Village Board Approves Survey Map of Lin-Dee Lane Property

The Kewaskum Village Board voted approval to a certified survey map of property on the north side of Lin-Dee Lane at its regular bi-monthly meeting on Monday.

This survey showed the splitting of one lot into two smaller parcels for the purpose of constructing duplexes. A building permit was subsequently approved on the condition that it be signed by the local zoning administrator, and that one lateral be installed on each lot.

Discussion on re-evaluation of all village property in 1976 was tabled until the next meeting, since no motions were made. Some of the board members' opinions differed on the project, which has been estimated to cost about \$10,000. "What do we gain for \$10,000?" commented Charles Miller, village president, alluding to the fact that the reassessment will bring in no new revenue, only redistribute the tax burden more equally. Trustee Raynor Herriges felt similarly, but

Dan Schmidt felt that the board was justified in spending the money to equalize the tax burden.

Building permits were granted to Agatha Breit for remodeling, K and R Carpeting for the erection of a storage shed, and to Francis Schoofs of Riverview Drive for a garage addition.

Pay for substitute crossing guards was raised from \$8 to \$10 per day, since they do the same work as regular guards.

Village residents were reminded that it is their responsibility to trim overhanging tree branches to a height of 8 feet above sidewalks, and 12 feet above all streets. This was prompted by questions from several residents living on Roseland Drive who wondered whose responsibility the trimming belonged.

Commissioner Wm. Martin was granted permission to attend a League of Wisconsin Municipalities conference at Milwaukee on Oct. 29-31.

Railroad Buffs of Area to Present Special Program

What do the terms Pocific, Hudson, Northern, Mountain mean to you? Or how about 2-8-4 or 4-8-8-4? Do you think that's a safe combination or do you think about Berkshire and Big Boy? If you think the latter you are a railroad buff. To be a railroad buff you only need be interested in trains and rail-

The terms refer to steam type locomotives, and that breed is hard to find these days, so you may have to build your own basement railroad and run Geeps or Alco Centurys on your layout beside the model steamers.

A railroad buff was once described as a person who stops at railroad crossings and waits for the train so he can watch it pass rather than one who beats it to the crossings and continues on his way.

Recently in West Bend under the stimulation of the city recreation department a railroad club was formed. It was named "Kettle Moraine Ballast Scorchers" by one of the young members. Oh, yes. young boys can belong to the club-even gals if they wish.

The club meets monthly at recreation department (3rd Sunday night at 7:00 p. m.) or at the homes of members to view model layouts, talk about real trains, engines or models, see movies, and plan trips to operating steam

This week the club is announcing a special interest program to which the public is invited.

George H. Williams, Jr., noted author and lecturer, ding movies of live steam in action and an interesting discussion about trains and engines of all sizes and gauges.

As is the case with many a railroad author, George Williams' formative years were spent where the exhausts of steam locomotives and the wails of their whistles were familiar sounds, since he lived less than a half mile from two huge railroad yards in North Fond du Lac. At that time his father and grandfather were both locomotive engineers on the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad. While great-grandfather been at the throttle of the first engine to enter Neenah shortly after the Civil War. As a young man Williams went on runs with his Dad and came through West Bend on many a freight or passenger train.

Williams studied engineering at the University of Wisconsin and planned to do design work for some locomotive manufacturer, but because of health problems

Williams completed his education in Arizona. When it became evident that steam power was on its way out. George turned to the aircraft industry, so for eighteen years he was an engineer with the Boeing Company in Seattle, Washington. Now traveling about the country with his wife, Sue, Williams devotes his time to giving talks. showing movies and gathering more information about trains and the people who love them.

He also promotes his book "Life on a Locomotive," the story of Buddy Williams, C&NW engineer. The hero of his book, his father, is now enjoying his twentieth year of retirement in Arizona, after forty years on the high
