## 2 Local Students Semifinalists in Merit Program

The principal, Clark Pearson, has announced that two students at Kewaskum High School have been named semifinalists in the 1976 National Merit Scholarship Program.

David Ayer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Ayer, and Con-stance Sleger, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Sleger, are among 15,000 students who will continue in the competition for about 3,800 Merit Scholarships to be awarded next spring.

Over one million students from more than 17,000 high schools entered the 1976 Merit Program by taking the Preliminary Scholastic 1974 Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT). The semifinalists are the highest-scoring students in each state; the number named in each state is proportional to the state's percentage of the nation's graduating high school senior class. The semifinalists, most of whom will complete high school and enter college in 1976, represent the top half of one percent of the nation's most academically talented young people.

To continue in the competition, semifinalists must advance to finalist standing by meeting a number of requirements that include being fully endorsed and recommended for scholarship consideration by their secondary school principals, presenting school records that substantiate high academic standing. and confirming their high PSAT/NMSQT scores with equivalent scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) Over 90 percent of the semifinalists are expected to qualify as finalists and to receive Certificates of Merit next February. All winners of Merit Scholarships are chosen from the highly able group of finalists.

Washington county Sheriff Clarence Schwartz has warned businessmen that salesmen from Milwaukee have been calling business men in the county selling advertising and subscriptions to a magazine known as the Wisconsin Sheriff's State wide Yearbook.

Schwartz said that the salesmen claim to represent the state sheriff's association, but that they have not been sanctioned by the Wisconsin Sheriff's Deputies Association or the Badger State Sheriffs. Schwartz said that he suspected that the operation was fraudulent and that its salesmen were obtaining advertising under false pretenses. If any businessmen are contacted by the magazine, they should contact the sheriff's department.



## **BICENTENNIAL NOTES**

Kewaskum Statesman Friday, October 3. 1975



The A. A. Perschbacher Garage was started as a partnership by Arey A. Perschbacher and Louis Siegel in 1893. It included a blacksmith shop and manufactured wagons, carriages and sleighs for the farm trade, in addition to repair work. The partnership did not last long, however, and in 1897 Mr. Perschbacher became the sole owner.

When the Model "T" be-

came popular, the name of the business was changed to the "Rex Garage" and he began selling and servicing automobiles, which occurred in January, 1920. The blacksmith shop was changed to car services and sales, discontinuing horse drawn vehicles. He sold Ford, Buick, Chevrolet, Dodge and Plymouth cars in the years to follow. In 1935 an Allis-Chalmers farm machinery


dealership was added. A full line of tractors, combines and other implements were sold and serviced. A few years later the New Idea and Gehl Bros. dealerships were added.

Arey A. Perschbacher died in 1942 and his son Myron purchased the business from the Perschbacher family. Under his ownership he continued the farm implement business, but discontinued the car dealership, due to lack of space. At this time he also started a complete line of Simplicity and Jacobsen lawn and garden equipment. In 1962 he discontinued the farm implement sales and devoted full time to the service and sales of lawn and garden equipment. In January, 1974, an agree-

E. Miller of Miller's Furniture, Inc. to purchase the Myron A. Perschbacher Shop, located at 1317-1325 Fond du Lac Avenue, effective May 1st, 1974. At this time Myron discontinued his business and retired. The site it formerly occupied is now the location of Miller's latest addition to their furniture store.






#### ENGINEER TO VISIT COUNTY FARMS OCT. 7

# Indians Roll Over Pewaukee, 47-12; Rush for 449 Yards

Track ace Dennis Bremser put his speed to good use Friday night as he led the host Indians to a resounding 47-12 triumph over Pewaukee. Kewaskum is now 1-1 in Scenic Moraine play and 4-1 overall.

The Indians really went on the warpath as they rolled up 467 yards against the Pirates, 449 of them on the ground. They made 23 first downs to a mere three for their opponents in soundly beating Pewaukee.

Bremser, who kicks off for the Indians, got down field fast enough to recover two fumbles in hastening the rout. He carried 17 times for 128 yards, including touch-down runs of 24 yards (set up on a fumble recovery byGary Gavin) and 18 yards, and he kicked an extra point.

Quarterback Jim Bilgo also scored twice for the Indians on runs of one and 22 yards and passed 14 yards to Jack Kern for a third touchdown. Bilgo's second score was set up by an interception of a Gary Baumann pass by Wayne Endlich. G. Schmidt made a two-point conversion.

Dave Menzel, who had a 50-yard TD run called back by a penalty, added 108 yards rushing.

With a 20-0 lead at the intermission, Kewaskum came on even stronger in the second half, starting off by cau-sing the Pirates to fumble the kickoff. The Indians recovered and seven plays later Bilgo completed his pass to Kern to make it 26-0. The Pirates fumbled the next kickoff as well and this time Bremser added to his team's lead with his 18 yard score. Bilgo passed to Kern for the two extra points and it was 34-0.

The Pewaukee offense finally scored late in the third quarter when Rick Bergiels ran 55 yards for their first touchdown of the night. Their second TD came in the last quarter on another long run but they were too little and too late.

The Indian reserves came back with two more touchdowns in the last quarter to complete the mop up and run their total score to 47. Soph Endlich ran four yards for one and Bremser kicked the extra point. Kewaskum's

last TD came on an 11-yard

run by Jim Donath. A surprise halftime feature was an appearance by the West Bend Patriots drum and bugle corps. They put on a fine show and were well received.

In other Scenic Moraine games Grafton upset pre-season favorite Hartland (the team that beat Kewaskum the week before), 14-13; Kettle Moraine won again, 16-0, over Slinger, and Germantown defeated Mayville, 17-8. Kettle and Grafton remain the only unbeaten teams left after only two games.

The Indians will be at home again, this Friday at 7:30 when they host rival Mayville, which also holds a 1-1 record. (The Cardinals won over Pewaukee, 26-14, the week before while Kewaskum buried the Pirates, 47-12, in comparison). After that Kewaskum hits the road for two tough games at Germantown and Grafton.
