Scholarship Fund Grows Over \$6,000

Over 600 grateful people of Kewaskum and surrounding area paid special tribute to Dr. Richard G. Edwards at a Recognition Convocation held Sunday afternoon at the new local high school gymnasium, honoring him for his many contributions to the community and surrounding area.

Dr. Edwards, who still practices full time from an office in his home, came to Kewaskum Feb. 6, 1932, after

completing his internship at Minneapolis General Hospital. He celebrated his 70th birthday on Sept. 1.

Although it is difficult to measure Dr. Edwards' full impact on the community, one statistic stands out. He has delivered over 3,400 babies, which is nearly twice the present population of the village.

He has always been very active in promoting the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club's turkey shoots. This now famous annual fall fund-raising event has made over \$100,000 for various community projects, including \$77,000 for the purchase of the Kiwanis Community Park site.

was established to serve as a living testament to the many years of faithful and outstanding service provided by Dr. Edwards. Called the Dr. R. G. Edwards Health Care Scholarship Program, this fund will provide scholar-ships for Kewaskum area high school graduates to pursue any one of the expanding health care careers. Over \$6,000 was raised from personal, business and civic contributions, according to initial estimates, with more expected to come in. Trout Fishing Contests are another attraction. The angler keeps the fish he catches. In addition, there is a grand prize for the person catching the largest fish.

Trap shooting contests are conducted throughout the day. Sportsmen desiring to enter these events may bring their own shotguns and ammunition. There is also an archery target range as well as other marksmanship contests. There are games for every member of the family to enjoy. Shelter, brats, hamburgers and hot and cold beverages will be available.

Kewaskum Schools, Buses Vandalized

The Kewaskum Elementary, Middle and High Schools were entered Sunday night and the vandals left such a mess that school had to be called off Monday at the elementary school to get the place cleaned up. School Supt. Floyd Brenholt reported that only about \$3.00 appeared to be missing from the middle school. Since other things were not taken he believed the break-in appeared to be of a purely destructive nature. Police Chief Donald Hlava-

ty didn't believe the vandal-

ism was the work of kids. A drive shaft weighing about 50 pounds was found in front of the safe in the high school office and Hlavaty said the safe may have been what the intruders were after but something must have scared them away. He said fingerprints were found at one of the schools but there were no signs of forced entry at any of the buildings.

Brenholt said it took most of the day to clean the elementary school out but school reopened Tuesday. The dam-(Continued on page 2) Barn Destroyed

age was discovered by janitors coming into the buildings between 6:30 and 6:45 a. m.

Windows in both the middle school and high school offices were broken. A calculator in the middle school office was thrown against the wall and smashed to pieces, Brenholt said. Fire extinguishers were emptied on the floors and walls. Most of the mess was vacuumed up in the middle school and some students helped dust off the walls before school opened.

Most of the middle and high school students were already on the buses at the time the vandalism was discovered, so they continued to school. Some elementaly students had already been picked up on their bus routes but were taken back home. Others were informed through the West Bend radio station that there was no school.

In addition to vandalism at the local schools, there were reports of bus vandalism at the Johnson Bus Co. terminal in Kewaskum.

According to Erv Gorecki, director of the Kewaskum busing, three persons were apprehended at 3 a. m. Monday following incidents of gas sibhoning, thefts and vandalism. Speakers in buses were ruined and two-way radios, fire extinguishers and axes were removed from some buses.

In recent years the company has lost several of the two-way radios, valued at \$500 each, and there has been siphoning of hundreds of gallons of gasoline, Gorecki said.

He also reported that the terminal office was entered and a roll of stamps stolen during the weekend incident.

On Feb. 6, 1932, he started his general prac-tice here in Kewaskum as a fully credited Doctor of Medicine, Surgery and Obstetrics. Dr. and Mrs. Edwards

have six children, Annabelle (Alan) Tessar, Richard (Arlette) Edwards and William (Violet) Edwards, all of Kewaskum; Ruth (Eldon) Ram-thun of R. 2, Campbellsport; Gwen (Jules) Dreher of Kenosha, and Patricia (Dr. Joseph) Darin of Brookfield. They also have 26 grandchildren, 13 girls and 13 boys.





Cancer Drive Exceeds Goal; \$20,209 Raised

Washington County's Cancer Crusade has once again surpassed its goal, according to Art Lastofka, county crusade chairman. Final figures released this week showed \$20,209 raised, which represents 103 per cent of the crusade's 1975 goal of \$19,600.

Residential receipts totaled \$10,100; special gifts, \$5,338; memorials, \$1,387; and special events, \$849. The county-wide "buckboard" campaign yielded \$2,535. Proceeds from the county crusade go to the American Cancer Society, Wisconsin Division with 40 per cent going directly to the national unit for cancer research. The remaining 60 per cent is used to support cancer research progress in both Wisconsin and Washington County.

The county's portion is in part returned in the form of literature, films and materials to support the society's public education programs. A portion is also used to support Washington County service programs, including free cancer dressings, loan closet equipment, rehabilitation programs, patient transportation and information services for cancer victims.

Chairman Lastofka thanked all volunteers who helped to make this year's drive a success.



New Park, Fire Station, Curb and Gutter, Reassessment Occupy Board

By Mark Smucker

Representatives of Arthur and Arthur Associates of Fond du Lac appeared before the Kewaskum Village Board Monday evening to present sketches for the proposed Kewaskum Kiwanis Park. There will be parking for 242 cars just inside the park entrance, a pool measuring 1.2 acres, with the deepest part at the north end and 50 feet of beach in places. Bids should be advertised

on Sept. 26 and Oct. 3 for excavating and spreading crushed stone. The bids will be opened after Oct. 10, so work can begin on the pool. Other items on the plan included a baseball diamond and a softball diamond, both facing northeast, three tennis courts, a basketball court, and four horseshoe pits. institute

A resolution to possible reassessment in the village was passed by a 4-3 vote, with President Charles Miller, Trustees Greg and David Nigh voting no, and trustees Schmidt, Yoost, Herriges and Strack voting yes. Last year alone, the village's equalized valuation increased \$522,300, although it lost \$121,000 in personal property, for an increase of about \$402,000. Trustee Greg Nigh estimated the cost at "a-round \$10,000."

Representatives of Tesch Architects of and Tesch, Fond du Lac, showed their latest sketches for the proposed fire station. The building will measure 160 feet long and between 70 and 94 feet wide. It will have a capacity of 190 people, and will cost about \$195,000, not including architect's fees and a

4. The total assessment against each parcel.

5. Upon completion of such report the Village Engineer is directed to file a copy thereof in the office of the Village Commissioner for public inspection.

6. Upon receiving the report of the Village Engineer, the Commissioner is directed to give notice of a public hearing on such report as specified in Section 66.60 (7), Wisconsin Statutes. The hearing shall be held in the Council Room in the Municipal Building of the Village of Kewaskum at a time set by the Commissioner in accordance with S. 66.60 (7), Wisconsin Statutes.
