\$1500 in Donations Sought for Book on Kewaskum's History

Fifteen hundred dollars in donations is being sought by the Kewaskum Bicentennial Committee to cover part of the cost of printing a book on local history.

The book, written by Mark Smucker, will trace the history of the Village of Kewaskum from the time of its first known inhabitants, the Indians, to the present day population of 2600.

With an approximate length of 150 pages, history will be traced using photographs, maps, charts and graphs, as well as information taken from personal interviews, letters, original history texts, and other historical documents.

The book begins with a description of Indian settle-

ments in the area, legends about the life of Chief Kewaskum and the first white settlers in the village. The history then reviews changes in society about 1860, including means of transportation, educational changes, diversities of business and industries, development of modern agriculture, histories of the local churches, contributions in previous war efforts, and changes in recreation through the years.

Printing should begin sometime this fall, and the first copies should be available in December. All contributions will be listed at the back of the book. Donations should be sent to Box 1, Kewaskum, Wisconsin 53040.

Designs for Membership Cards

At the September meeting of the Kewaskum Historical Society, membership cards were discussed, which are to be provided by the Kewaskum Statesman. Two possible designs were voted upon, and President Dan Schmidt agreed to discuss the matter further with the printers.

To date, the lease for the proposed museum on Parkview Drive has not been signed, but as soon as that has been completed, the village crew will remove all village property, and then work will begin on renovating the former village garage. Erickson Pleads Guilty

Wayne A. Erickson, Jr. of 179 E. Paradise Dr., West Bend, pleaded guilty last week to burglary and negligent handling of burning materials. The latter charge was reduced from an original charge of arson.

Erickson, who was jailed June 29 for suspected involvement in a burglary at a Kewaskum home, allegedly set fire to his mattress in the jail.

He was found guilty of both charges. He was sentenced to not more than three years in prison for the burglary, but the sentence was stayed and he was placed on probation for five years.

He was sentenced to four months in jail for handling of burning materials but may be allowed out during working hours for work or

schooling.

Conditions of probation include participation in alcohol or drug programs prescribed by his probation officer and payment of restitution to the county for fire damages.

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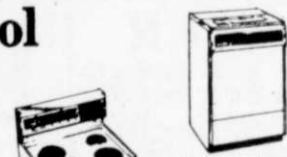
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**ENGINEER TO VISIT

