Former Village Garage Leased to Historical Society for Museum

A lease to the Kewaskum Historical Society for the former village garage on Parkview Drive was unanimously approved by the Kewaskum Village Board at Monday's meeting.

The amount of the lease will be \$1.00 per pear for 10 years with all utilities being paid by the society. The building will be converted into a museum this winter, with some items to be displayed already donated.

Historical Society President, Dan Schmidt, was to sign the lease with represen-

tatives of the village on Wednesday.

A 1973 Chevrolet station wagon was purchased for the Sewage Treatment Department at a cost of \$1,500

Bids will be advertised for a 19 h.p. garden tractor with a 60 inch mower, since the old one is in need of replacement.

A request by Ada Meilahn to be connected to the village water supply was granted. Prior to this time, the home had been using a well for its water supply, but the water level is falling there.

Milk Producers Meet Here, Elect

Farm milk prices will continue to rise this fall, the president of the Mid-States Region of Associated Milk Producers, Inc. said in Kewaskum Oct. 6.

Speaking to 220 members of the Kettle Moraine district was Paul Affeldt, Sparta, who predicted that Class I (fluid) milk in the Chicago federal order would reach \$10 this fall.

"The price for manufacturing milk hasn't peaked yet," he declared. Under the federal order pricing system, the price of manufacturing milk is one component of fluid prices.

He pointed out that while there 'has been strong demand for dairy products, dairy farmers have every right to be fearful of imports. "There will be considerable pressure to bring imports in," he said, adding that the pressure will be coming from consumer groups.

Affeldt also pleaded for more unity among all dairy farmers and their organizations. Both dairy farmers and consumers would benefit, he claimed.

Elected to three-year terms as delegates for the district were Don Theusch, Allenton, and Ervin Butzlaff, Kewas-kum. Carl Herriges, Kewas-kum, was elected to a two-year term.

Holdover delegates are William Schroeder and Walter Breuer, West Bend; Joe Schmitt, Allenton, and Allen Peil, Slinger.

Seven alternates were also elected. They are John Oelhafen, Martin Haack and Byron Gessner, all of Kewaskum; Donald Schneider and Charles Spaeth, West Bend, and Ted Moser, Allenton.

Adeline (Harter) Enders

Adeline Enders, nee Harter, who was born April 9. 1875, at a farm between Kewaskum and Campbellsport, in the Town of Auburn, located on what is now Hwy. 45, observed her 100th birthday at her home in Wabeno, Wis.

Mrs. Enders is the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Harter, and a sister of Gregor Harter of the Town of Auburn and the late Jacob Harter, also of the Town of Auburn and the Village of Kewaskum. The farm on which Adeline was born has been in the Harter family for three generations, first owned by her father, John, then her brother Jacob, and now is owned and operated by a niece and her husband, Alban

and Dorothy (Harter) Nigh. John and Mary Harter had twelve children, all of whom are deceased except Adeline, who is the oldest, and Gregor, who is the youngest. The family were members of

At the age of 12, Adeline not only did the sewing of her own clothes, but also that of her younger sisters. During her later teens, she left home and worked in Chicago. She cooked at the University of Chicago. Adeline then left Chicago and worked in Milwaukee for several years. She married John Enders in 1903 in Kewaskum. They lived on farms near Mt. Calvary until 1909, when they moved to Wabeno. There they farmed and also operated taverns. Eleven children were born to the couple. Her son, the late Joseph Enders, lived in Kewaskum for a short time with his grandparents and attended school here. He played on the local high school basketball teams.


Her husband John died in 1946. She has 50 grandchildren and 99 great-grandchildren (at the time of this writing).


Adeline was very active in her community and belonged to many clubs and organizations. Her hobbies are sewing, painting, crocheting, gardening and raising canaries. She started oil painting at age 85. Water coloring is one of her other accomplishments.

Most of Adeline's traveling started at age 86. She took airplane rides to Detroit and Canada, one at 93 and the other at 94 years of age. At 95 she flew to Florida and at age 97 took a six week trip by car, again to Florida. She visited Disneyland, Busch Gardens, Cypress Gardens and Lake Wales. At the age of 99 she still made shorter

Adeline was presented with 100 roses by the community. Representative, Lloyd Her Kincaid, arranged for her to receive an American flag. that was flown over the state and national capitols and a legislative citation. other honors were bestowed on her by her local community Close to a full page tribute to this remarkable lady was published in the Forest





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
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Growing stronger each week with a fine running game and a front line that has been blowing people out of there, the Kewaskum Indians stunned previously unbeaten, leading Grafton in their homecoming game there Saturday afternoon, 14-0, before a large crowd from both towns, as well as West Bend and Mayville, to gain a tie for first place with the Blackhawks.

It was the Indians' seventh win of the season and fourth in a row in the Scenic, and the first conference loss for Grafton. Both teams are now 4-1 and share the lead with two games to go. It was a sunny but cold, windy day, with the wind coming off of Lake Michigan, causing extra concern for the quarterbacks and kickers.

Grafton took the wind in the first quarter but the Indians had the ball for all but six plays in that period. The Blackhawks had good early field position on the Indian 47 following a short punt into the wind but a Kewaskum player jarred the ball loose from Grafton ace Dave Brewster and Jack Kern recovered on the Hawk 48. Quarterback Jim Bilgo moved the Indians down to the one, from where fullback Dave Menzel plowed into the end zone. A 21 yard run by Dennis Bremser featured the drive. Bilgo's try for two points on a keeper was stopped inches short and it was 6-0.

Kewaskum put on two more drives in the second quarter one to the 29 yard line but they fumbled on 4th down. After a short punt on the other drive, the Indians reached Grafton's 10 yard line where a Bilgo pass was intercepted.

In the third period Kewaskum was faced with a third and five when Ray Reindl sped around right end on a 70 yard touchdown run to the delight of the Kewaskum fans Bilgo passed to Kern for the two point conversion, making it 14-0, and ending the scoring for the day.

Grafton threatened on an Indian fumble on their own 27. They got to the 16 on an 11 yard run by Todd Gundrum, their longest of the afternoon, when Menzel broke through to clobber Gundrum for a big loss. The Hawks had to go for a field goal and Jim Hedrick's try was wide.

Late in the game Grafton got to the Indians' 15 on a 23 yard pass completed on 4th down. But the defense again held and Kewaskum took over on the 30. QB Scott Fitzgerald threw a pass in the closing seconds that was tercepted by Bremser to end the game.

The Kewaskum defense played another stellar in blanking the Blackhawks. Tom Rohlinger had two solo tackles and 13 assists, John Sekeres 3 and 10. Menzel 4 (3 behind the line of scrim mage) and 8, and nose guard Gary Gavin was in on 13 tackles.

Reindl gained 120 yards rushing for top offensive honors, while Menzel and Bremser each topped 50. Grafton's star back Brewster, who had 186 yards and scored three TD's against Mayville, was held to 34 yards.

In other Scenic contests Mayville upset Kettle Moraine, 20-18, Germantown surprised Hartland, 14-7, and in the battle for he basement Pewaukee defeated Slinger, 21-13.

This Friday night Kewaskum hosts Kettle Moraine in its homecoming game at 7:30. Kettle is in a three-way tie for second place with 3-2 and could prove tough.

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
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
