Title IX of the Federal Regulations, which deals with sex discrimination, came in for discussion at the Kewaskum Board of Education meeting Monday evening. Prompting the discussion were a request for a coach of girls' track at the Middle School and an administration decision to not allow girls to participate in boys' basketball this year.

Approval was given to hiring a coach for the girls' track team this spring. An attempt will also be made to provide some basketball and volleyball games for the girls through the winter as part of the intramural pro-gram. Allen Tessar mentioned that he had heard that someone had indicated to the parents or students that not allowing the girls to participate on the boys basketball team was a board decision. He asked that notification be

Co-Champion Indians Place 5 on Scenic All-Conference Team

Kewaskum, which shared the Scenic Moraine Conference football title with Grafton with a 6-1 record, placed five players on the all-con-ference first team. Voting by coaches took place last Wednesday evening at a fall sports meeting in Kewaskum.

Seven of the eight Scenic Morainie schools (all except Slinger) are represented on the first unit. Seniors dominated the team. 
