Installation of Lights on Parking Lot Approved by School Board

A number of items not included on the agenda occupied a good part of the Kewaskum Board of Education meeting held Monday evening. In agenda items, the board approved installation by the electric company of four lights in the parking lot between the high school and middle school. The cost of the installation is included in the monthly rental except for any underground work. Two different lighting arrangements were discussed before the board decided on which to accept.

The second October meeting was cancelled unless business comes up which would require calling another meet-

Possibilities of putting in an alarm system were discuswith a cost approaching \$15,000 apparently required to put in an effective system in the three village schools. No action was taken, but the board indicated they wished to continue investigating pos-

sibilities. A question was asked by Richard Theusch concerning actions taken when a child is injured at school. In general, an attempt is made to locate parents first. If this is impossible ,a doctor specified by the family is called. The procedure may vary somewhat, of course, depending in the nature and seriousness of the

A slightly revised budget, with no change from the Annual Meeting in the levy, was adopted. No action was taken or discussion held concerning any changes for this year in the special education budget and staffing. A memo concerning this had been included with the board agen-

In Fiery Crash

A Lomira young man was killed in a one car accident Friday evening when his car left the highway, hit a tree and caught fire on State Hwy. 28, seven miles west of Kewaskum near St. Kilian Heights Rd.

Daniel L. Sperger, 20, of 355 Pleasant Hill Ave., mira, died of burns suffered in the accident. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Sperger and grandson of Mr and Mrs. Ferdinand Weiland of Kewaskum.

Sperger's car went off the right side of the highway on a hill about 8 p. m. Deputy Coroner Matt Goeden of Washington County said the car went down an embankment and "must have burst into flames immediately" after hitting the tree. Sperger's identity was not known immediately

The Kohlsville Fire Department put out the fire. The Kewaskum Rescue Squad ambulance was called but its services were not needed.

The death was the 14th on county roads in 1975.

Daniel Sperger was born June 16, 1955, in Waupun, a son of Donald and Shirley Weiland Sperger. A graduate of Lomira High School, he served with the U.S. Navy and was a member of the Lomira American Legion.

Surviving are his parents; a sister, Kathleen, at home; a brother, John, also at home; his maternal grandparents. Mr. and Mrs. Ferdinand Weiland of Kewaskum, and his paternal grandfather, Ruben Sperger of LeRoy.

Funeral services were held at 10 a. m. Monday at the Kietzer Funeral Home, Lomira, and at 10:30 a. m. at St Mary's Church, Lomira. The Rev. John Goebel officiated and burial was in the parish cemetery. Visitation was after 4 p. m. Sunday.

Local Residents' Approval of Teacher Agreement Grandson Killed Voted by Education Association

Approval of the teacher agreement for 1975-76 was voted by the Kewaskum Education Association at its meeting Tuesday evening. The Kewaskum Board of Education will hold a special meeting Monday, October 20, at 8 p. m., in the administrative offices to consider the agreement.

The agreement calls for a base salary with a Bachelor's Degree of \$8,400. This will mean a total package increase of approximately 7.5% for the average teacher. The overall district cost is considerably less than this, since there were some staff reductions this year. That increase is about 2.5%. The base salafigure last year was \$8.070

Changes were made in the coaching schedule, which now has two experience columns. The first is for 0-4 years of experience, the second for more than four years. Other financial changes included going from 10c to 12c per mile for travel and from \$5.00 to \$5.25 for Behind-The Wheel Driver Education. Vocational certification will now count as 3 credits on the salary schedule. There is only one salary schedule this year, not a separate schedule for beginners in the district was previously true. Teachers will receive 11 sick days per year compared with 10 last year, but the total accumulation remains the same. One day of personal leave is now possible after two years in the district rather than after 5.

A reduction-in-force vision was added this year which attempts to establish guidelines for staff reductions if this becomes necessary. The agreement was worked out between negotiating teams of the K.E.A. and the Kewaskum School Board. With the approval of the K.E.A. Tuesday, it will become official upon board ap-



\$1500 in Donations Sought for Book on Kewaskum's History

Fifteen hundred dollars in donations is being sought by the Kewaskum Bicentennial Committee to cover part of the cost of printing a book on local history.

The book, written by Mark Smucker, will trace the history of the Village of Kewaskum from the time of its first known inhabitants, the Indians, to the present day population of 2600.

With an approximate length of 150 pages, history will be traced using photographs, maps, charts and graphs, as well as information taken from personal interviews, letters, original history texts, and other historical documents.

The book begins with a description of Indian settlements in the area, legends about the life of Chief Kewaskum and the first white settlers in the village. The history then reviews changes in society about 1860, including means of transportation, educational changes, diversities of business and industries, development of modern agriculture, histories of the local churches, contributions in previous war efforts, and changes in recreation through the years.

Printing should sometime this fall, and the first copies should be available in December. All contributions will be listed at the back of the book. Donations should be sent to Box 1, Kewaskum, Wisconsin 53040.



On the last play of the game, Bremser attempted his first field goal ever, although he has kicked a number of extra points. The snap was bad but the ball sailed through the uprights as the clock showed no time left. The kick was from the 27 yard line and pandemonium reigned as Germantown had lost its homecoming. Kewaskum had driven 65 vards with less than four minutes left in its winning drive.

The Warhawks took the opening kickoff and marched 64 yards to Kewaskum's one-yard line where the defense held and took over the ball on downs. On the next play there was a mixup in the backfield and quarterback Jim Bilgo was thrown for a safety, 2-0.

The Indians free-kicked against a strong wind and Germantown took over on Kewaskum's 37. They scored as Jim Olson ran the final nine yards for the TD. The extra point kick was good and the Indians were down 9-0.

The Indians came back with a 75-yard drive in the second quarter with Reindl taking it in from the nine. Bremser's kick was good and it was 9-7. But Germantown scored on its next series with Carter Schults scoring the TD, making it 16-7.

Kewaskum came right back but lost a touchdown because of a referee that was fooled. Dave Menzel dove into the line and the referee, thinking he was carrying the ball, blew the play dead. In the meantime Reindl really had the ball and scampered down the sidelines unmolested. This call brought up a protest.

With only seconds left in the half, Germantown hit pay dirt again as quarterback Brian Bancazk sneaked in from the one. That made it 23-15 and the Warhawks were done scoring for the night as the Kewaskum defense stiffened and held Germantown to 64 yards in the second half.

With ball control and a strong running game, the Indians drove 75 yards for a score in the third quarter as Reindl zipped 23 yards for his third TD of the game. Menzel scored the important two extra points on a run, knotting the score at 23-23. This set the stage for Brem-

ser's heroic field goal.

Reindl led the Indians with 150 yards in 21 carries. Fullback Menzel boosted his season rushing total to 555 yards in seven games with 115 yards in 22 carries.

In other Scenic games over the weekend leading Grafton won its fourth straight, beating Mayville, 21-0 (Kewaskum defeated Mayville 39-8); Kettle Moraine blanked Pewaukee, 17-0, and Hartland downed Slinger, 26-14.

Kewaskum's most crucial game of the season is coming up this weekend at Grafton, where they take on the unbeaten leaders in a Saturday afternoon contest at 1:30. A win will give the Indians a tie for first place while a loss will practically drop them out of the title race.

Grafton's new coach, Kip Cramer, feels his two platoon system will be tested well by Kewaskum. In a feature article on his team in the Milwaukee Journal this week Cramer had this to say about the Indians: "I really respect that team. I've watched them play the last three, four weeks and they've been pounding people all over the field. There's a bunch of college prospects on that team."
