

Proposed Plan for New Fire Station



Plans are underway by the Kewaskum Village Board for construction of a \$200,000 fire station on South Fond du Lac Ave. Shown above is the architectural sketch for the proposed station.

Tentative plans call for the letting of bids Nov. 25 or 26 with deadline for submission about Dec. 23. Work is expected to begin in the spring. Rohlinger Construction of Lomira was awarded the bid for the removal and stockpiling of top soil at the site and this work was already completed this week before cold weather sets in and the ground freezes

The Village Board in July

adopted a resolution allowing a \$200,000 loan and secured an option on property owned by Clarinda Schmidt approximately measuring 350 feet by 400 feet. An old garage building on the site was razed recently and the rest of the site is vacant. At their Nov. 3 meeting the board also approved the purchase of the adjoining Ralph Fellenz property at a cost of \$30,000

Tesch - Tesch and Associates of Fond du Lac, contracted by the Village Board to design the fire station, said the proposed structure contain approximately 13,400 square feet of space

with a 94-foot frontage

one-story building The would be built of pre-engineered steel with masonry walls of colored and textured concrete block in some shade of light brown. The station is designed for six equipment bays capable of housing 12 fire fighting units.

Besides the equipment area, plans call for a training room of 1,500 square feet, a fire chief's office, a small conference and meeting room, a dispatch office and a first aid room. Also included in Tesch-Tesch's design are toilets and various equipment storage areas. No

quarters are provided because the fire department is a volunteer unit

The building will have no basement. Parking space for approximately 70 cars would be provided. Some of the area could be used for regional fire and first aid meetings.

Augie Bilgo is the acting fire chief in charge of the department consisting of 45 active men. The department now has two ambulances and six fire trucks.

The new structure will replace existing quarters in the municipal building constructed 25 years ago

Board Accepts Bid for Removal of Topsoil From New Firehouse Site

At the bimonthly meeting of the Kewaskum Village Board, bids were read for the removal and stockpiling of about 4500 cubic yards of topsoil from the site of the proposed firehouse.

A total of six bids were received, ranging in price from 29c per cubic yard up to 68c. The bid which was accepted was from Rohlinger Construction Co. of Lomira, for 29c per cubic foot, or \$1,450. The work was done immediately this week, so that it was completed before the ground is covered with
