Free Meals, Milk

Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2, announced its policy for free meals and free milk for children unable to pay the full price for meals and milk served in schools under the National School Luch, School Breakfast and Special Milk Programs.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size income criteria for use in determining eligibility for free meals and free milk.

Children from families whose income is at or below those shown are eligible for free meals and milk. In addition, families not meeting this criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 per cent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to

They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's

office in each school. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has such children living with them and wishes to apply for any such meals and milk for them, they should contact the school

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of his race, sex, color or national origin.

Under the provision of the policy, the Services Manager, 1450 School Street, Kewaskum, Wisconsin 53040, will review the applications and determine eligibility.

If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Floyd A. Brenholt, Superintendent of Schools, 1450 School Street, Kewaskum, Wisconsin 53040 for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure. Each school and the district office has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.
