Earl Kutz Dies Of Injuries in Tractor Mishap

Earl F. Kutz, 57, of rural Campbellsport, was found pinned under his farm tractor on County Trunk F, between Dundee and Waucousta, in the Town of Osceola at 10:15 p. m. Saturday when the tractor he was driving left the road and overturned. He was dead on arrival at St. Agnes Hospital, Fond du Lac where he was taken in the Campbellsport ambulance.

Fond du Lac County traffic police said it was not known exactly what time the mishap occured. Police were summoned at 10:05 p. m. and said the tractor had also struck a tree before over-

turning.

He was born June 19, 1918, in the Town of Osceola, rural Campbellsport, a son of Frieda Stern Kutz and the late William A. Kutz. Mr. Kutz was employed as a setup man by the Ringhand Circus at Thorp for four years.

Surviving are his former wife, Mary Lehn Kutz Robles of Chicago; a son, Arthur (Linda) Kutz of West Bend; a daughter, Malinda (Donald) Radder of R. 1, Cascade; four grandchildren; his mother, Mrs. Frieda Kutz of Cascade; a brother, Elroy Kutz, of R. 2, Kewaskum, and a sister, Florence Ertel of Sheboygan. His father and a brother preceded him in death.

Complete funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Tuesday at Miller's Funeral Home. 215 Forest Ave., Kewaskum. The Rev Milton Staskal officiated and burial was in Peace Church Cemetery, Kewaskum. Visitation was after 4 p. m. Monday.

Tessars Attend ABA Convention



Title in Sight As Indians Down Lasers at Homecoming, 26-14

The Kewaskum Indians moved, a step closer to a title by downing Kettle Moraine before a homecoming crowd Friday night, 26-14, to remain tied with Grafton for first place with a 5-1 mark (8-1 overall). The Indians needed only a win in their final game at winless Slinger Wednesday afternoon to gain a share of their first title in 20 years and possibly the undisputed championship depending on the outcome of the Grafton-Kettle Moraine

The Indians are ranked 12th in the state among middle schools and first in Washington County.

Unleashing a long touchdown drive the first time they had the ball, Kewaskum took the opening kickoff and moved 76 yards against a strong wind to make it 6-0. Fullback Gary Schmidt, subbing for injured Ray Reindl, took it over from the 1 after the Indians had notched 6 1st downs, including 2 where they elected to try for it on 4th down. Nearly the whole first quarter was consumed on the drive before Kettle got possession of the ball.

The visitors came right back with a drive of their own; moving the ball to the Kewaskum one, from where quarterback Scott Gilbert took it in. Gary Gavin and Schmidt blocked the extra point kick and the score was tied at 6-6.

Kettle's ensuing kickoff turned into an onside kick because of the strong wind. It traveled only 20 yards and was then blown backwards to the Lasers who caught it themselves before it touched the ground. Kewaskum held and Kettle punted, the only punt of the game.

This time the Indians marched 65 yards in 12 plays. Dave Menzel accounted for 38 yards on the drive and scored from the 3. He also ran for the 2 point conversion. Kewaskum made it 20-6 with another TD before the half as Dennis Bremser went in from the one. Up to this game the Lasers had given up the fewest points of

any conference team. Trailing 20-6 at the half, the Lasers came back to make it 20-14 in the 3rd quarter. With third and long yardage, Kettle completed a 25-yard pass for a first down on the Kewaskum 18. Gilbert took it in again on a oneyard quarterback sneak, and Johnson ran for the twopoint conversion.

Then came the highlight of the game, a 56-yard run by Bremser, which iced the victory. It began on the Indian 44. Bremser appeared to be stopped by at least 3 tacklers after about a 5yard gain but he spun off, regained his balance and broke clear down the field to complete the scoring for the night. Kewaskum drove to the Laser's 18 in the last quarter but a 15-yard penalty thwarted the drive.

Bremser was the top rusher with 165 yards in 17 carries. Menzel had 77 yards in 17 carries. Offensively quarterback Jim Bilgo, Keith Mueller, Scott Albers and Gary Bauer stood out. Defensively Tom Rohlinger had two solo tackles and 25 assists, Gavin was two and 15. and Mike Perkins one and

Grafton kept pace with a close 10-3 win over Germantown, Hartland moved into 2nd place with a 44-0 trouncing of Pewaukee and Mayville topped Slinger, 21-6.

The Indians closed their season at Slinger Wednesday afternoon (teachers convention Thursday and Friday) The Owls went into the game in last place and with an 0-8 record but gave some of the topteams good runs and are always tough for Kewaskum. 
