Fire Destroys Barn on John Felten Farm Near New Fane

Kewaskum firemen fought their second barn fire in just over a month late last Wednesday afternoon at the John Felten farm on Mill Road near New Fane, located northeast of Kewaskum.

The local fire department was called at 4:20 p. m. and had the blaze under control by 7 p. m. but firemen remained at the scene in shifts all night until about 8 a. m. Thursday watching for flare-ups. A number of firemen were called back about 10:30 Friday night when the blaze flared up again and this time spent close to three more hours at the scene.

Firemen dragged out all the hay they could and called in Harold Mueller and his backhoe machine and Robert Marialke and a front end loader to aid them. The removed hay was still smoldering this week.

Mrs. Felten reported that the fire started in the upper portion of the barn. Cause of the fire was not determined. Mrs. Felten said it was not from spontaneous combustion as the hay was baled.

Felten had no idea of the monetary loss but he said the barn was insured.

Fireman Dave Nigh suffered facial burns when a flare-up occurred as he was trying to move a tractor from in front of the barn.

All livestock was removed before the firemen arrived and no machinery was lost. Firemen got the milk cooler

out of the building, but a portion of the milk house was destroyed.

Acting Fire Chief Augie Bilgo said the whole upper portion of the 38 by 80 foot barn was destroyed. He estimated that 300 tons of hay and straw and some grain were lost.

Thirty Kewaskum firemen responded to the call. A mutual aid call was placed with the Boltonville Fire Department which had 20 men at the scene. Boltonville and Campbellsport also assisted by providing tankers and pumpers, and milk truckers also helped haul water from this village. Bilgo estimated they put 80,000 gallons of water on the fire.

The fire was discovered by a grandson of Felten, who spotted smoke. The boy immediately went to the house and told his grandfather. Felten said by the time he went outside there were flames coming from the upper portion of the barn.

Fred and Carl Meyer and Henry Oppermann offered their barns temporarily for use in milking the cows. At present the cows are being milked at the Mike Wade barn until the Felten barn can be rebuilt.

Bilgo said the fire was about as bad as the one at the Walter Neuman farm Aug. 3. Another barn fire in February made this the third one in less than a year in the Kewaskum area.

Walking Distances to Bus Pickup Points Aired at School Meeting

Questions and complaints about walking distances to bus pickup points occupied the majority of time at the school board meeting held Monday evening. The board heard the complaints but stayed with their walking distance policy. They directed the board bussing committee to check out roads not checked before for danger problems. Maximum walking distances are 1/8 mile for kindergarten children, 1/4 mile in grades 1-6, and 1/2 mile in grades 7-12.

The board also decided to change one special education class from the elementary time schedule to the high school schedule. The change was made because only the high school - middle school routes cover the entire district and return to Kewaskum, where the class is held.

A question was also raised concerning the kindergarten enrollments at Farmington, where there are 28 in the morning session and 21 in the afternoon. The routes were set up prior to school when it appeared enrollments would be more equal. The board agreed with the decision to let the enrollments stand rather than disrupt parent arrangements which

had already been made, especially since the enrollments may continue to change.

In other business, a building report was made, including a report on progress in setting up shop equipment. The school maintenance staff is working on this, and the board felt this should be continued in the face of limited funds. It was recognized that this creates added difficulties in the shop areas until all systems are completed.

A resignation from Mrs. Luce, elementary school librarian, was accepted pending hiring of a suitable replacement. The vote was 6-1.

Policies on discipline, expulsion and suspensions were considered, along with removal of the present policies concerning pregnancies and married students. No corrections were offered, and the policies will be up for a vote at the next meeting.

An assistant volleyball coach was authorized on a 5-2 vote. This is a one-year position, subject to review of the entire athletic program.

The board asked to have costs of alarm systems checked, and then adjourned to executive session to discuss negotiations and a personnel question.

Turkey Shoot Grosses \$14,000; 8,500 Attend

The Kewaskum Kiwanis held their 23rd annual Turkey Shoot Sunday, Sept. 14. Attendance this year was the largest since the club had to stop using live birds as targets. The crowd was estimated at 8,500 persons. The good attendance was primarily due to Sunday's beautiful weather.

The club expects to gross over \$14,000 this year, which is the most since live birds were abandoned. Over 450 frozen turkeys (11 lb. average) were distributed to the winners. Trout fishermen caught 250 nice size trout. Food sales were excellent, with 660 lbs of brats and hamburgers being consumed. Bargain hunters managed to buy a full truckload of Regal cookware.

Winners of last year's Kewaskum Kiwanis Gourmet Kettle Klub drawing were announced. The grand prize of a \$100 savings bond and a turkey went to Bobbie Underhill, Random Lake. The five consolation turkey winners went to Paul A. Nelson, West Bend; Rich Yahr, Kewaskum; Bradley Kidd, West Bend; Anna Wagner Campbellsport, and James Steier, West Bend.

The Kiwanis Club is now selling their new gourmet books. The participating restaurants include the Bar-N

Much of the success of the Turkey Shoot over the years can be credited to the excellent facilities available at the Bar-N Ranch.

The Bar-N Ranch property was bought in 1941 by Lyle Bartelt and Dr. F. E. Nolting. During the period from 1941 to 1951 the Ranch actively sponsored rodeos, horse racing, weekly target and trap shooting contests, cross-country riding, local riding clubs, dances and skat tournaments.