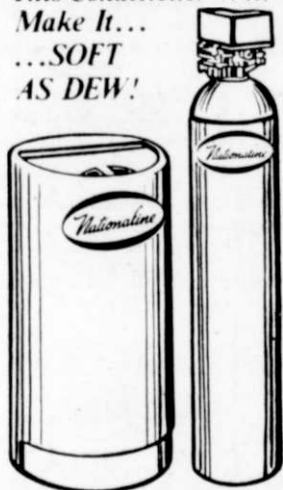

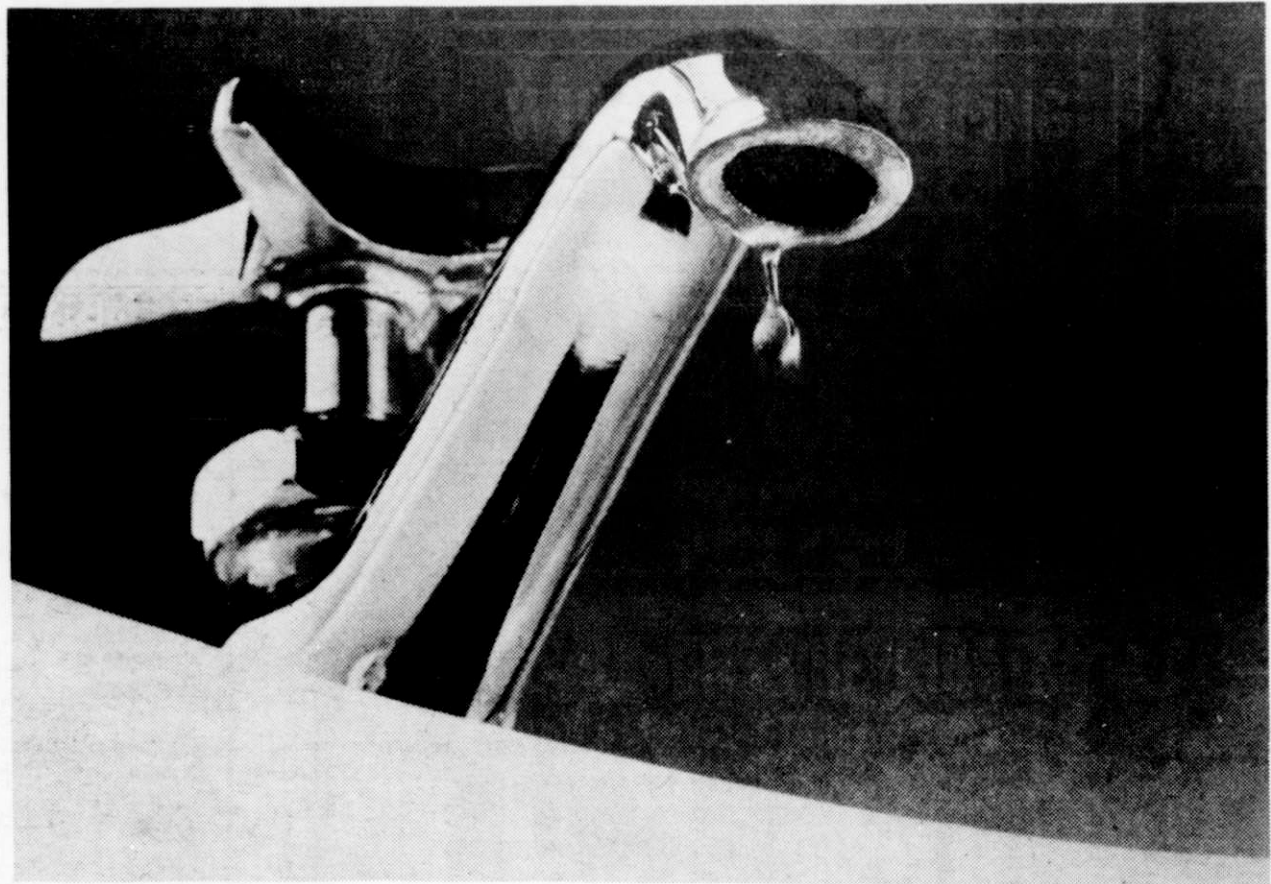

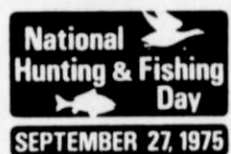
Tornado Alert

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Indians Suffer First Defeat in Scenic Opener at Hartland, 10-0

After three straight non-conference wins, the Kewaskum Indians absorbed their first loss in their Scenic Moraine opener at Hartland Arrowhead Friday night, 10-0.

Hartland is probably the class of the conference and could be the strongest team the Indians must face this year. They were picked as the favorites to win the title. Hartland is undefeated and still remained unscathed upon this season after the Kewaskum game. One of their wins included a shutout over Hartford of the Little Ten and the other over Waterford.

All the scoring came in the first half with the Indians playing the Warhawks on even terms after the intermission. Frequent penalties stymied both teams. Arrowhead was penalized 135 yards and the Indians 70.

Hartland scored their first and only touchdown in a hurry. After receiving the opening kickoff, Ted Stark, senior halfback, made it 6-0 with a 48-yard run on the first series of downs. The 180-pounder seemed to be stopped by two Indian tacklers after a three-yard gain, then broke loose with a second effort and ran for the score.

Soccer-style kicker Rick Schramek added the extra point and then kicked a field goal midway through the second quarter to complete the scoring for the night. He made his three-pointer on fourth and one from the Kewaskum 23.

Kewaskum had problems with field position in the first half. In the third quarter they drove to the Warhawk 34, but were stopped.

Stark carried 23 times for 158 yards, most of them in the first quarter. Fullback Dave Menzel had 58 yards for the Indians. Kewaskum's Gary Gavin and John Sekeres were singled out for their fine defensive play.

The Indians missed Tom Rohlinger, outside linebacker, and Leon Laatsch, who played defense but could not play at offensive end. He was also injured twice more in the game.

In other Scenic openers Mayville downed Pewaukee, 26-14, Kettle Moraine upset defending champion Germantown, 15-10, and Grafton blanked Slinger, 9-0. It could be an evenly matched race this year with the possible exception of Hartland.

This Friday night the Indians host Pewaukee, which lost to Mayville last week. Game time is 7:30.