Starting in the summer of 1951, Dr. Nolting and a few other past and present Kiwanis members began building the first 12 bunkers from literally bits and pieces of lumber and materials collected from abandoned buildings in the Kettle Moraine area. Dr. Nolting and Dave Bartelt received many good ideas when they visited a Western Turkey Shoot in Texas. Dr. Nolting was chair-

man of the first Kewaskum Kiwanis Turkey Shoot held on Nov. 8, 1952. Proceeds from this event totaled \$600. In 1953, the bunkers were expanded from 12 to 18. One year later, the trap shooting event was started with considerable help received from the New Fane Sportsmen's Club. In 1955, the firing lanes were increased to 36. The archery range, sausage shoot, BB gun shoot and children's games were added in the late 1950's. The trout pond was completed in 1961 and the pistol shoot began two years later.

The Kiwanis Club is very grateful for the use of these facilities and all the help and support the owners have given them over the years.

The Turkey Shoot committee would also like to thank the many volunteer workers who helped make this year's shoot another financial success.

New Kiwanis Club officers will begin their duties Oct. 1. They are: Jerry Stollenwerk, president, and Roy Swanson, vice president. Gene Bohn, secretary, and Floyd Brenholt, treasurer, will remain in their present posts. Stollenwerk will succeed Vince Groh as president and Swanson will succeed Stollenwerk as vice president.

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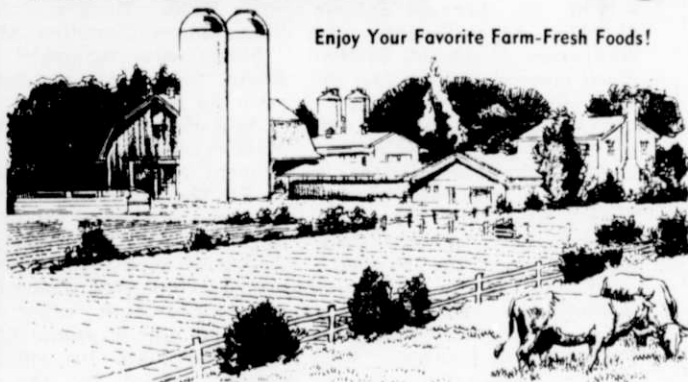

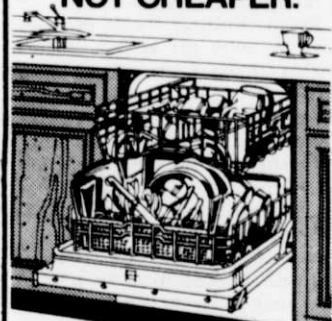

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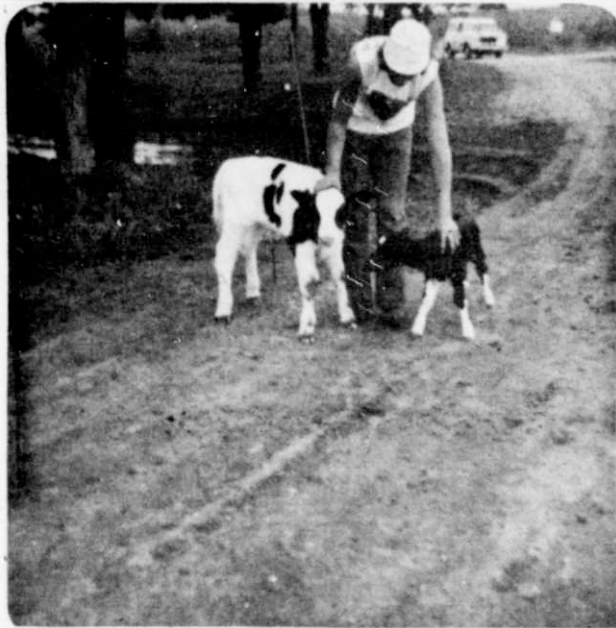

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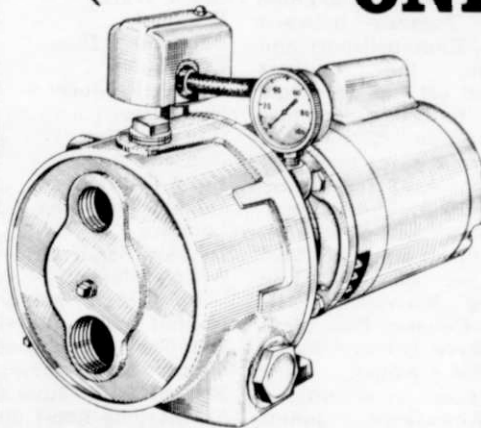


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Indians Defeat JFK Prep at St. Nazianz for 3rd Straight, 28-12

Fullback Dave Menzel rush ed for 161 yards to lead Kewaskum's football team to its third straight win, 28-12 over JFK Prep at St. Nazianz Saturday afternoon. Menzel scored two touchdowns and two two-point conversions in the Indians' third non-conference victory.

JFK, noted for its razzle-dazzle offense, scored on their first offensive series. The Moors connected for a 68 yard score on a play from tailback Dave Lefebber to J. Broeckert. The kick for point was wide and the Moors led at the quarter, 6-0.
